VIII. Civil Rights Compliance

The Subrecipient complies will all laws that prohibit excluding, denying or discriminating against any person based on actual or perceived race, color, national origin, disability, religion, age, sex, gender identity, and sexual orientation in both the delivery of services and employment practices and does not use federal financial assistance to engage in explicitly religious activities.

IX. Special Conditions for Grant Subaward with Forensic Science Improvement Act (FSIA) Funds

1. Requirements of the Subaward; remedies for non-compliance or for materially false statements

The conditions of this Subaward are material requirements of the Subaward. Compliance with any certifications or assurances submitted by or on behalf of the Subrecipient that relate to conduct during the period of performance also is a material requirement of this Subaward.

Failure to comply with any one or more of these Subaward requirements, whether a condition set out in full below, a condition incorporated by reference below, or a certification or assurance related to conduct during the Subaward period, may result in the Office of Justice Programs ("OJP") taking appropriate action with respect to the Subrecipient and the Subaward. Among other things, the OJP may withhold Subaward funds, disallow costs, or suspend or terminate the Subaward. The Department of Justice ("DOJ"), including OJP, also may take other legal action as appropriate.

Any materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement to the federal government related to this Subaward (or concealment or omission of a material fact) may be the subject of criminal prosecution (including under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or 1621, and/or 34 U.S.C. 10271-10273), and also may lead to imposition of civil penalties and administrative remedies for false claims or otherwise (including under 31 U.S.C. 3729-3730 and 3801-3812).

Should any provision of a requirement of this Subaward be held to be invalid or unenforceable by its terms, that provision shall first be applied with a limited construction so as to give it the maximum effect permitted by law. Should it be held, instead, that the provision is utterly invalid or unenforceable; such provision shall be deemed severable from this Subaward.

2. Applicability of Part 200 Uniform Requirements

The Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements in 2 C.F.R. Part 200, as adopted and supplemented by DOJ in 2 C.F.R. Part 2800 (together, the "Part 200 Uniform Requirements") apply to this FY 2018 Subaward from Cal OES.

The Part 200 Uniform Requirements were first adopted by DOJ on December 26, 2014. 3. Record retention and access

5. Reclassification of various statutory provisions to a new Title 34 of the United States Code

On September 1, 2017, various statutory provisions previously codified elsewhere in the U.S. Code were editorially reclassified to a new Title 34, entitled "Crime Control and Law Enforcement." The reclassification encompassed a number of statutory provisions pertinent to OJP Subawards (that is, OJP grants and cooperative agreements), including many provisions previously codified in Title 42 of the U.S. Code.

15. Restrictions on "lobbying"

In general, as a matter of federal law, federal funds Subawarded by OJP may not be used by the Subrecipient, or any Subrecipient at any tier, either directly or indirectly, to support or oppose the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government. See 18 U.S.C. 1913. (There may be exceptions if an applicable federal statute specifically authorizes certain activities that otherwise would be barred by law.)

Another federal law generally prohibits federal funds Subawarded by Cal OES from being used by the Subrecipient, or any Subrecipient at any tier, to pay any person to influence (or attempt to influence) a federal agency, a Member of Congress, or Congress (or an official or employee of any of them) with respect to the Subawarding of a federal grant or cooperative agreement, subgrant, contract, subcontract, or loan, or with respect to actions such as renewing, extending, or modifying any such Subaward. 17. Reporting Potential Fraud, Waste, and Abuse, and Similar Misconduct

The Subrecipient must promptly refer to Cal OES any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, Subrecipient, contractor, subcontractor, or other person has, in connection with funds under this Subaward (1) submitted a claim that violates the False Claims Act; or (2) committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct.

Potential fraud, waste, abuse, or misconduct involving or relating to funds under this Subaward should be reported to Cal OES.

18. Restrictions and certifications regarding non-disclosure agreements and related matters

No Subrecipient under this Subaward, or entity that receives a procurement contract or subcontract with any funds under this Subaward, may require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information.

The foregoing is not intended, and shall not be understood by the agency making this Subaward, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

1. In accepting this Subaward, the Subrecipient

a. represents that it neither requires nor has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and

b. certifies that, if it learns or is notified that it is or has been requiring its employees or contractors to execute agreements or statements that prohibit or otherwise restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict), reporting of waste, fraud, or abuse as described above, it will immediately stop any further obligations of Subaward funds, will provide prompt notification to Cal OES, and will resume (or permit resumption of) such obligations only if expressly authorized to do so by Cal OES.

