California Common Cause is a nonpartisan organization that works with local governments and redistricting commissions to create a fair and inclusive redistricting process. We write to share that the Secretary of State of California has recently updated its <u>local redistricting webpage</u> to provide a list of required languages and translated resources to assist local officials in complying with the language requirements outlined in the FAIR Maps Act of 2019 (California Elections Code Sections 21508(g)(1), 21508(j), 21608(g)(1), 21608(h), 21608(j), 21628(g)(1), 21628(h), 21628(j)).

The Secretary of State's webpage includes general information about language access requirements, the list of applicable languages in which language accommodations are required to be offered under the FAIR Maps Act, and translated website templates that cities and counties can use to meet their requirements to provide translated information on their redistricting websites. California Common Cause encourages you to refer to the Secretary of State's webpage when planning your redistricting process. Please note that the language requirements are a floor, and that many local jurisdictions are exceeding the requirements in state law in recognition that there are additional limited English proficient communities that will be engaging in the redistricting process. If you are not already doing so, we encourage you to be responsive to requests from the community for additional language accommodations during the redistricting process.

California Common Cause has compiled various resources to assist local governments in navigating the local redistricting process, which can be found at https://www.commoncause.org/localredistricting2021/. The resources include a comprehensive guide and quick checklist for navigating the FAIR Maps Act, guide to redistricting law, a community of interest testimony template, educational flyers, a recording of a redistricting training we held for cities and counties in January 2021, and more. We hope this webpage is helpful to your efforts and that you use it as a resource when planning and executing your local redistricting process. Hi Samantha,

I am the chair of the LWV Fresno Redistricting committee. At our meeting this morning some concerns arose regarding some areas of the County's redistricting process.

1. It is difficult to navigate the County's website to find the meeting dates for public attendance and input. It would be great if there was a direct link on the home page.

Response: We have been working on the Redistricting webpages and just published updates on Thursday, July 1. There is now a redistricting icon on the main County webpage called "Redistricting" and when you click on that it takes you to the main Redistricting page, which now has a navigation bar across the top and one of those buttons is "meetings" which bring up the calendar of meetings and associated documents. These changes should make it easier to find the meeting calendar, agendas and notices. Per your suggestion we will also add

the Redistricting announcements and press releases to the main County webpage as that may also help residents.

2. There will not be much notice for the July 7th meeting.

Response: As it pertains to the noticing, we are cautiously following our interpretation of Elections Code 21508(c). The agenda for the July 7th Commissioner meeting has been physically posted on July 1 at approximately 3:45 pm at the Hall of Records, posted on the internet on July 1 at appropriately 5:15 pm, and electronic notices, to all subscribed interested parties, were emailed on July 2 at approximately 8:30 am. In addition, a press release was issued on Friday, July 2, along with social media posts. Now that we have the website complete, we will attempt to provide more of an advanced notice on future Commissioner meetings, but at a minimum, ensure that remain within compliance of the Elections Code and Brown Act.

3. The public input session for District 4 on July 14th doesn't give communities and individuals much time to prepare their input when there is little notice. Other districts have their sessions much later. How will these sessions be publicized?

Response: The District 4 meeting on July 14th is a workshop that is intended to first educate the public on the redistricting process and second solicit feedback from the public on how the district lines should be drawn and the communities within the area. The workshop meetings will be noticed via social media, press release, and posting on the web. Residents within districts can attend any of the five district meetings, so if their schedule prohibits them in attending one of the dates, they will have four other meeting dates to choose from. The workshops will also be recorded and available on the web so residents can view them as they have time. If you have additional ideas, please let me know.

4. The August 4th input session is the same day as the state's COI input session for Region F (our area) which could pose a conflict for some people.

Response: Thank you for bringing that to our intention. The <u>first</u> COI input session for Region F is set for July 12 from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and no time has been assigned for the <u>second</u> COI input session on August 4th. Hopefully the August 4th session will also be from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. so there is no conflict.

I realize you must be quite busy and we are now at a holiday weekend. When you get the chance I would appreciate a response. Have a nice weekend.

Presentation to the Fresno County Advisory Redistricting Commission

My name is Venancio Gaona, member of the Central California Coalition for Equitable Realignment.

My comments: The need for "Training Focus on Redistricting Rules":

It seems that the presentation on redistricting rules merits only one slide (page 35 on the Agenda), while two slides discuss defining communities of interest and five slides are devoted to the various mapping tools available.

The redistricting rules are complex, particularly in light of the interplay between the federal rules, the recently adopted state Fair Maps Act of 2019, which details the priority order of specific criteria that must be considered, and traditional redistricting principles. The slide on page 35 is entitled "Redistricting Rules and Goals". I presume the term "Goals" refers to the "Other Traditional Redistricting Principles", given that both the federal and state criteria are mandated by statute.

It is critical that Commissioners and Supervisors understand how federal, state and traditional rules work together, to ensure equitable maps are drawn. And not just more of the same, which will be the likely result if decision makers give undue wight to traditional redistricting principles. This is a realistic concern, given that several Supervisors have previously expressed that they expect only minimal changes in the district lines drawn on the 2020 Census data.

The public deserves to know how the County (and County Counsel) recommend the Commissioners and the ultimate decision makers, the Supervisors, should weigh the criteria in each of the three columns on page 35.

Leadership Counsel for Justice and Accountability works alongside low-income communities of color in the San Joaquin Valley and the Eastern Coachella Valley. As is most relevant here, we work with community leaders in the communities of Lanare, Cantua Creek, El Porvenir, Tombstone, Calwa, and Fresno City in Fresno County to advocate for local, regional and state government entities to address their community's needs for the basic elements that make up a safe and healthy community, including safe and affordable drinking water, affordable housing, effective and safe transportation, efficient and affordable energy, green spaces, and clean air.

We urge the Commission to improve the participatory aspects of the redistricting process - namely, we have several suggestions for the Commission to better engage the public, especially communities who have historically been excluded from electoral and political decision-making processes.

First, we urge the Commission to improve their remote participation offerings for all public hearings. At the July 14 hearing in Riverdale, while Zoom was offered, participants were told that questions could not be submitted via Zoom. When there was pushback, the County staffer monitoring the Zoom account did present questions from remote participants to the audience, but this was not well-publicized to participants. Additionally, not all the questions submitted in the chat were read and answered. We urge the Commission to ensure that Fresno residents are able to participate by commenting and asking questions via Zoom - especially considering that Zoom is already being used, and participation is possible - and to publicize this feature to residents.

