Re: May 26 2020 Agenda Item No. 20.1: Adopt Resolution Delaying Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) requirements of SB-743

Dear Board Chairman Buddy Mendes and Members of the Board of Supervisors:

The proposed Board resolution offers two reasons for the County's decision to delay implementation of SB 743 for two years: (1) the COVID-19 virus has caused an economic recession and (2) the bill stands in opposition to a goal of affordable housing in that its implementation will significantly increase the cost of new homes.

My response is simply this. Neither reason justifies the County's decision to violate state law.

SB 743 was signed into law on September 27, 2013. In January 2019, the Natural Resources Agency incorporated the requirements of SB 743 into the CEQA Guidelines, and the due date for statewide implementation is July 1, 2020.

In enacting SB 743, it was the Legislature's intent to "more appropriately <u>balance</u> the needs of <u>congestion management with statewide goals related to infill development</u>, promotion of public health through active transportation, and reduction of greenhouse gas emissions." It was also "the intent of the Legislature to <u>balance</u> the need for level of service standards for traffic with <u>the need to build infill housing</u> and mixed use commercial developments within walking distance of mass transit facilities, downtowns, and town centers <u>and to provide greater flexibility to local governments to balance</u> these sometimes competing needs." (Government Code 65088.4)

It's evident that the Legislature was aware of housing needs when it enacted SB 743. Important to this hearing is the fact that there is no evidence before your Board that, since the bill's adoption in 2013, the County has attempted either to implement the law or to conduct an analysis to support its claim that SB 743 is detrimental to affordable housing. And finally, based on a sincere appreciation for the rule of law, I'm distressed that the County is able to justify delaying the implementation of a statute.

I ask your Board not to adopt the resolution. The County must incorporate SB 743 into its present effort to update its General Plan and into any new or ongoing environmental reviews.