2. If the Subrecipient does or is authorized under this Subaward to make Subawards, procurement contracts, or both

The Subrecipient, and any Subrecipient at any tier, must comply with, and is subject to, all applicable provisions of 41 U.S.C. 4712, including all applicable provisions that prohibit, under specified circumstances, discrimination against an employee as reprisal for the employee's disclosure of information related to gross mismanagement of a federal grant, a gross waste of federal funds, an abuse of authority relating to a federal grant, a substantial and specific danger to public health or safety, or a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a federal grant.

The Subrecipient also must inform its employees, in writing (and in the predominant native language of the workforce), of employee rights and remedies under 41 U.S.C. 4712.

Should a question arise as to the applicability of the provisions of 41 U.S.C. 4712 to this Subaward, the Subrecipient is to contact Cal OES for guidance.

20. Encouragement of policies to ban text messaging while driving

Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," 74 Fed. Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), DOJ encourages Subrecipients to adopt and enforce policies banning employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this Subaward, and to establish workplace safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.

21. Accreditation

Subrecipients, not including any medical examiner's office or coroner's office shall do one of the following:

- 1) if accredited, must continue to demonstrate such accreditation as a condition of receiving or using the Subaward funds; or,
- 2) if not accredited, must use the Subaward funds to prepare and apply for accreditation.

22. Use of Funds; No Research

Use of Subaward funds for construction of new facilities is restricted by statute. Performance Measures

To ensure compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (Pub. L. No. 103-62) and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-352), program performance under this Subaward is measured by the following:

- percent reduction in the average number of days from the submission of a sample to a forensic science laboratory to the delivery of test results to a requesting office or agency (calculated by reporting the average number of days to process a sample at the beginning of the grant Subaward performance period versus the average number of days to process a sample at the end of the grant Subaward performance period);
- 2) percent reduction in the number of backlogged forensic cases (calculated by reporting the number of backlogged forensic cases at the beginning of the grant Subaward performance period versus the number of backlogged forensic cases at the end of grant Subaward performance period), if applicable to the Subaward; and
- 3) the number of forensic science or medical examiner/coroner's office personnel who completed appropriate training or educational opportunities with these Coverdell funds, if applicable to the Subaward. Subrecipients are required to collect and report data relevant to these measures.
- 23. The Subrecipient acknowledges that, as stated in the RFA for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program, Cal OES assumes that Subrecipients of Coverdell funds will make use of the process referenced in their certification as to external investigations and will refer allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results to government entities with an appropriate process in place to conduct independent external investigations, such as the government entity (or entities) identified in the grant application. The Subrecipient shall submit the following information as part of its final report: (1) the number and nature of any allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results received during the period of the Subaward; (2) information on the referrals of such allegations (e.g., the government entity or entities to which referred, the date of referral); (3) the outcome of such referrals (if known as of the date of the report); and (4) if any such allegations were not referred, the reason(s) for the non-referral. Should the project period for this Subaward be extended, the Subrecipient shall submit the above information as to the first twelve months of the Subaward as part of the first semi-annual progress report that comes due after the conclusion of the first twelve months of the project period, and shall submit the required information as to subsequent twelve-month periods every twelve months thereafter (as part of a semi-annual progress report) until the close of the grant Subaward performance period, at which point the Subrecipient shall submit the required information as to any period not covered by prior reports as part of its final report. The Subrecipient understands and agrees that funds may be withheld (including funds under future Subawards), or other related requirements may be imposed, if the required information is not submitted on a timely basis.