Second, community members from Lanare who attended the July 14 meeting via Zoom were disappointed with the interpretation services. As Spanish speakers, it was unclear to them if they would have been able to participate in-person, as in-person interpretation services were not clearly advertised on the meeting flyer or elsewhere. Language access is an integral part of a fair and equitable redistricting process, as residents who speak a language other than English deserve an equal opportunity to participate and have their voices heard. This is especially salient in the Riverdale and Lanare Census-Designated Places, where 67.1% and 90.7% speak Spanish and 42.8% and 17.6% speak English less than very well, respectively, according to ACS 2019 survey data. It is incumbent on the Commission to ensure that communities are able to participate, and that opportunities to participate are easily accessible to everyone. We urge the Commission to make translated materials and interpretation services both available and well-publicized



for both in-person and remote participation, especially in communities where the majority of residents speak another language in addition to English and a sizable percentage only speak a language other than English.

Relatedly, we urge the Commission to expand its outreach and engagement efforts, particularly in languages other than English. The flyer for the July 14 community meeting was published the preceding Friday, only 5 days before the meeting, and was only available in English and Spanish. All materials related to the redistricting process should be available in the main languages in Fresno County, including but not limited to Hmong and Punjabi. It is imperative that promotional materials are available well in advance of the meeting date and in multiple languages to ensure that participation is accessible to all.

Additionally, we are concerned that planned outreach and engagement efforts are not comprehensive enough to capture communities - namely low-income communities of color, working class communities, rural communities, and communities without access to broadband - in the participation and Community of Interest process. While there are options to participate in-person and submit comments or maps via email or mail, this is not comprehensive enough to capture folks who are too busy to attend or live too far from in-person meetings and do not have access to the Internet to print the physical maps. Folks who experience these barriers are disproportionately members of the aforementioned communities. We recommend the Commission mail multilingual maps to residents in low-income and rural communities, engage with and fund community-based organizations to conduct outreach through door-to-door canvassing in these communities, table at events in these communities, and host pop-up events in these communities where folks can participate in the COI collection process without having to seek out opportunities to do so.

Finally, in addition to our general concerns about accessibility to this process, we want to uplift a specific concern regarding District 4. The July 14 meeting, held on the western side of the district, was much more easily accessible to communities like Lanare, for whom travel to Fresno City for a meeting may be time-cost prohibitive. However, for communities like Tombstone, on the eastern side of the county, the Riverdale location was still a barrier to access and participation in the public meeting that was ostensibly geared towards facilitating participation in their district. As a result, we urge the Commission to hold a second District 4 hearing on the eastern side of the district, to facilitate participation for all.

Thank you for your consideration, and we are excited to continue engaging in the 2021 Fresno County redistricting process.

My name is Jonathan Mehta Stein; I am the Executive Director at California Common Cause.

California Common Cause is a nonpartisan nonprofit organization dedicated to building a more open, more honest, more participatory, and more inclusive democracy. We have worked on redistricting issues for decades and were one of the primary proponents of the Voters First Act, the 2008 ballot measure that created California's statewide Citizens Redistricting Commission. In this redistricting cycle, we have supported and consulted with dozens of local jurisdictions, providing technical assistance of various kinds to city and county staff, redistricting commissions, and community groups. We have made presentations to redistricting commissions in the City of San Jose, City of Long Beach, San Diego County, Los Angeles County, and elsewhere. In January 2021, we gave a well-attended, three-hour redistricting training meant for city and county staff. We host a website with a wide range of trainings, tools, materials, and resources on local redistricting.

In the interest of transparency, I wanted to write to the full commission to share that I recently had the opportunity to meet with Commissioner Hugo Morales and email with Commissioner Patience Milrod. We discussed the state law's requirements around process and public outreach for a county redistricting process and how the Fresno County Commission can maximize participation and access for the public.

I want to make myself available to any and all commissioners who wish to discuss redistricting and how to optimize the commission's process.

I would also be happy to present to the Fresno County redistricting commission on a variety of topics -- Redistricting 101, community outreach and education best practices, communities of interest, and local redistricting law in California -- as I have elsewhere. Of course, I recognize that the county has a demographer firm and likely outside counsel that specialize in redistricting. They are well-qualified to give most or all of these presentations.






Fresno County Board Of Supervisors – 2021 - Proposed




Overall View of Equity Coalition Map for Fresno County Redistricting 2021.











District #4 – Detail of District #4 – Calwa & Easton









1) ready availability of interpretation services. At the Riverdale workshop, there was no real-time capacity even to interpret in Spanish, let alone in Hmong or Punjabi. Although the State website does not list other languages than Spanish for the <u>City</u> of Fresno (https://www.sos.ca.gov/elections/helpful-resources/redistricting), the State's benchmark for other-language interpretation is 3% of the population. Maybe County staff have better data—from what I could find, it does look like Fresno County's got 5+% Asian-language speakers (I'm guessing mostly Hmong), and 3.3% "other Indo-European languages" (which would include Punjabi). See, https://worldpopulationreview.com/us-counties/ca/fresno-county-populations:



Even the Fresno City Council can make interpreters in Hmong, Punjabi, and Spanish available at every meeting. We should (and some would argue must) be doing likewise for this redistricting process.

- full integration of zoom attendees into the proceedings. Mr. Gaona notes his public comment that he had indicated a wish to present comments at our July 7 meeting, but was not recognized. To be consistent with our obligations of public inclusion in the process, the Riverdale example really cannot be how it works at future meetings and workshops.
- 3) both August 21 workshops are now scheduled for the far north end of urban Fresno/Clovis. One of these should be rescheduled to the eastern part of District 4, in order to accommodate those for whom travel to Riverdale was an actual barrier. We cannot honestly say that Fresnans in the Woodward Park area would have trouble traveling to Clovis, or vice verse—not so for residents in Riverdale and the far eastern part of District 4.
- 4) Finally—I am attaching a proposed bylaws amendment clarifying Commissioners' obligations to disclose communications of any kind—not just written communications—with members of the public respecting the redistricting process in which we are now engaged. I would appreciate your putting this item on the August 12 agenda, and including it in the agenda materials, for the Commission's consideration.

In keeping with the spirit of the amended language, I hereby disclose that on July 29, 2021, I had a telephone conversation with Vice Chair Hugo Morales and Jonathan Mehta Stein of Common Cause for insights that Common Cause, as a principal author of California's Fair Maps Act, might be able to give about the statute's redistricting criteria.

