

FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Amendment") is made and entered into this ____ day of _____, 2021, by and between the COUNTY OF FRESNO, a Political Subdivision of the State of California (hereinafter "COUNTY"), and Exceptional Parents Unlimited, a California corporation, whose address is 4440 North First Street, Fresno, California, 93726 (hereinafter "CONTRACTOR").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR entered into Agreement number D-20-430, dated October 26, 2020 (hereinafter "Agreement"), pursuant to which CONTRACTOR agreed to provide equity-focused community health outreach and support services to address the needs of COUNTY's vulnerable populations including disabled, special needs, hearing impaired, and vision impaired to; and

WHEREAS CONTRACTOR has provided such services, including through execution and oversight of subcontracts with local community benefit organizations skilled in the provision of such services and possessing unique community ties to vulnerable population groups to advance health equity throughout the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the Agreement has been extended for one six-month period through June 30, 2021 as allowed for in the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR now desire to amend the Agreement in order to extend the length of the Agreement, add the provision of COVID vaccine support, influenza, and/or other communicable diseases support services, increase the total compensation amount to accommodate the provision of existing services through December 31, 2021 and the addition of vaccine support services, and to enact certain required federal funding terms and conditions.

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, COUNTY and CONTRACTOR agree as follows:

1. That all references to "Exhibit A" in existing COUNTY Agreement number D-20-430 shall be changed to read, "Revised Exhibit A", attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
 2. That all references to "Exhibit B" in existing COUNTY Agreement number D-20-430 shall be changed to read, "Revised Exhibit B", attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

1 3. That Section Three (3) of the Agreement, located on Page Three (3), Lines Five (5)
2 through Ten (10), is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

3 **"3. TERM**

4 The term of this Agreement shall commence on September 30, 2020 and be for a
5 period through and including December 31, 2021."

6 4. That Section Five, Subsection B (5.B.) of the Agreement, located on Page Four (4),
7 Lines Sixteen (16) through Nineteen (19), is deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

8 "B. In no event shall services performed under this Agreement by CONTRACTOR
9 be in excess of Two Million Four Hundred Twenty-Five Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$ 2,425,000.00)
10 during the term of this Agreement. It is understood that all expenses incidental to CONTRACTOR's
11 performance of services under this Agreement shall be borne by CONTRACTOR."

12 5. That the following language be inserted in Section Thirteen (13), Page Nine (9),
13 beginning on Line Twenty (20):

14 "C. In addition, CONTRACTOR shall cooperate and participate with COUNTY's
15 fiscal review process and comply with all final determinations rendered by the COUNTY's fiscal review
16 process. If COUNTY reaches an adverse decision regarding CONTRACTOR's services to consumers,
17 it may result in the disallowance of payment for services rendered; or in additional controls to the
18 delivery of services, or in the termination of this Agreement, at the discretion of COUNTY's Director of
19 Public Health Director or designee. If as a result of COUNTY's fiscal review process a disallowance is
20 discovered due to CONTRACTOR's deficiency, CONTRACTOR shall be financially liable for the
21 amount previously paid by COUNTY to CONTRACTOR and this disallowance will be adjusted from
22 CONTRACTOR's future payments, at the discretion of COUNTY's Director of Public Health or
23 designee. In addition, COUNTY shall have the sole discretion in the determination of fiscal review
24 outcomes, decisions and actions."

25 6. That Section Nineteen, Subsection A (19.A) of the Agreement, located on Page
26 Twenty-one (21), Lines Four (4) through Fourteen (14) is deleted in its entirety and
27 replaced with the following:

28 "A. COUNTY and CONTRACTOR recognize that CONTRACTOR is a

1 recipient of Federal funds under the terms of this Agreement. By signing this Agreement,
2 CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with applicable Federal suspension and debarment
3 regulations, including but not limited to: 29 CFR 97.35, 29 CFR 1470.35, 41 CFR 105-
4 71.135, and Executive Order 12549. By signing this Agreement, CONTRACTOR attests to
5 the best of its knowledge and belief, that it and its principals:

- 6 1. Are not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared
7 ineligible, or voluntarily excluded by any Federal department or agency; and
8 2. Shall not knowingly enter into any covered transaction with an entity or person who
9 is proposed for debarment under Federal regulations, debarred, suspended,
10 declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in such transaction."

11 7. The parties agree that this Amendment may be executed by electronic signature as provided
12 in this section. An "electronic signature" means any symbol or process intended by an individual
13 signing this Amendment to represent their signature, including but not limited to (1) a digital signature;
14 (2) a faxed version of an original handwritten signature; or (3) an electronically scanned and
15 transmitted (for example by PDF document) of a handwritten signature. Each electronic signature
16 affixed or attached to this Amendment (1) is deemed equivalent to a valid original handwritten
17 signature of the person signing this Amendment for all purposes, including but not limited to
18 evidentiary proof in any administrative or judicial proceeding, and (2) has the same force and effect as
19 the valid original handwritten signature of that person. The provisions of this section satisfy the
20 requirements of Civil Code section 1633.5, subdivision (b), in the Uniform Electronic Transaction Act
21 (Civil Code, Division 3, Part 2, Title 2.5, beginning with section 1633.1). Each party using a digital
22 signature represents that it has undertaken and satisfied the requirements of Government Code
23 section 16.5, subdivision (a), paragraphs (1) through (5), and agrees that each other party may rely
24 upon that representation. This Amendment is not conditioned upon the parties conducting the
25 transactions under it by electronic means and either party may sign this Amendment with an original
26 handwritten signature.

27 COUNTY and CONTRACTOR agree that this Amendment is sufficient to amend the
28 Agreement and, that upon execution of this Amendment, the Agreement and this Amendment together

1 shall be considered the Agreement.

2 The Agreement, as hereby amended, is ratified and continued. All provisions, terms,
3 covenants, conditions and promises contained in the Agreement and not amended herein shall remain
4 in full force and effect.
