Part 38, currently, also sets out rules and requirements that pertain to Subrecipient organizations that engage in or conduct explicitly religious activities, as well as rules and requirements that pertain to Subrecipients and Subrecipients that are faith-based or religious organizations.

The text of 28 C.F.R. Part 38 is available via the Electronic Code of Federal Regulations (currently accessible at https://www.ecfr.gov/cgibin/ECFR?page=browse), by browsing to Title 28-Judicial Administration, Chapter 1, Part 38, under e-CFR "current" data.

16. Restrictions on "Lobbying"

In general, as a matter of federal law, federal funds awarded by OJP may not be used by the Subrecipient, either directly or indirectly, to support or oppose the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government. See 18 U.S.C. 1913. (There may be exceptions if an applicable federal statute specifically authorizes certain activities that otherwise would be barred by law.)

The foregoing is not intended, and shall not be understood by the agency making this award, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

Use of Subaward funds for construction of new facilities is restricted by statute. Any questions concerning this provision should be directed to the Cal OES Program Specialist prior to incurring the expense or commencing the activity in question.

To ensure compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (Pub. L. No. 103-62) and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-

352), program performance under this Subaward is measured by the following: o Percent reduction in the average number of days from the submission of a sample to a forensic science laboratory to the delivery of test results to a requesting office or agency (calculated by reporting the average number of days to process a sample at the beginning of the grant period versus the average number of days to process a sample at the end of the grant period); o Percent reduction in the number of backlogged forensic cases (calculated by reporting the number of backlogged forensic cases (calculated by reporting the number of backlogged forensic cases at the beginning of the grant period versus the number of backlogged forensic cases at the end of grant period), if applicable to the Subaward; and o The number of forensic science or medical examiner/coroner's office personnel who completed appropriate training or educational opportunities with these Coverdell funds, if applicable to the Subaward. Subrecipients are required to collect and report data relevant to these measures.

#### 23. Gross Income

The Subrecipient understands and agrees that gross income (revenues) from fees charged for forensic science or medical examiner services constitutes program income (in whole or in part), and that program income must be determined, used, and documented in accordance with the provisions of 2 C.F.R. 200.307, including as applied in the Department of Justice (DOJ) Grants Financial Guide, as it may be revised from time to time. The recipient further understands and agrees that both program income earned during the award period and expenditures of such program income must be reported on the quarterly and final Federal Financial Reports (SF 425) and are subject to audit.

The Subrecipient understands and agrees that program income earned during the award period may be expended only for permissible uses of funds specifically identified in the solicitation for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program. The recipient further understands and agrees that program income earned during the award period may not be used to supplant State or local government funds, but instead may be used only to increase the amount of funds that would, in the absence of Federal funds or program income, be available from State or local government sources for the permissible uses of funds listed in the solicitation.

The Subrecipient understands and agrees that program income that is earned during the final ninety (90) days of the award period may, if appropriate, be obligated (as well as expended) for permissible uses during the ninety-day (90day) period following the end of the award period. The recipient further understands and agrees that any program income earned during the award period that is not obligated and expended within ninety (90) days of the end of the award period must be returned to OJP.

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#### 24. Generally Accepted Laboratory Practices

The Subrecipient shall ensure that any forensic laboratory, forensic laboratory system, medical examiner's office, or coroner's office that will receive any portion of the award uses generally accepted laboratory practices and procedures as established by accrediting organizations or appropriate certifying bodies.

#### a. External Investigations

The Subrecipient shall ensure that requirements associated with 34 U.S.C. section 10562(4) (which relate to processes in place to conduct independent external investigations into allegations of serious negligence or misconduct by employees or contractors) are satisfied with respect to any forensic laboratory system, medical examiner's office, coroner's office, law enforcement storage facility, or medical facility in the State that will receive a portion of the grant amount.

#### b. Accreditation

The Subrecipient shall ensure that any forensic laboratory or forensic laboratory system (not including any medical examiner's office or coroner's office) that will receive any portion of the award either is accredited, or will use a portion of this award to prepare and apply for accreditation by not more than two years from the award date of this award.