- 24. The Subrecipient agrees to cooperate with any assessments, national evaluation efforts, or information or data collection requests, including, but not limited to, the provision of any information required for the assessment or evaluation of any activities within this project.
- 25. To assist in information sharing, the Subaward Subrecipient shall provide the Cal OES Program Specialist with a copy of publications (including those prepared for conferences and other presentations) resulting from this Subaward, prior to or simultaneous with their public release. NIJ defines publications as any written, visual or sound material substantively based on the project, formally prepared by the Subaward Subrecipient for dissemination to the public. Submission of publications prior to or simultaneous with their public release aids Cal OES in responding to any inquiries that may arise. Any publications excluding press releases and newsletters whether published at the Subrecipient's or government's expense, shall contain the following statement: "This project was supported by Award No. _______, awarded by the National Institute of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice. The opinions, findings, and conclusions or recommendations expressed in this publication/program/exhibition are those of the author(s) and do not necessarily reflect those of the Department of Justice." This statement shall appear on the first page of written publications. For audio and video publications, it shall be included immediately after the title of the publication in the audio or video file.
- 26. The Subrecipient shall transmit to the Cal OES Program Specialist copies of all official Subaward-related press releases at least ten (10) working days prior to public release. Advance notice permits time for coordination of release of information by Cal OES where appropriate and to respond to press or public inquiries.

27. Copyright; Data rights

The Subrecipient acknowledges that OJP reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and authorize others to use (in whole or in part, including in connection with derivative works), for Federal purposes: (1) any work subject to copyright developed under Subaward; and (2) any rights of copyright to which a Subrecipient purchases ownership with Federal support.

The Subrecipient acknowledges that OJP has the right to (1) obtain, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the data first produced under a Subaward; and (2) authorize others to receive, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use such data for Federal purposes. "Data" includes data as defined in Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) provision 52.227-14 (Rights in Data - General).

It is the responsibility of the Subrecipient to ensure that this condition is included in any Subaward under this Subaward.

The Subrecipient has the responsibility to obtain from Subrecipients, contractors, and subcontractors (if any) all rights and data necessary to fulfill the Subrecipient's obligations to the Government under this Subaward. If a proposed Subrecipient, contractor, or subcontractor refuses to accept terms affording the Government such rights, the Subrecipient shall promptly bring such refusal to the attention of the Cal OES Program Specialist for the Subaward and not proceed with the agreement in question without further authorization from Cal OES.

28. Justification of consultant rate

Approval of this Subaward does not indicate approval of any consultant rate in excess of \$650 per day. A detailed justification must be submitted to Cal OES and approved by the OJP program office prior to obligation or expenditure of such funds.

29. The Subrecipient agrees to comply with all Federal, State, and local environmental laws and regulations applicable to the development and implementation of the activities to be funded under this Subaward.

- 32. The Subrecipient may not obligate, expend, or draw down any funds under this Subaward until a revised budget reflecting the final Subaward amount has been received and approved by the National Institute of Justice, and a Grant Adjustment Notice (GAN) has been issued removing this condition.
- 33. The Subrecipient agrees promptly to provide, upon request, financial or programmatic-related documentation related to this Subaward, including documentation of expenditures and achievements.
- 34. The Subrecipient understands that it will be subject to additional financial and programmatic on-site monitoring, which may be on short notice, and agrees that it will cooperate with any such monitoring.
- 35. The Subrecipient must follow the guidelines outlines in the most current version of the Cal OES Subrecipient Handbook.

All appropriate documentation must be maintained on file by the project and available for Cal OES or public scrutiny upon request. Budget Narrative

The Fresno County Sheriff's Office Forensic Laboratory (hereafter referred to as crime laboratory) developed a budget that supports the goal of the Coverdell 2018 Program to improve the quality, timeliness, and credibility of forensic science services for criminal justice purposes.

The Coverdell 2018 Program requires maintenance of this laboratory's accreditation status. ANAB is our accreditation provider and the ISO 17025 Guideline 5.2 Training and Development state that the training and development of employees must be emphasized to improve accuracy, increase productivity, and enable them to assume greater responsibility. Included under Guideline 5.2 are standards important to the Coverdell 2018 Program. They are standards:

5.2.1 The agency management shall ensure the competence of all who operate specific equipment, perform tests and/or calibrations, evaluate results, and sign test reports and calibration certificates. When using staff that is undergoing training, appropriate supervision shall be provided. A training program to develop the technical skills of employees is essential in each applicable discipline and sub discipline.

ANAB goes on further to state examiners must have mastery of the theory, procedures, and techniques necessary to produce reliable results and conclusions; and, under criteria for each functional area of expertise that examiners must have education and experience/training commensurate with the examinations and testimony they provide. A baccalaureate degree in a natural science, Criminalistics, or closely related field is required.

