
## Multi-Pronged Approach

   (CAP 115, Pleasant 52, Hacienda 96, Poverello 28, MMC 40, Selma COM 60, and Sanger 24)
- 460

- 24 Travel Trailers Deployed
- 21 Isolation/Quarantine Rooms
- Existing Shelters
- Personal Protective Equipment and Hand Washing & Sanitizer Stations Deployed
- Scheduled Disinfection Cleaning
- Surveillance Testing
- Outreach Teams Metro & Rural
- Telemedicine & Behavioral Health Referrals



August 17, 2020 | Fresno County, CA






Red Line represents 100 cases/100,000 over 14 days










## Status of Medical Investigations and Contact Tracing

- Established a Division in the Department of Public Health for COVID investigation
- 180 full time permanent staff, extra help, contract, and State assigned staff
- Teams are focused on congregate settings (correctional facilities, SNFs, residential facilities, large employers)
- Establishing contracts with community-based organizations to expand education, investigation, and quarantine supports
- Building capacity with primary care system, hospitals, rural clinics




Confirmed COVID-19 Case Map

## **COVID-19 Response**

- Rapid shift to telehealth/telephone/telework
  - Equipment
  - Software
- Continue to see priority clients in person
  - All crisis services
    - Crisis Stabilization Units for Adults and Children
    - Adult and Adolescent Psychiatric Health Facilities
    - Crisis Residential Facility
    - Crisis Intervention Team and outreach services
  - Injections, blood draws, new medication starts
  - Other urgent treatment needs
  - Warm Line developed
  - Personal Protective Equipment and Space Configuration
  - Support to our contracted partners



## **COVID-19 Response**

- Many Waivers from State/Federal Government
  - Enable Telehealth/Telephone
  - Allow for consent/signatures, etc.
  - Pending for rate setting
- Preparing for "new normal"
  - Long-term telework feasibility exploration
  - Entrance/egress
  - Workspace configurations for physical distancing
  - Mask requirements
  - Person served satisfaction survey
  - Service impact analysis
  - Other aspects to be determined

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