Additionally, with respect to accreditation, the recipient shall ensure that for any subaward it makes under this award, it will require in a legally-binding and enforceable writing, such as the subaward documentation (for example, subaward terms and conditions), that its Subrecipient: 1) if accredited, must continue to demonstrate such accreditation as a condition of receiving or using the subaward funds; or, 2) if not accredited, must use the subaward funds to prepare and apply for accreditation.

The Coverdell statute (see 34 U.S.C. section 10562(2)) and the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program solicitation state certain requirements and guidance associated with proper accreditation and regarding what BJA will consider to be acceptable documentation of accreditation. The Subrecipient is to contact the BJA grant manager

for clarification or guidance if it should have any question as to what constitutes proper accreditation for the purposes of the Coverdell program. Award funds may not be used under this award by a forensic

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laboratory or forensic laboratory system with accreditation (or by such laboratory to obtain accreditation) that BJA determines not to be consistent with the Coverdell law and the solicitation or to be otherwise deficient.

The Subrecipient agrees to notify BJA promptly upon any change in the accreditation status of any forensic science laboratory or forensic laboratory system that receives funding under this award.

#### 25. Cash Compensation

With respect to this award, federal funds may not be used to pay cash compensation (salary plus bonuses) to any employee of the award recipient at a rate that exceeds 110% of the maximum annual salary payable to a member of the federal government's Senior Executive Service (SES) at an agency with a Certified SES Performance Appraisal System for that year. (An award recipient may compensate an employee at a higher rate, provided the amount in excess of this compensation limitation is paid with non-federal funds.)

This limitation on compensation rates allowable under this award may be waived on an individual basis at the discretion of the OJP official indicated in the program announcement under which this award is mad

#### 26. Publications

The Subrecipient agrees to submit to Cal OES for review and approval any curricula, training materials, proposed publications, reports or any other written materials that will be published, including web-based materials and web content, through funds from this grant at least (30) working days prior to the targeted dissemination date. Any written visual or audio publications, with the exception of press releases, whether published at the Subrecipients expense, shall contain the following statements: "This project was supported by Grant No. 2020-CD-BX-0012, awarded by the Bureau of Justice Assistance, the National Institute of Justice, the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the Office for Victims of Crime, and the SMART Office. Points of view or opinions in this document are those of the author and do not necessarily represent the official position or policies of the U.S. Department of Justice." The current edition of the DOJ Financial Guide provides guidance on allowable printing and publication activities.

#### 27. Press Releases

The Subrecipient shall transmit to the Cal OES Program Specialist copies of all official award-related press releases at least ten (10) working days prior to

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public release. Advance notice permits time for coordination of release of information by Cal OES and BJA where appropriate and to respond to press or public inquiries.

#### 28. Copyright; Data Rights

The Subrecipient acknowledges that OJP reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and authorize others to use (in whole or in part, including in connection with derivative works), for Federal purposes: (1) any work subject to copyright developed under Subaward; and (2) any rights of copyright to which a Subrecipient purchases ownership with Federal support.

The Subrecipient acknowledges that OJP has the right to (1) obtain, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the data first produced under a Subaward; and (2) authorize others to receive, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use such data for Federal purposes. "Data" includes data as defined in Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) provision 52.227- 14 (Rights in Data - General).

The Subrecipient acknowledges that, as stated in the solicitation for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program, BJA assumes that Subrecipients of Coverdell funds will make use of the process referenced in their certification as to external investigations and will refer allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results to government entities with appropriate process in place to conduct independent external investigations, such as the government entity (or entities) identified in the grant application. The Subrecipient shall submit the following information as part of its final report: (1) the number and nature of any allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results received during the 12-month period of the award; (2) information on the referrals of such allegations (e.g., the government entity or entities to which referred, the date of referral); (3) the outcome of such referrals (if known as of the date of the report); and (4) if any such allegations were not referred, the reason(s) for the non-referral. Should the project period for this award be extended, the Subrecipient shall submit the above information as to subsequent twelve-month period every

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twelve months thereafter (as part of a semi-annual progress report) until the close of the award period, at which point the Subrecipient shall submit the required information to any period not covered by prior reports as part of its final report. The Subrecipient understands and agrees that funds may be withheld (including funds under future awards), or other related requirements may be imposed, if the required information is not submitted on a timely basis.