The crime laboratory has met or exceeded the ANAB ISO 17025 criteria delineated above by hiring qualified staff that meets the educational degree requirement. The ISO 17025 criteria is also met through the operation of the laboratory's professional development program, the training programs described in each laboratory procedures manual, and the specific training needs of the management and the individual technical units within the laboratory.

Mindful of the ANAB accreditation criteria and in accordance with the crime laboratory's Professional Development Program and Coverdell 2018 Program, the crime laboratory identified the appropriate training in technical and personal skills for the laboratory's qualifying forensic scientists. The training needs of this crime laboratory are extensive, they are necessary to stay abreast of the advances in forensic science, and they span the broad spectrum of forensic services offered by this crime laboratory.

Two (2) full-time qualifying forensic scientists are designated to receive training under the Coverdell 2018 Program. The qualifying forensic scientists include candidates from forensic Laboratory Criminalist classifications. The series classification is described as follows:

The classification of Criminalist has three levels that are assigned at the crime laboratory director's discretion in accordance with budget provisions, workload, organizational needs, and the individual's expertise and skill. The criminalist must have graduated from a four-year college or university with a major in chemistry, biochemistry, physics, pharmacology, biology, microbiology, criminalistics (with an emphasis in chemistry) or a closely related scientific field. Coursework must have included successful completion of 24 semester units of chemistry including qualitative analysis.

The training program identified in this budget is intended to improve the management of the crime laboratory's caseload as well as the crime laboratory's turnaround time in the targeted areas of analysis by maintaining a well-trained staff of professional forensic scientists, improving the quality of forensic services, and expanding the knowledge base of forensic scientists within functional areas with appropriate skill sets to complete the work as expediently as can reasonably be expected.

This training will be identified by the Crime laboratory's director, using various Quality Assurance Guidelines and training manuals. Training will consist of paying for two Criminalists to go to the AFTE 2019 Conference for the Firearms / Toolmark unit.

The firearms section of the laboratory is currently performing its test firing within one of the working lab spaces, not a dedicated range. This is a safety and health risk to the firearms examiners within the laboratory. In order to correct this issue, we are requesting funding to purchase a Self-Contained Portable Lab (Shooting Range) to be placed outside of the laboratory facility. This will allow test firing in a controlled space that is properly lighted and ventilated for this purpose. This will support the goals of the 2018 Coverdell Program by making the firearms unit more efficient and improve the quality of the work environment for the Firearms Analysts.

Travel Costs Associated with the Training Program

Travel costs are based on the travel policy guidelines of Fresno County, past history of travel expenditures as well as projected allowable costs for travel and per diem.

Project Narrative

Problem Statement

Training and continuing education of the staff of the Fresno County Sheriff's Office

Forensic Laboratory (hereafter referred to as crime laboratory) is currently not being met due to
training needs that exceed the existing funds available for crime laboratory personnel. Secondly,
the firearms section of the laboratory is currently performing its test firing within one of the
working lab spaces, not a dedicated range. This is a safety and health risk as well as inefficient
for the firearms examiners within the laboratory.

The goal of the Coverdell Forensic Sciences Improvement Program (hereafter referred to as Coverdell 2018 Program) is to improve the quality, timeliness, and credibility of forensic services over current operations of the crime laboratory.

Training Problem

Providing continuing education and training to this laboratory's experienced scientists ensures that the crime laboratory delivers the highest quality, most efficient, and timely forensic services while improving the quality of forensic services to Fresno County's criminal justice community.

The training and educational needs of the scientists working the forensic cases goes to the core of the crime laboratory's efforts to provide quality, credible and timely forensic services to Fresno County. The training needs of the crime laboratory are extensive and span the areas of forensic services offered and accredited (DNA & Firearms) by this crime laboratory. The most significant impact of training forensic scientists is at the journeyman level. Journeyman level forensic scientists must stay abreast of the advances in forensic science as new technology; equipment, methods, and laboratory techniques are developed for use in the forensic laboratory.

The California State Auditor's report of December 1998 Forensic Laboratories: Many
Face Challenges beyond Accreditation to Assure the Highest Quality Services provided an

assessment of California's forensic laboratories and recommendations to address deficiencies noted during the audit. The report concluded, among other issues, that many of the state's forensic laboratories could improve efficiency by providing comprehensive training programs for their staff of professional scientists.

