## **BOARD PRIORITIES**

### "Do It Right The First Time"

- ✓ Short-term projects with long-term impacts
- ✓ Focus on County assets (own vs. lease)
- ✓ Improve Efficiency/Longevity
- Technology (data sharing, business intelligence)
- ✓ Facility Improvements
  - Infrastructure Improvements (shovel-ready projects)

### STATE LOCAL FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS

County received <u>\$194,063,657</u> in two installments

- ✓ <u>\$97,031,829</u> received on June 17, 2021
- ✓ <u>\$97,031,828</u> received on June 21, 2022
- As of October 28, 2022, County's SLFRF expenditures amount to <u>\$46,470,373</u>
- ✓ Funds must be fully allocated by **December 31, 2024**
- All funded projects must be complete, and funds expended by <u>December 31, 2026</u>

# ELIGIBLE USE CATEGORIES

# Category "A"

Support Public Health: Response Fund Covid-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff Address Negative Economic Impacts: Respond to economic harms to workers, families, small businesses, impacted industries and the public sector

# Category "C"



Replace Public Sector Revenue Loss: Use funds to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic

# Category "B"

Premium Pay for Essential Workers: Offer additional support to those who have and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure sectors (up to \$13/hr increase with a cap not to exceed \$25k)

# Category "D"



Water and Sewer Infrastructure: Make necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water and invest in wastewater and storm drain infrastructure

Broadband: Make necessary investments to provide unserved or underserved locations with new or expanded broadband access

### **ARPA PROGRAM'S RESTRICTIONS**

### Funds may not be used for:

- ✓ Costs incurred before March 3, 2021
- ✓ Deposits into pension funds
- Debt service, replenishing rainy day funds/financial reserves, or satisfaction of a settlement or judgement
- To undermine COVID-19 mitigation practices in line with CDC guidance and recommendations