#### 31. Subrecipient Integrity and Performance Matters

The Subrecipient must comply with any and all applicable requirements regarding reporting of information on civil, criminal, and administrative proceedings connected with (or connected to the performance of) either this OJP award or any other grant, cooperative agreement, or procurement contract from the federal government. 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All appropriate documentation must be maintained on file by the Subrecipient and available for Cal OES or public scrutiny upon request. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in suspension of payments under the grant or termination of the grant or both and the Subrecipient may be ineligible for Subaward of any future grants if the Cal OES determines that any of the following has occurred: (1) the Subrecipient has made false certification, or (2) violates the certification by failing to carry out the requirements as noted above.

The Fresno County Sheriff's Office Forensic Laboratory (hereafter referred to as crime laboratory) developed a budget that supports the goal of the Coverdell 2020 Program to improve the quality, timeliness, and credibility of forensic science services for criminal justice purposes.

The Coverdell 2020 Program requires maintenance of this laboratory's accreditation status. ANAB is our accreditation provider and the ISO 17025 Guideline 5.2 Training and Development state that the training and development of employees must be emphasized to improve accuracy, increase productivity, and enable them to assume greater responsibility. Included under Guideline 5.2 are standards important to the Coverdell 2020 Program. They are standards:

5.2.1 The agency management shall ensure the competence of all who operate specific equipment, perform tests and/or calibrations, evaluate results, and sign test reports and calibration certificates. When using staff that is undergoing training, appropriate supervision shall be provided. A training program to develop the technical skills of employees is essential in each applicable discipline and sub discipline.

ANAB goes on further to state examiners must have mastery of the theory, procedures, and techniques necessary to produce reliable results and conclusions; and, under criteria for each functional area of expertise that examiners must have education and experience/training commensurate with the examinations and testimony they provide. A baccalaureate degree in a natural science, Criminalistics, or closely related field is required.

The crime laboratory has met or exceeded the ANAB ISO 17025:2017 criteria delineated above by hiring qualified staff that meets the educational degree requirement. The ISO 17025:2017 criteria is also met through the operation of the laboratory's professional development program, the training programs described in each laboratory procedures manual, and the specific training needs of the management and the individual technical units within the laboratory.

Mindful of the ANAB accreditation criteria and in accordance with the crime laboratory's Professional Development Program and Coverdell 2020 Program, the crime laboratory identified the appropriate training in technical and personal skills for the laboratory's qualifying forensic scientists. The training needs of this crime laboratory are extensive, they are necessary to stay abreast

of the advances in forensic science, and they span the broad spectrum of forensic services offered by this crime laboratory.

Three (3) full-time qualifying forensic scientists are designated to receive training under the Coverdell 2020 Program. The qualifying forensic scientists include candidates from Forensic Laboratory Criminalist classifications. The series classification is described as follows:

The classification of Criminalist has three levels that are assigned at the crime laboratory director's discretion in accordance with budget provisions, workload, organizational needs, and the individual's expertise and skill. The criminalist must have graduated from a four-year college or university with a major in chemistry, biochemistry, physics, pharmacology, biology, microbiology, criminalistics (with an emphasis in chemistry) or a closely related scientific field. Coursework must have included successful completion of 24 semester units of chemistry including qualitative analysis.

The training program identified in this budget is intended to improve the management of the crime laboratory's caseload as well as the crime laboratory's turnaround time in the targeted areas of analysis by maintaining a well-trained staff of professional forensic scientists, improving the quality of

forensic services, and expanding the knowledge base of forensic scientists within functional areas with appropriate skill sets to complete the work as expediently as can reasonably be expected.

This training will be identified by the Crime laboratory's director, using various Quality Assurance Guidelines and training manuals. Training will consist of paying for three Criminalists to go to the AFTE 2021 Conference for the Firearms / Toolmark unit.

The firearms section of the laboratory has added one position in order to assist in decreasing our turnaround time and backlog of firearms cases. We currently have three Comparison microscopes, but upgrades are needed on current scopes to better serve our criminal justice partners, this will help with the logjam in the system as analysts will have to wait for a microscope to be available for use due to being out of service. Purchase of a new microscope upgrades will support the goals of the 2020 Coverdell Program by making the firearms unit more efficient and improve the quality of the work environment for the Firearms Analysts. Other various equipment is being requested to assist the firearms unit with casework effectiveness. This will include the following, flexible

borescope, ballistic water tank vacuum, chronograph, four stereo microscopes, brass catcher and firearms workbench.