While training programs exist in a variety of forms, the California State Auditor's report specifically noted in their conclusions and recommendations that forensic laboratories need to develop, implement, and document formal training programs, broaden the scope of the training, build on existing resources within the state, and provide adequate funding to accomplish the goal.

In Guidelines for Forensic Laboratory Management Practices, the ISO 17025 guideline outlines the responsibilities of forensic laboratory managers to obtain the best performance from their professional employees. Foremost among these management responsibilities are training employees in the principles of forensic science, maintaining employee skills and competency, and fostering staff development.

In the report, California Attorney General Bill Lockyer's 2003 Task Force on Forensic Services, data from every forensic laboratory in California provided a snapshot of the needs relative to providing quality forensic services to police and prosecution. The report states in part, "Forensic Science is clearly not a static field. One of the implications of just about every trend in forensic science is the need for ongoing training and education of professional staff. Many of today's technologies were not in use when current practitioners of forensic science were in school. Advanced degrees will soon be required for those who wish to reach the top levels in their specialties. Beyond training for existing examiners, the ever-growing forensic community needs a pool of properly educated candidates.¹"

The California Crime Laboratory Review Task Force (pursuant to AB 1079, codified as PC § 11062) is charged with a thorough review of California's state, county and local crime laboratories. The Task Force report issued in November 2009 also supports a strong education and training program for qualifying staff.

Providing training opportunities for the crime laboratory's forensic scientists is a problem that will be addressed and funded by the Coverdell 2018 Program.

Equipment Problem

The firearms section of the laboratory is currently performing its test firing within one of the working lab spaces, not a dedicated range. This is a safety and health risk to the firearms examiners within the laboratory. In order to correct this issue, we are requesting funding to purchase a Self-Contained Portable Lab (Shooting Range) to be placed outside of the laboratory facility. This will allow test firing in a controlled space that is properly lighted and ventilated and set up specifically for this purpose. This will support the goals of the 2018 Coverdell Program by making the firearms unit more efficient and improve the quality of the work environment for the Firearms Analysts.

Crime Laboratory Profile

The crime laboratory is accredited by the ANAB. The crime laboratory holds accreditation certificate number FT-0058.

The assessment of the laboratory's forensic science capabilities shows the crime laboratory has an infrastructure and experienced staff able to deliver quality forensic services to the criminal justice community in Fresno County.

The Crime Laboratory is comprised of the following staff:

- (1) Crime Laboratory Director
- (0) Supervising Criminalists
- (6) Criminalist Specialists (Advanced Journey level)
- (1) Level II Criminalists (Intermediate Journey level)

(1) Level I Criminalists

(1) Non-technical Support Staff

Qualifying full-time scientists (including Supervising Criminalist and the laboratory director/project manager) comprise the technical staff that currently numbers ten (10).

The Crime Laboratory is organized into three technical units: Biology, Chemistry, and Firearms, and the laboratory administration which includes the director, DNA Technical Leader, Firearms Technical Leader, Controlled Substance Technical Leader and Quality Assurance Manager.

The level of complexity of forensic casework has increased significantly in recent years as judges and juries become more sophisticated in their understanding of the capabilities of forensic science. There is an expectation on the part of the jury that a complete and thorough scientific analysis of the physical evidence must be conducted by trained and knowledgeable forensic scientists. Hand-in-hand with the scientific analysis of physical evidence and scientist expertise are the capabilities of the Crime Laboratory.

The Crime Laboratory is equipped with over \$1 million of modern laboratory instruments designed to analyze drugs, and biological specimens for DNA profiling, and firearms evidence.

Plan

The crime laboratory plans to provide continuing education and training in technical and professional skills to the laboratory's forensic scientists in order to improve their level of expertise, ensure that they effectively and efficiently conduct their laboratory work; and, in turn maintain quality and reduce case turnaround time.

Knowledge, training and experience are among the most important attributes of a forensic scientist. These are often combined under the general heading of "expertise." The crime laboratory has had to seek out and provide training opportunities to qualifying scientists in order to develop and maintain expertise and proficiency in their current assignment or discipline.

The intent of the laboratory's Professional Development Program is to: 1) develop the knowledge, skills, and abilities of the laboratory staff in order to ensure continuous quality improvement of their work product; 2) create a positive workplace environment; and 3) maintain the laboratory's prominence in the forensic science community.

Professional forensic scientists working at the bench level need to keep up to date on new developments in the forensic field through continuing education, which typically is comprised of two components: theoretical and practical.

