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

The Children's Advocates Round Table

The mission of the Children's Advocates Roundtable is to address current issues affecting children and families in Fresno County primarily through multi-disciplinary collaborative discussion and implementation of change within the systems of child abuse prevention, intervention and treatment. The focus of the Roundtables this fiscal year was Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Disorder and other substance exposures because 80% of all child maltreatment cases involves substance abuse.





Helping families thrive:

SEPTEMBER 2018 – FCCAP invited Mary Thielscher, an educator and child advocate with Center for Family Strengthening in San Luis Obispo County, to present on FASD – Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Disorder – to address reported increases of prenatal substance abuse in Fresno County. Mary teaches "The Effects of Alcohol and Drugs on your Pregnancy" to all freshman in high school in a mandatory Health Education course which is the best example of primary prevention for reducing prenatal substance abuse and exposure. FCCAP is looking to replicate this program locally.

DECEMBER 2018 – FCCAP Executive Director, Esther Franco, presented on FASD Awareness - Part II as a follow up to the September Roundtable targeting stakeholders who work with children and mothers with prenatal substance exposure history. The objective was to coordinate community efforts to begin an annual awareness campaign on the benefits of healthy pregnancy by educating professionals and women of child bearing age on the consequences of prenatal exposure to alcohol and other harmful substances such as marijuana, opiates, cocaine and methamphetamine. Franco included a report from attending a conference by Dr. Ira Chasnoff; "Marijuana, Alcohol & Pregnancy: Implications for Infant & Childhood Outcomes." Because 80% of all child abuse and neglect cases involves substance abuse, FCCAP has been leading the discussion on this topic.





MARCH 2019 – Through a grant from OCAP, FCCAP was able to bring Lisa Frederiksen, a National Keynote Speaker, Trainer, Consultant, & Founder of BreakingTheCycles.com for an extended format of our Roundtable to create a conference on; "Building Resilience Through Understanding Substance Abuse & Addiction." Frederiksen has authored 11 books and has spent 14 years researching, writing, speaking and consulting on substance abuse prevention, ACEs, trauma, mental illness, and related subjects centered around 21st century brain and addiction related research. Feedback from this conference was great, here's one example from a participant, "The Lisa Frederiksen presentation in March was incredible, I would appreciate her return so that I can recommend to those I know would benefit from it. I would consider it a life changer, I have told those around me, I walked away from the presentation five emotional pounds lighter! It definitely impacted how I approach children. JUNE 2019 – 'Understanding the Effects of Pornography on Children" was chosen as a topic because of a timely report from Google Analytics stating that pornography searches increase by 4,700% when children are out of school. The average child is now accessing "porn" between the ages of 8 to 11 and the age at highest risk for addiction is teenage boys ages 12 to 17. Karen Huckaby, MA, AMFT, the YouthSTAR Director with Roubicek & Thacker Counseling presented on how parents must talk to their teens about Internet pornography in order to shield them from the risk of addiction – which is alarmingly similar to drug or alcohol addiction. We cannot allow pornography to play a role in sex education.



FCCAP MISSION

In 1995, the Fresno County Board of Supervisors appointed FCCAP as the Child Abuse Prevention Council (CAPC) for Fresno County. CAPCs are legislated in the Welfare and Institutions Code section 18980 of the State of California mandating every county (58) establish a CAPC to carry out specific legislated functions within that county. CAPC's were created in response to the Legislature's findings that the prevention of child abuse requires the involvement of the entire community. Accordingly, every CAPC mission is **to coordinate community efforts to prevent and respond to child abuse and neglect, which includes these objectives:**

- Provide a forum for interagency cooperation and coordination in the prevention, detection, treatment, and legal processing of child abuse cases.
- Promote public awareness of the abuse and neglect of children and the resources available for intervention and treatment.
- Encourage and facilitate training of professionals in the detection, treatment, and prevention of child abuse and neglect
- Recommend improvements in services to families and victims
- Encourage and facilitate community support for child abuse and neglect programs.



October is Safe Sleep & SIDS Awareness Month.



Although Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) and Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID) is not a child abuse/neglect issue, it is the number one cause of death of infants from one month to one year of age in Fresno County, and across the United States. That is why FCCAP assisted Lisa Poole, RN, BSN, CPHNII, the SIDS/FIMR Coordinator for Fresno County Dept. of Public Health in coordinating the first Safe Sleeping Conference on October 30th featuring Dr. Thomas G. Keens who is the Chair of the California State SIDS Advisory Council. FCCAP facilitates the Pediatric Death Review Committee for Fresno County and in 2017 15 babies died related to SIDS/SUID, 14 of whom were directly related to the sleep environment. In 2018, seven babies also died from sleep environment issues. Winter is a high risk time of year and while SIDS deaths are not preventable, those that are directly related to the sleep environment are preventable. Through education about providing babies with a Safe Sleep environment we can reduce the risk of SIDS deaths by more than 50% and the first step begins with educating professionals who provide services to new parents.