## **Grant Subaward Programmatic Narrative**

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Subrecipient: Fresno County

Providing continuing education and training to this laboratory's experienced scientists ensures that the crime laboratory delivers the highest quality, most efficient, and timely forensic services while improving the quality of forensic services to Fresno County's criminal justice community.

The training and educational needs of the scientists working the forensic cases goes to the core of the crime laboratory's efforts to provide quality, credible and timely forensic services to Fresno County. The training needs of the crime laboratory are extensive and span the areas of forensic services offered and accredited (DNA & Firearms) by this crime laboratory. The most significant impact of training forensic scientists is at the journeyman level. Journeyman level forensic scientists must stay abreast of the advances in forensic science as new technology; equipment, methods, and laboratory techniques are developed for use in the forensic laboratory.

The California State Auditor's report of December 1998 Forensic

Laboratories: Many Face Challenges beyond Accreditation to Assure the

Highest Quality Services provided an assessment of California's forensic

laboratories and recommendations to address deficiencies noted during the audit. The report concluded, among other issues, that many of the state's

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forensic laboratories could improve efficiency by providing comprehensive training programs for their staff of professional scientists.

While training programs exist in a variety of forms, the California State

Auditor's report specifically noted in their conclusions and recommendations
that forensic laboratories need to develop, implement, and document formal
training programs, broaden the scope of the training, build on existing resources
within the state, and provide adequate funding to accomplish the goal.

In Guidelines for Forensic Laboratory Management Practices, the ISO 17025 guideline outlines the responsibilities of forensic laboratory managers to obtain the best performance from their professional employees. Foremost among these management responsibilities are training employees in the principles of forensic science, maintaining employee skills and competency, and fostering staff development.

In the report, California Attorney General Bill Lockyer's 2003 Task Force on Forensic Services, data from every forensic laboratory in California provided a snapshot of the needs relative to providing quality forensic services to police and prosecution. The report states in part, "Forensic Science is clearly not a static field. One of the implications of just about every trend in forensic science is

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the need for ongoing training and education of professional staff. Many of today's technologies were not in use when current practitioners of forensic science were in school. Advanced degrees will soon be required for those who wish to reach the top levels in their specialties. Beyond training for existing examiners, the ever-growing forensic community needs a pool of properly educated candidates.<sup>1</sup> "

The California Crime Laboratory Review Task Force (pursuant to AB 1079, codified as PC § 11062) is charged with a thorough review of California's state, county and local crime laboratories. The Task Force report issued in November 2009 also supports a strong education and training program for qualifying staff.

Providing training opportunities for the crime laboratory's forensic scientists is a problem that will be addressed and funded by the Coverdell 2020 Program.

#### **Equipment Problem**

The firearms section of the laboratory currently has three comparison microscopes, two of which are several years old. With the addition of our new Firearms Criminalist we now have a bottleneck in the analysis process as

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examiners have to share microscopes due to scopes being out of service. With

the 2020 Coverdell funding the Laboratory intends to purchase a equipment

upgrades for the older comparison microscope in the firearms unit. The total

cost for the equipment component of the Coverdell 2020 Program is \$41,535.

**Crime Laboratory Profile** 

The crime laboratory is accredited by the ANAB. The crime laboratory

holds accreditation certificate number FT-0058.

The assessment of the laboratory's forensic science capabilities shows the

crime laboratory has an infrastructure and experienced staff able to deliver

quality forensic services to the criminal justice community in Fresno County.

The Crime Laboratory is comprised of the following staff:

(1) Crime Laboratory Director

(0) Supervising Criminalists

(7) Criminalist Specialists (Advanced Journey level)

(0) Level II Criminalists (Intermediate Journey level)

(1) Level I Criminalists

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(1) Non-technical Support Staff

Qualifying full-time scientists (including Supervising Criminalist and the laboratory director/project manager) comprise the technical staff that currently numbers ten (10).