Thanks so much for your hard work on this project. I'm copying Mr. Morales, as the Vice Chair, since I don't have Mr. Abrahamian's email address (could you forward it to him, too?). Please let me know if you need more information, and if there's anything I need to do besides this email to make these concerns part of the record of our proceedings.

Dear Commissioners:

It is extremely important that you and the public are clear about Fresno County's obligations under the federal Voting Rights Act. Tonight, I ask that your consultants clarify that Fresno County's obligations under the Voting Rights Act are different than its obligation to respect Latino Communities of Interest.

I also encourage Commissioners and Supervisors to watch the July 13 meeting video of the state Citizens Redistricting Commission in which their Voting Rights Act attorney, David Becker, provides training on what compliance with the Voting Rights Act entails, starting at 21 minutes. I suggest your consultants provide training on this important area of law.

Voting Rights Act obligations require members of a protected class be kept whole in the same district when they are the majority under certain circumstances. Done correctly, this is not racial or political gerrymandering.

As Attorney Becker explains, assessing the Gingles preconditions and the totality of the circumstances, as laid out by the U.S. Supreme Court, will tell Fresno County WHETHER Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act requires majority-minority districts to be drawn. HOW to draw those districts requires an interactive process to make sure you balance the Voting Rights Act requirement a majority minority district be drawn with the ranked Redistricting principles mandated by California's Fair Maps Act.

The public needs to be very clear that under the Voting Rights Act, Fresno County is obligated to protect members of protected classes when drawing district lines. As this applies to Fresno, that means protecting our Latino community. Please clarify this for everyone tonight.

During the workshop, I mentioned to Ryder and Jeff that I would forward some information regarding new development trends within Fresno County that could be useful to have on hand during the County's redistricting process.

Another item relevant to near-term future growth within the City of Fresno is the City's recently-adopted "Mixed Use text amendment". This text amendment is effective City-wide and has two notable effects: 1) It allows for the development of residential uses in a greater range of zoning areas within the City of Fresno (e.g., certain types of commercial zone districts), and 2) it substantially increases the number of dwelling units per acre allowed in such areas. I don't know all of the details, so I would recommend contacting someone in the City of Fresno's Long Range Planning Division to get more information.

Please let me know if you need any clarification or want to follow up further on any of the information provided here.

Re: Supervisorial Redistricting Process

Dear Members of the Fresno County Board of Supervisors and Members of the Fresno County Redistricting Advisory Commission:

The American Civil Liberties Union Foundation of Northern California and the American Civil Liberties Union Foundation of Southern California write to address comments made by some members of the Fresno Board of Supervisors (Board) regarding their intent to keep the existing supervisorial districts largely the same during this redistricting cycle by only changing the districts at the margins to balance the population. These comments are extremely concerning because this approach prioritizes maintaining the core of existing districts over mandatory criteria, something prohibited by federal law and by the Fair and Inclusive Redistricting for Municipalities and Political Subdivisions (FAIR MAPS) Act (hereinafter, the Fair Maps Act). This approach also defeats the purpose of the redistricting process: to periodically redraw district boundaries to provide residents with fair representation.

For example, Supervisor Buddy Mendes said that the 2021 redistricting process was simply about "tweaking" or "moving over" somewhere "between 3 to 5 census tracts." *Id.* at 1:15:37. He noted that during the 2010 redistricting process, any district line changes mostly occurred in District 5 where "the census tract boundaries basically moved slightly to the North East...just slightly." *Id.* at 1:16:03. Supervisor Nathan Magsig stated that he was saddened that his district will likely be impacted the most with the redistricting process and if he could, he would "keep the lines exactly as they are because [he] appreciate[s] the opportunity to serve everyone in [his] district." *Id.* at 1:36:52. Supervisor Brian Pacheco echoed the sentiment that the redistricting process would result in little change because he did not expect "wholesale changes" in the Fresno County districts lines. *Id.* at 1:45:40. Lastly, Supervisor Steve Brandau foreshadowed to the public that the Fresno County district map would only "shift relatively slightly" because of some "border changes based on population growth." *Id.* at 1:51:52.

The Board adopted the 2011 district map using 2010 data and under a different legal landscape. Unlike this cycle, in 2011 the Board was not explicitly required to keep communities of interest together or to engage in a robust outreach and education campaign to solicit public testimony. In 2011, line drawers in California were only required to ensure equality of population and to avoid vote dilution. They were permitted to consider traditional redistricting principles but could ignore them completely and could place as much or as little weight as they wanted on other factors, including undemocratic factors such as protecting incumbents by largely maintaining existing lines. Because the Board adopted the current map under a different legal scheme, the Board may well be in violation of the Fair Maps Act if it decides to adopt a map that simply balances the population of the existing map.³ We urge the Fresno County Advisory Redistricting Commission (Advisory Commission) to instead start with a blank slate when drafting a district map and allowing testimony from the public about communities of interest in Fresno County to guide line-drawing. Similarly, we urge the Board to adopt a map that keeps these communities of interest together and that does not dilute the vote of any protected groups.

I. Decennial Redistricting and Traditional Redistricting Principles

The Board's interest in maintaining the current lines by only slightly adjusting them to bring the districts within the allowable population deviation reflects a basic misunderstanding of the decennial redistricting process. Equality of population is not important for its own sake. Instead, equality of population serves the larger goal of decennial redistricting: to "achiev[e] fair and effective representation for all citizens." *Reynolds v. Sims*, 377 U.S. 533, 565-56, 560-61 (1964) (noting that "the fundamental principle of representative government in this country" mandates "equal representation for equal numbers of people"). The purpose of periodic redistricting is to "maintain[] a reasonably current scheme of legislative representation" that reflects not just population changes, but also reflects communities of interest and any changes over time in other demographic trends. *See id.* at 583-84.