Theoretical training focuses on the knowledge a scientist needs to understand his/her job in the forensic laboratory. Theoretical training may cover such topics as how a particular analytical method or piece of equipment works and generally consists of specialized or university-level educational courses.

Practical training provides the scientist with the skill set and an ability to successfully perform his/her job in the forensic laboratory and generally consists of external, short informational courses or workshops from a variety of sources. It was recommended in *Forensic Sciences: Review of Status and Needs*² that in addition to theoretical and practical training all forensic scientists should have formal quality assurance and expert witness training.

Combined, these two training components – theoretical and practical – are expected to improve an analyst's quality of casework and their ability to efficiently turnaround cases in a shorter time period.

Maintaining a well-trained staff of professional forensic scientists at the Crime Laboratory improves the quality of forensic services, expands the knowledge base of forensic scientists within functional areas, and reduces case turnaround times by virtue of employing well trained forensic scientists with appropriate skill sets to complete the work as expediently as can reasonably be expected.

The equipment used in the laboratory is also extremely important. The firearms section of the laboratory is currently performing its test firing within one of the working lab spaces, not a dedicated range. This is a safety and health risk to the firearms examiners within the laboratory. In order to correct this issue, we are requesting funding to purchase a Self-Contained Portable Lab (Shooting Range) to be placed outside of the laboratory facility. This will allow test firing in a controlled space that is properly lighted and ventilated for this purpose. This will support the goals of the 2018 Coverdell Program by making the firearms unit more efficient and improve the quality of the work environment for the Firearms Analysts.

The Coverdell 2018 Program will provide the crime laboratory with funds for the continuing education/training and equipment needs of the laboratory to enhance of quality of forensic services. Some of the opportunities identified by the Laboratory's Director for continuing education/training include the symposia of professional forensic science organizations, staff development seminars provided by government agencies, drug enforcement seminars, the California Criminalistics Institute, and courses provided by equipment manufacturers, laboratory sponsored seminars and conferences, and/or university level courses. The equipment identified as being needed for not only health and safety of the Criminalists within the lab, but also for the efficiency and quality of the services being provided by the firearms unit within the laboratory. Implementation

ANAB accredits the crime laboratory to the ISO 17025 standard. The laboratory received its Certificate of Re-Accreditation, number FT-0058, on October 24, 2018 and it expires on 10/31/2022. The laboratory is accredited in Firearms/Toolmark, which is the area that funds will be used to provide training. The crime laboratory uses generally accepted laboratory practices and analytical procedures to conduct the analysis of forensic evidence in accordance with accreditation guidelines.

In order to maintain accreditation, the Crime Laboratory must submit a new application for accreditation every four years, and undergo on-site inspections. The 2018 Accreditation

inspections was the crime laboratory fourth on-site inspection for an accreditation assessment under the ISO 17025:2005 guidelines.

Certification of External Investigation

The Director of the Fresno County Sheriff's Office Forensic Laboratory certifies that the Fresno County Sheriff's Office Internal Affairs Unit exists external to the crime laboratory's administration and an appropriate written process is in place to conduct independent external investigations. The crime laboratory agrees to notify Cal EMA Coverdell Program staff regarding any and all complaints or allegations of serious negligence or misconduct by employees or contractors substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results. At the conclusion of the investigative review process by the Sheriff's Office Internal Affairs Unit (an investigative body external to the crime laboratory) the crime laboratory director will notify Cal EMA Coverdell Program staff as to the resolution and that the matter has been resolved.

Program Objectives

There are two program objectives relative to the Coverdell 2018 Program:

- Provide educational opportunities and appropriate training for qualified forensic scientists.
- Purchase and install a Self-Contained Portable Lab (Shooting Range)

The grant objective is the training of laboratory staff. During the grant period two (2) qualifying forensic scientists will attend training and educational programs covering the Firearms forensic discipline. Secondly, we will purchase and install a Self-Contained Portable Lab (Shooting Range) for use by the firearms staff members.

The crime laboratory maintains a comprehensive training program as documented in the procedures manuals of each discipline. In addition the Sheriff's Office Training Unit tracks the training of all members of the Sheriff's Office. The crime laboratory's established training programs were used as references to determine the specific training and educational needs of the laboratory's qualifying forensic scientists.