The Crime Laboratory is organized into three technical units: Biology,
Chemistry, and Firearms, and the laboratory administration which includes the
director, DNA Technical Leader, Firearms Technical Leader, Controlled
Substance Technical Leader and Quality Assurance Manager.

The level of complexity of forensic casework has increased significantly in recent years as judges and juries become more sophisticated in their understanding of the capabilities of forensic science. There is an expectation on the part of the jury that a complete and thorough scientific analysis of the physical evidence must be conducted by trained and knowledgeable forensic scientists. Hand-in-hand with the scientific analysis of physical evidence and scientist expertise are the capabilities of the Crime Laboratory.

The Crime Laboratory is equipped with over \$1 million of modern laboratory instruments designed to analyze drugs, and biological specimens for DNA profiling, and firearms evidence.

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<u>Plan</u>

The crime laboratory plans to provide continuing education and training in technical and professional skills to the laboratory's forensic scientists in order to improve their level of expertise, ensure that they effectively and efficiently conduct their laboratory work; and, in turn maintain quality and reduce case turnaround time.

Knowledge, training and experience are among the most important attributes of a forensic scientist. These are often combined under the general heading of "expertise." The crime laboratory has had to seek out and provide training opportunities to qualifying scientists in order to develop and maintain expertise and proficiency in their current assignment or discipline.

The intent of the laboratory's Professional Development Program is to: 1) develop the knowledge, skills, and abilities of the laboratory staff in order to ensure continuous quality improvement of their work product; 2) create a positive workplace environment; and 3) maintain the laboratory's prominence in the forensic science community.

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Subrecipient: Fresno County

Professional forensic scientists working at the bench level need to keep up to date on new developments in the forensic field through continuing education, which typically is comprised of two components: theoretical and practical.

Theoretical training focuses on the knowledge a scientist needs to understand his/her job in the forensic laboratory. Theoretical training may cover such topics as how a particular analytical method or piece of equipment works and generally consists of specialized or university-level educational courses.

Practical training provides the scientist with the skill set and an ability to successfully perform his/her job in the forensic laboratory and generally consists of external, short informational courses or workshops from a variety of sources. It was recommended in *Forensic Sciences: Review of Status and Needs*<sup>2</sup> that in addition to theoretical and practical training all forensic scientists should have formal quality assurance and expert witness training.

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Combined, these two training components – theoretical and practical – are expected to improve an analyst's quality of casework and their ability to efficiently turnaround cases in a shorter time period.

Maintaining a well-trained staff of professional forensic scientists at the Crime Laboratory improves the quality of forensic services, expands the knowledge base of forensic scientists within functional areas, and reduces case turnaround times by virtue of employing well trained forensic scientists with appropriate skill sets to complete the work as expediently as can reasonably be expected.

The equipment used in the laboratory is also extremely important. The firearms section of the laboratory is in need of an additional comparison microscope. This will eliminate a bottleneck in the analysis process and decrease our turnaround time and increase our efficiency.

The Coverdell 2020 Program will provide the crime laboratory with funds for the continuing education/training and equipment needs of the laboratory to enhance of quality of forensic services. Some of the opportunities identified by the Laboratory's Director for continuing education/training include the symposia of professional forensic science organizations, staff development seminars

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provided by government agencies, drug enforcement seminars, the California Criminalistics Institute, and courses provided by equipment manufacturers, laboratory sponsored seminars and conferences, and/or university level courses. The equipment identified as being needed for not only health and safety of the Criminalists within the lab, but also for the efficiency and quality of the services being provided by the firearms unit within the laboratory.

<u>Implementation</u>

ANAB accredits the crime laboratory to the ISO 17025:2017 standard. The laboratory received its Certificate of Re-Accreditation, number FT-0058, on October 24, 2018 and it expires on 10/31/2022. The laboratory is accredited in Firearms/Toolmark, which is the area that funds will be used to provide training. The crime laboratory uses generally accepted laboratory practices and analytical procedures to conduct the analysis of forensic evidence in accordance with accreditation guidelines.

In order to maintain accreditation, the Crime Laboratory must submit a new application for accreditation every four years, and undergo on-site inspections. The 2018 Accreditation inspection was the crime laboratory fourth

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on-site inspection for an accreditation assessment under the ISO 17025:2017

guidelines.