Line drawers use a series of tools in addition to equality of population to draft maps that "observe and advance neutral democratic values." See Bethune-Hill v. Va. State Bd. of Elec., 141 F. Supp. 3d 505, 534-35 (E.D. Va. 2015), affirmed in part, vacated in part, 137 S. Ct. 788 (2017). Indeed, line drawers are permitted to deviate from perfect equality of population precisely to accommodate these principles. See Reynolds, 377 U.S. at 578-79 (indicating when divergence from the strict population standard is constitutionally permissible). They include communities of interest, compactness, contiguity, and following natural, artificial, and political subdivision boundaries. Cal. Elec. Code § 21500(c); see also Evenwel v. Abbot, 136 S. Ct. 1120, 1124 (2016) (listing traditional redistricting principles). Contiguity and compactness, for example, facilitate political organization, electoral campaigning, and constituent representation by binding geographic communities of interest together. Karcher v. Daggett, 462 U.S. 725, 756 (1983) (noting importance of compactness); Bethune-Hill, 141 F. Supp. 3d at 536-37 (noting importance of contiguity). Courts in turn have found that preserving neighborhoods, political subdivisions, and "communities of interest is important because the sense of community derived from established governmental units tends to foster effective representation." Arizonans for Fair Representation v. Symington, 828 F. Supp. 684, 690 (D. Ariz, 1992) (quotations omitted). Without these criteria, line drawers would be free to engage in "indiscriminate redistricting" which would be "little more than an open invitation to partisan gerrymandering." Reynolds, 377 U.S. at 578-79.

While courts have for decades uplifted the importance of traditional redistricting principles, they have spoken disapprovingly of individualized, political criteria such as incumbency protection and partisan gerrymandering. See, e.g., Johnson v. Miller, 922 F. Supp. 1556, 1565 (S.D. Ga. 1995) (threejudge court) (noting that incumbency protection is a politicized factor); Ariz. State Leg. v. Ariz. Indep. Redist. Com'n, 576 U.S. 787, 791 (2015) (noting that partisan gerrymanders "are incompatible with democratic principles") (quotations omitted). Courts also recognize that some incumbents are improperly motivated to keep district lines the same precisely to protect their seats. Evenwel, 136 S. Ct. at 1123 (observing the problem that legislators have "scant incentive to adopt new maps that might put them out of office"); Reynolds, 377 U.S. at 583 (recognizing that even redistricting only once a decade has drawbacks because it leads "to the development of resistance to change on the part of some incumbent legislators"). Because incumbency protection and partisan gerrymandering defy the basic principle that "voters should choose their representatives, not the other way around," Ariz. State Leg., 576 U.S. at 824, courts have subordinated these criteria to traditional redistricting principles, see, e.g., Johnson, 922 F. Supp. at 1565 (subordinating incumbency protection to communities of interest); Ga. State Conf. of the NAACP v. Favette Cntv. Bd. of Com'rs, 996 F. Sup. 2d 1353, 1363 (N.D. Ga. 2014) (noting that "when incumbent protection has been considered, courts have routinely treated this principle as a distinctly subordinate consideration to the other traditional redistricting principles") (quotations excluded, emphasis in original). The Board and Advisory Commission must do the same this cycle.

II. The Fair Maps Act and Mandatory Redistricting Criteria

Although courts have highlighted the importance of traditional redistricting criteria, these criteria were discretionary for decades, including during the 2011 redistricting cycle. *Compare Miller v. Bd. of Super. of Santa Clara Cnty.*, 63 Cal. 2d 343, 345 n.1 (1965) (listing discretionary criteria in place at the time), *with* Cal. Elec. Code § 21500 (2019) (amended 2020) (listing the same discretionary criteria); *see also* A.B. 849 Assemb. Floor Analysis at 2 (Sep. 4, 2019) (noting that county redistricting criteria has been largely unchanged since 1947). In 2019, however, the California Legislature passed the Fair Maps Act,⁴ requiring counties to, in order of priority: ensure substantial equality of population, comply with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act, and create districts that are geographically contiguous, maintain communities of interest, avoid dividing cities and census designated places, use boundaries that are easily identifiable and understandable by residents, and are compact. Cal. Elec. Code § 21500(a)-(c). The Fair Maps Act further requires the Board and Advisory Commission to engage in a robust outreach and education campaign to encourage public participation and solicit testimony about communities of interest in the County. *Id.* §§ 21507, 21507.1, 21508(a), (g).

Notably, preserving existing supervisorial lines has never been listed as a discretionary factor in state law. *See Miller*, 63 Cal. 2d at 345 n.1 (listing discretionary criteria in place in 1965 which did not include preserving existing districts); Cal. Elec. Code § 21500 (2019) (amended 2020) (same).⁵ Neither does the Fair Maps Act list this criterion as one of the ranked, mandatory factors. *See* Cal. Elec. Code § 21500. Instead, the Act explicitly prohibits many of the practices that animate the desire to keep existing lines largely the same. For example, the Fair Maps Act prohibits the Board from adopting a supervisorial map "for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party." *Id.* § 21500(d). The Fair

Maps Act also excludes incumbency protection and continuity of representation⁶ from the ranked criteria and is instead clear that "[c]communities of interest *do not* include relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates." Cal. Elec. Code § 21500(c)(2) (emphasis added).

Although prior to the passage of the Fair Maps Act courts had noted that jurisdictions may have their own, local redistricting criteria, these same courts disregarded these criteria when they conflicted with mandatory and permissive factors found in state and federal law. In Luna v. County of Kern, for example, the district court rejected Kern County's argument that any remedial supervisorial district map had to remain as unchanged as possible from the 2011 map, particularly because doing so would violate Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act by fragmenting the Latino population. 291 F. Supp. 3d 1088, 1112 (E.D. Cal. 2018). Similarly, in Garza v. County of Los Angeles, the Ninth Circuit upheld a district court's rejection of the 1981 Los Angeles County supervisorial district map because supervisors had prioritized incumbency protection even though that cracked a cohesive Latino community of interest. 918 F.2d 763, 771 (9th Cir. 1990). Finally, in *Miller*, the California Supreme Court rejected a supervisorial map because it was "readily apparent that the factors on which the board relie[d] in apportioning the districts [were] not the fundamental factors prescribed" in state law. 63 Cal. 2d at 349. Instead of following or considering state law factors, the board's draft map was "primarily compelled by a desire and the result of an effort to preserve traditional political subdivisions," a factor absent from state law at the time. Id. at 349. A court would no doubt also reject a Fresno County supervisorial map that prioritizes preserving existing lines, a factor absent from the Fair Maps Act, over mandatory factors, such as preserving communities of interest.

III. The Board Must Adopt a Map that Complies with Mandatory Criteria

In adopting the Fair Maps Act and making traditional redistricting criteria mandatory, the California Legislature took the firm position that counties may not simply tweak lines every ten years to address malapportionment. Instead, line drawers must conduct a thorough process that, in the end, results in a map that keeps communities of interest together. During prior redistricting cycles, Fresno County did not have to create districts that were contiguous, maintained communities of interest, and were compact. California law also did not explicitly prohibit the Board from favoring or discriminating against a political party, or from considering incumbency, partisan affiliation, and relationships with representatives. Because in 2011 and during prior redistricting cycles the Board was not required to consider now mandatory criteria, the current Board and the Advisory Commission are under no obligation to give any deference to existing district lines or to use them as a starting point.

