HEAP & CESH PLANNING HISTORY

Senate Bill 850 Requires a Collaborative Application Process

- June 2018 Senate Bill 850 established the HEAP and CESH program. Notice of Funding Availability, September 5, 2018 - "Continuums of Care are the only eligible applicants for HEAP CoC funding."
- The CESH application required a designated Administrative Entity to administer CESH program funds as well as verification that the plan was developed in collaboration with the CoC.
- August 2018 An FMCoC ad hoc committee was formed to develop a spending plan for HEAP and CESH funds.
- October 2018 The FMCoC approved a HEAP and CESH funding timeline.
- Late 2018 The FMCoC funding plan was incorporated into the HEAP and CESH applications.
- Early 2019 DSS released RFPs for HEAP and CESH services.
- Future State allocations for homeless services will build on the current homeless funding plan.

A COMPREHENSIVE CONTINUUM OF SERVICES

From Homelessness to Permanent Housing Stability

- HEAP and CESH homeless services A path from homelessness to permanent housing stability.
- Shelter diversion Identifying safe alternatives to emergency shelter.
- Emergency shelter (Triage Center) Low-barrier overnight shelter with housing-focused services.
- Transitional housing (Bridge Housing) Overnight shelter for households that are preparing for placement in permanent housing.
- Case management (Expanded Coordinated Entry) to assist homeless households navigate the system, from entry to permanent housing.
- Immediate housing placement and short-term rental assistance (Rapid Rehousing).
- Landlord Risk Mitigation Fund Added protection for landlords renting private units to households experiencing homelessness.
- Homeless Planning Activities A plan to address homelessness for victims of domestic violence and the City/County of Madera.
- Homeless Youth Services Services for youth, ages 18 24.