A review of demographic changes over the past two decades strongly suggests that the Board has for decades prioritized largely maintaining existing lines over ensuring that lines capture communities of interest. In 2011, for example, the Board adopted a map almost identical to the 2001 supervisorial map

notwithstanding the fact that between 2000 and 2010 the Latino population grew from 44 to 50.3 percent of the total Fresno County population.⁸ Redistricting data from the 2020 census shows that the Latino population has now grown to 53.6 percent, an almost 10 percent increase in the last 20 years. These demographic changes have not been uniform throughout the county. For example, between 2010 and 2019, the Latino population increased 2.5 percentage points in district 4 and increased 4.7 percentage points in district 2.⁹

Public testimony will no doubt confirm what the data suggest: that a new supervisorial map that is largely the same as the 2011 map and is, in turn, largely the same as the 2000 map does not take into account dramatic demographic shifts since 2000 and likely violates state law. To avoid violating the law and to ensure fair and effective representation in the County, the Board must dispense of its misguided goal to maintain existing lines as much as possible. The Advisory Commission must start fresh and, among other things: solicit and listen to public testimony with an open mind; start to understand the location of distinct neighborhoods and communities of interest in the County; look to American Community Survey data to identify which areas in the County have similar socioeconomic characteristics; and work with consultants to draft a map that captures these communities while following other mandatory, ranked criteria. If the Advisory Commission fails to comply with such requirements when drafting and recommending maps, it is incumbent on the Board to ensure that any final map complies with both state and federal law.

* * *

Redistricting inherently involves changes in current district lines. These changes can be large or small, depending on how representative the lines were during prior redistricting cycles and how drastic changes have been since the last cycle. In this case, we know that the 2011 lines were drawn under an entirely different legal regime and that there have been drastic demographic changes in Fresno County in the past few decades. We urge the Board and the Advisory Commission to follow the Fair Maps Act and engage in a good faith effort to adopt a fair and equitable supervisorial district map. Although the Latino population has increased dramatically over the past 30 years, the opportunity for disadvantaged populations to elect candidates of their choice at the County Supervisor level has not kept pace. We see the Fair Maps Act of 2019 and the Federal Voting Rights Act as opportunities and requirements to do more than simply move a few Census tracts between urban districts to equalize population.

We are excited at the potential for significant change in the boundaries of County Supervisorial districts to reflect the demographic shifts that have occurred.

The Central Valley Progressive PAC believes the current map for the Fresno County Board of Supervisors should be changed to reflect two distinct communities of interest separated by Highway 41: the rural Westside (Proposed District 1) and the rural Eastside (Proposed District 4).

EMC's proposed map recognizes the significant differences between these two regions, whether we look at crops grown, soil type or transportation patterns. Even their water comes from different sources. On the Eastside, the farms are smaller, with more communities that are more densely populated. On the Westside, the communities are fewer and farther apart, with much bigger farms and more mechanized agriculture, requiring less labor.

We are pleased that District 1, as proposed by the EMC, covers the entire rural Westside, everything west of Highway 41 and all areas of the city of Fresno west of Highway 99.

- Rural Cities: Firebaugh, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin. Proposed District 1
 ADDS Huron and Coalinga, which are now in District 4. The current District 4
 stretches 100 miles, from Coalinga to Orange Cove.
- Unincorporated communities: Biola, Cantua Creek, Five Points, Tranquillity and West Park. As proposed, District 1 ADDS Caruthers, Easton, Lanare, Raisin City and Riverdale, which are now in District 4.

These unincorporated rural communities are among the poorest and most isolated, many of which lack the basic features of a safe, healthy, sustainable neighborhoods—potable drinking water, sewer systems, safe housing, public transportation, parks, sidewalks, and streetlights. Moreover, these communities are systematically underserved in the overall allocation of public resources and are frequently overlooked in local decisions.

The Fresno County Rural Transit Agency transit routes shed light on transportation patterns in the rural Westside and support use of Highway 41 as the dividing line.

Westlands and the West Hills Community College District are currently split into two supervisorial districts, but EMC's proposed District 1 includes the following:

- All the West Hills Community College District located within Fresno County, including the main Coalinga campus and the Firebaugh campus.
- All the Westlands Water District.

For these, and many other reasons, and after carefully reviewing the supervisorial district map proposed by the Fresno County Equitable Map Coalition and the Dolores Huerta Foundation, the Central Valley Progressive PAC stands in strong support.

Boundaries

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Conduct second reading of the ordinance to amend Chapter 2.72 of Title 2 of the Fresno County Code to establish new Supervisorial District boundaries, and waive the reading of the ordinance in its entirety. (4/5 vote)

On September 13, 2011, the Board conducted the first reading of the ordinance to amend Chapter 2.72 of Title 2 of the Fresno County Code to establish new supervisorial district boundaries which were adopted at the public hearing conducted on August 30, 2011. This agenda item represents the second reading of the proposed ordinance.

ALTERNATIVE ACTION(s):

If the Board does not timely adopt the redistricting ordinance, the redistricting process will fall to the supervisorial redistricting commission prescribed by Elections Code sections 21501 and 21502.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Notice and publication costs will be incurred as part of the adoption of an ordinance required to change district boundaries. To date, the Public Works Department and the County Clerk have absorbed costs associated with the redistricting process.

IMPACTS ON JOB CREATION:

The recommended action does not impact job creation.

DISCUSSION:

In Fresno County, there are five County Supervisors, and each supervisor represents a distinct geographic area called a district. County Supervisors reside in and are elected by the voters of the district they represent. The County Board of Supervisors is required to reconfigure their district boundaries every ten years so that they contain an approximately equal number of people in each district. After each federal census and using population figures provided by the U.S. Census Bureau, the Board by a 4/5 vote must adjust the boundaries of the Supervisorial Districts of the County so that each district is as equal as possible in population.

On November 10, 2009, the Board initiated a County Redistricting Committee consisting of representatives from the County Clerk's office, County Administrative Office, Information Technology Service and Public Works Departments. On April 12, 2011, the Board established the Fresno County Redistricting Task Force consisting of appointed representatives from each district. The Board ultimately considered eight options developed by these two groups and developed an additional four options.

On July 19, 2011, the Board received a report from staff that presented an overview of the supervisorial redistricting process for the County of Fresno. The Board also received a report from the Redistricting Task Force. Additionally, the Board established a schedule for the redistricting process and set August 30, 2011, as the date to adopt a final option and September 13 and 20, 2011, for the first and second readings of the proposed amended ordinance required to establish new supervisorial district boundaries.

On August 9, 2011, the Board continued discussions on redistricting and considered various options presented to the Board. The Board also convened a special meeting on August 23, 2011, to continue the discussion on redistricting before the public hearing on August 30, 2011. On August 30, 2011, the Board adopted Option D as the preferred redistricting plan shown in Attachment A.

On September 13, 2001, the Board conducted the first reading of the proposed ordinance to incorporate district boundary changes. The ordinance amending Chapter 2.72 of Title 2 of the Ordinance Code of the County of Fresno establishes the new supervisorial district boundary plan and is contained in attachment B.

Following the 2001 redistricting effort, the total deviation was 2%. The population figures provided by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Census Bureau demonstrate that the total deviation is now 25.54%. The redistricting plan adopted by the Board on August 30, 2011, contains a total deviation of 1.15%. A district comparison by population and race/ethnicity is displayed in the tables of Attachment B.

This redistricting effort is on schedule and provides sufficient time for the ordinance to become effective by the November 1, 2011, deadline.

Public Notification Process

Throughout the redistricting process, the County Internet site, press releases and required public notices were used to notify the public of the process to adjust supervisorial district boundaries. A link to redistricting information was set up on the Fresno County Internet site's home page. The schedule to adjust supervisorial district boundaries, copies of agenda items, news releases and alternative plan maps have also been posted.







BEFORE THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS COUNTY OF FRESNO STATE OF CALIFORNIA ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2.72 OF TITLE 2 OF THE FRESNO COUNTY ORDINANCE CODE: SAID CHAPTER ESTABLISHES THE BOUNDARIES AND NUMERICAL DESIGNATIONS FOR SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 1, 2, 3, 4, AND 5 OF THE COUNTY OF FRESNO.

WHEREAS, the Fresno County Board of Supervisors has, at public hearings, considered both oral and documentary evidence both including the Supervisorial District Population Study and supporting documentation, provided by County Staff, by the efforts of a Redistricting Task Force, and by the testimony of interested persons who expressed their views and had the opportunity to submit documentary evidence prior to the adoption of this ordinance; and

WHEREAS, in considering the foregoing oral and documentary evidence, the Board of Supervisors has taken into account the voting rights protected under the United States Constitution and Section 1973 of the United States Code, as amended, more commonly referred to as the "Voting Rights Act", and has given consideration to the following factors: (a) topography; (b) geography; (c) cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory; and (d) community of interests of the supervisorial districts; and

WHEREAS, the United States Secretary of Commerce has officially ruled that the 2010 Census of Population and Housing provided to the County of Fresno by the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census, which forms the basis of the Supervisorial District Population Study and supporting documentation submitted by County Staff, shall be final; and

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2.72.010 Establishment. Pursuant to Chapter 6 of Division 21 of the California Elections Code and the Charter of the County of Fresno, the boundaries and numerical designations of the supervisorial districts for the County of Fresno are established as set forth in this chapter.

2.72.020 Supervisorial District 1.

There is established a supervisorial district for the County of Fresno to be known and designated as Supervisorial District 1, the boundaries of which are described as follows:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2.72 OF TITLE 2 OF THE FRESNO COUNTY ORDINANCE CODE: SAID CHAPTER ESTABLISHES THE BOUNDARIES AND NUMERICAL DESIGNATIONS FOR SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS 1, 2, 3, 4, AND 5 OF THE COUNTY OF FRESNO.

WHEREAS, the Fresno County Board of Supervisors has, at public hearings, considered both oral and documentary evidence both including the Supervisorial District Population Study and supporting documentation, provided by County Staff, by the efforts of a Redistricting Task Force, and by the testimony of interested persons who expressed their views and had the opportunity to submit documentary evidence prior to the adoption of this ordinance; and

WHEREAS, in considering the foregoing oral and documentary evidence, the Board of Supervisors has taken into account the voting rights protected under the United States Constitution and Section 1973 of the United States Code, as amended, more commonly referred to as the "Voting Rights Act", and has given consideration to the following factors: (a) topography; (b) geography; (c) cohesiveness, contiguity, integrity, and compactness of territory; and (d) community of interests of the supervisorial districts; and

WHEREAS, the United States Secretary of Commerce has officially ruled that the 2010 Census of Population and Housing provided to the County of Fresno by the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census, which forms the basis of the Supervisorial District Population Study and supporting documentation submitted by County Staff, shall be final; and

Pursuant to Chapter 6 of Division 21 of the California Elections Code and the Charter of the County of Fresno, the boundaries and numerical designations of the supervisorial districts for the County of Fresno are established as set forth in this chapter.

While the Latino population has increased dramatically over the past 30 years, the opportunity for disadvantaged populations to elect candidates of their choice at the County Supervisor level, has not kept pace. We see the Fair Maps Act of 2019 and the Federal Voting Rights Act as opportunities and requirements to do more than simply move a few census tracts between urban districts to equalize population.

We are excited at the potential for significant change in the boundaries of County Supervisorial Districts, to reflect the demographic shifts that have occurred.

SEIU local 521 Fresno COPE believes the current map for the Fresno Board of Supervisors should be changed to reflect two distinct communities of interest separated by Highway 41: the rural Westside (Proposed District 1) and the rural Eastside (Proposed District 4).

EMC's Proposed Map recognizes the significant differences between these two regions, whether we look at crops grown, soil type, or transportation patterns. Even their water comes from different sources. On the Eastside, the farms are smaller, with more communities that are more densely populated. On the Westside, the communities are fewer and farther apart, with much bigger farms and more mechanized agriculture, requiring less labor.

We are pleased District 1, as proposed by EMC, covers the entire rural Westside, everything west of Highway 41 and all areas of the City of Fresno west of Highway 99.

- Rural Cities: Firebaugh, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin. Proposed District 1
 ADDS Huron and Coalinga, which are now in District 4. The current District 4
 stretches 100 miles, from Coalinga to Orange Cove.
- Unincorporated communities: Biola, Cantua Creek, Five Points, Tranquility, and West Park. As proposed, District 1 **ADDS** Caruthers, Easton, Lanare, Raisin City, & Riverdale, which are now in District 4.

These unincorporated rural communities are among the poorest and most isolated, and lack the basic features of a safe, healthy, sustainable neighborhood—potable drinking water, sewer systems, safe housing, public transportation, parks, sidewalks, and streetlights. Moreover, these communities are systematically underserved in the overall allocation of public resources and are frequently overlooked in local decisions.

The Fresno County Rural Transit Agency transit routes shed light on transportation patterns in the rural Westside and support use of Highway 41 as the dividing line.

Westlands and Westhills College District are currently split into two supervisor districts, but EMC's Proposed District 1 includes:

- 1) The Hmong community that lives in the Sunnyside area. At the moment, the Hmong community who calls the Sunnyside area home is split into three Districts (3, 4, and 5), which also means that their unified voice is being split and we all know that this leads to a lack of adequate representation. We want the Sunnyside Hmong community to be together in one district, preferably District 3.
- 2) The communities of Lanare and Cantua Creek are both unincorporated communities in the western part of the county, and the two communities face similar issues. Although these two communities are currently divided, with Cantua Creek in District 1 and Lanare in District 4, community members would like to be in the same district, so that they can advocate together on issues that both communities face.

These communities of interests were put together through conversations with local community leaders and Fresno County residents. We ask that the Fresno County Board of Supervisors give our public comment on COIs a serious consideration as propose district maps are drawn.

My name is Venancio G. Gaona, chair of the Latino Educational Issues Roundtable (LEIR) organization. The Latino Educational Issues Roundtable organization is an advocate for the advancement of the socio-economic and educational programs and services for the Chicano/Latino residents in the County of Fresno. The LEIR advocacy is conducted before federal, state, municipal, and county agencies and offices.

The LEIR organization has carefully studied the map developed and proposed by the Equity Map Coalition for Supervisorial district boundaries. We are in full support. The proposed districts are compact and easily understandable.

We have also reviewed the U.S. Census data, which confirms the significant demographic changes that have transformed the County of Fresno. The Chicano/Latino population has increased dramatically over the past 30 years, yet the opportunity for disadvantaged communities of interest to elect candidates of their choice for supervisorial seats has not kept pace.

The proposed supervisorial redistricting map complies with our review of all mandated federal and state laws, especially the California Fair Maps Act (A.B. 849) passed in 2019 to standardize the local redistricting process, to ensure fairness and prohibit gerrymandering.

We particularly support the grouping of communities of interest and the division between the rural areas of the Eastside and the Westside of the County, at Highway 41. There is a significant difference between the two mentioned areas. Each deserves to have its own supervisorial representative. The proposed map by EMC attempts to keep the whole Westside together for the first time, including all the area served by West Hills College, Westlands Water District, and Fresno County Rural Transit's Westside routs.

We believe incorporating Southeast Fresno with the rural towns in District 4 makes sense, as residents are bound together by work, family, ethnicity, income levels, language, and face the similar socio-economic challenges and living conditions.

We also strongly support the concept of the City of Clovis having its own Supervisor, along with the new growth, foothill, and mountain areas. Furthermore, we especially support Willow Avenue as the border between not only the City of Fresno and the City of Clovis, but also between District 2 and District 5, respectively.

Conclusion: The Equitable Map Coalition map proposal is fair, research-based, meets all federal and state legal requirements, and provides a democratic opportunity for fair representation for a significant underrepresented numbers of citizens with the right to vote.

Fresno Inclusive Families Map Justification

The Central Labor Council, Communities for a New California Education Fund, the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the Fresno Metro Black Chamber of Commerce, Hmong Innovating Politics (HIP), and Jakara Movement (JM) brought residents together to inform a revised map that would keep communities of interest whole, provide a more accurate balance of representation, and would ensure a smaller percentage of population deviation.

The Fresno Inclusive Families map changes the current North - South divide that currently gives greater advantage to District 2 and District 5. The North Fresno and North Clovis metro area is where the voting propensity is very high and voters do not vote in favor of uplifting working families. These two parts of Clovis and Fresno have more in common with each other than they do really with the rest of the county. District 2 and District 4 on the revised map balances the representation and gives more voice to the working families across the entire county.

Note: The map submitted was redrawn using Maptitude that accounts for 2020 Census data (PL 94-171 Redistricting Data).

District 1

District 1 includes such a large amount of land, because it encompasses so many low density rural areas of the county. This Western region of the county is currently divided by Districts 1 and 4. This map would bring the West part of the county together and would give more voice to residents living in the West and developing part of Fresno. District 1 is consistently an agricultural district. It also uplifts Fresno's most historical black part of town (Southwest) by keeping it together with the rest of Southwest Fresno and West of the 99 together instead of being divided into Districts 1 and 3 as it is currently.

The Fresno Inclusive Families Map tells a more complete story of who is moving to Northwest Fresno and how there are complete 180-degree realities between neighborhoods in Northwest Fresno. In a quick Zillow search of sold homes in Figarden, Fresno, you will notice that some homes recently sold in the neighborhood Southeast of the Bullard & Marks intersection for an average of \$350k but in a bordering neighborhood closer to Van Ness Ave for an average of \$750k. Some even go above \$1 million. For example, families living in the neighborhood Southeast of the Bullard & Marks intersection work hard labor jobs, are more diverse, and overall live a completely different reality from the families more North of them and closer to or on Van Ness Ave.

Van Ness Ave is weirdly just East of Palm Ave, South of Shaw Ave and just East of Marks Ave, North of Shaw Ave. However, the same dichotomy previously mentioned exists South and North of Shaw Ave. This is why District 2 goes narrowly South until it meets the Herndon No. 39 Canal. The difference is most apparent when you drive through the part of Van Ness Ave that is commonly known as 'Christmas Tree Lane,' where it feels completely separated from the rest of the city.

The Sunnyside area also importantly includes both the Hmong and Punjabi communities, keeping them whole. It is important to understand that this area has become a vibrant and growing area for Hmong and Punjabi families and businesses as well.

We note with concern that our representatives often do not reflect the region's diversity. We strongly believe that fair maps must be drawn and approved this redistricting cycle, so that minority voters have an opportunity to elect their candidates of choice.

The CVLRT represents many families and cities in the heart of the San Joaquin Valley. We advocate for more farmworker protections, a pathway to citizenship, and inclusion in coronavirus relief funding.

We have carefully reviewed the new Census data, which confirms that significant demographic changes continue to transform Fresno County.

While the Latino population has increased dramatically over the past 30 years, the opportunity for disadvantaged populations to elect candidates of their choice at the County Supervisor level, has not kept pace. We see the Fair Maps Act of 2019 and the federal Voting Rights Act as opportunities and requirements to do more than simply move a few census tracts between urban districts to equalize population.

We are excited at the potential for significant change in the boundaries of County Supervisorial Districts, to reflect the demographic shifts that have occurred.

The CVLRT believes the current map for the Fresno Board of Supervisors should be changed to reflect two distinct communities of interest separated by Highway 41: the rural Westside (Proposed District 1) and the rural Eastside (Proposed District 4).

EMC's Proposed Map recognizes the significant differences between these two regions, whether we look at crops grown, soil type, or transportation patterns. Even their water comes from different sources. On the Eastside, the farms are smaller, with more communities that are more densely populated. On the Westside, the communities are fewer and farther apart, with much bigger farms and more mechanized agriculture, requiring less labor.

We are pleased District 1, as proposed by EMC, covers the entire rural Westside, everything west of Highway 41 and all areas of the City of Fresno west of Highway 99.

- Rural Cities: Firebaugh, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin. Proposed District 1
 ADDS Huron and Coalinga, which are now in District 4. The current District 4
 stretches 100 miles, from Coalinga to Orange Cove.
- Unincorporated communities: Biola, Cantua Creek, Five Points, Tranquility, and West Park. As proposed, District 1 ADDS Caruthers, Easton, Lanare, Raisin City, & Riverdale, which are now in District 4.

These unincorporated rural communities are among the poorest and most isolated, and lack the basic features of a safe, healthy, sustainable neighborhood—potable drinking water, sewer systems, safe housing, public transportation, parks, sidewalks, and streetlights. Moreover, these communities are systematically underserved in the overall allocation of public resources and are frequently overlooked in local decisions.

The Fresno County Rural Transit Agency transit routes shed light on transportation patterns in the rural Westside and support use of Highway 41 as the dividing line.

Westlands and Westhills College District are currently split into two supervisor districts, but EMC's Proposed District 1 includes:

- All of the West Hills Community College District located within Fresno County, including the main Coalinga campus and the Firebaugh campus.
- All of the Westlands Water District

For these, and many other reasons, and after carefully reviewing the Supervisorial District map proposed by the Fresno County Equitable Map Coalition and the Dolores Huerta Foundation, the Central Valley Leadership Round Table stands in strong support.

Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors and Members of the Advisory Redistricting Commission,

Redistricting, the drawing of new district boundaries, fosters fair and effective representation for all residents. How those districts are drawn will impact our lives for the next ten years.

Most Fresno County Supervisors have stated on the record that they want to keep the existing supervisorial districts largely the same, with only minor changes to balance population. This approach is not only a mistake; it is likely illegal. It sends a signal to County residents that the County Supervisors have predetermined this process before giving the public an opportunity to participate. This disregards the dramatic demographic changes that have occurred over the last few decades.

This approach is also contrary to law. This time, the Board cannot simply balance the population of existing districts (One Person, One Vote) and comply with the Voting Rights Act. The Fair Maps Act creates a new set of mandatory criteria that must guide the drawing of district lines. Keeping the core of existing Supervisor Districts intact is not one of the ranked criteria.

A different legal standard was in effect the last time the Board went through redistricting and adopted the 2011 District Map, and County Supervisors were permitted to consider or ignore traditional redistricting principles. But, a new supervisorial map in 2021 that is largely the same as the 2011 map (which is largely the same as the 2001) map would likely violate state law.

To ensure fair representation in Fresno County, the Advisory Commission and the Board of Supervisors must start with a blank slate. Public testimony must be heard and considered, and a map drawn that gathers together communities of interest with similar values, backgrounds, and characteristics. This is required by the California Fair Maps Act.

We ask that you approach this process with the intent of the law, that every resident of Fresno County be equally and fairly represented.

As the President of Nueva Alianza of the City of San Joaquin, I support and recommend the map proposed by the Fresno County Equitable Map Coalition. In their proposed Redistricting map for Fresno County, the Dolores Huerta Foundation has done a diligent job of ensuring that all diverse populations are able to participate and be represented.

San Joaquin is a severely disadvantaged, farmworker community in the center of the rural Westside of Fresno County. About half the 4000 residents are undocumented and live below the poverty level, and about 54% are renters. The Central California Coalition for Equitable Realignment (CCCFER) began meeting more than a year ago to lay the groundwork for community participation in redistricting discussions this year. Many of us had been involved with the process 10 years ago and recognized how challenging it was to ensure that the community was effectively informed and given every opportunity to engage.

We reached out to several community-based organizations and advocacy groups to collaborate. Earlier this year, when we learned of a larger Valley-wide collaborative, we combined our group with theirs. The Equity Coalition Map is the product of our collective input.

Board of Supervisor districts throughout the Central Valley are not currently designed to reflect the region's demographics or its diversity. Moreover, in previous cycles, the process has often been rushed, opaque and lacking community voices.

The Equity Coalition Map outlines a path to achieving equitable realignment. The map addresses the most problematic issue with the county's current districts, which is not respecting the east and west divide in rural farming communities. Indeed, the current District 4 runs from Orange Cove to Coalinga. How many people in Coalinga have ever been to Orange Cove? Or even know where it is?

Because these areas are heavily Latino, it also means that they share linguistic similarities.

These communities also have a more difficult time accessing broadband internet. According to ACS 2019 data, only 53.7% of Parlier residents have a subscription to broadband; only 60.3% in Orange Cove; and 68.9% in Reedley. When it comes to residents with a bachelors degree or higher, only 4.1% have one in Parlier; 1.6% in Orange Cove; and only 12.7% in Reedley.

Many residents in these communities also travel more than 20 minutes each day to work. Specifically, ACS 2019 data reveals that Kingsburg residents travel an average of 22.9 minutes; Sanger residents 26.7 minutes; Orange Cove 27.5 minutes and, Parlier 23.2 minutes.



The undersigned organizations used California's CalEnviroScreen's mapping tool to illustrate this point. This screening tool is particularly effective because it uses environmental, health, and socioeconomic information to produce scores for every census tract in the state. Under such screen, almost all of the communities in proposed District 4 have a CalEnvironScreen 3.0 Score of 91-100% or above. This means that these communities are some of the most environmentally burdened and vulnerable communities in California. The screen is also used by CalEPA and its departments to aid in administering environmental justice grants, promote compliance with environmental laws, prioritize site-cleanup activities and identify opportunities for sustainable economic development. As such, it is important that these communities remain "whole" to ensure that they benefit from the same grants and funding that could be available through the state using such screening tool.

When analyzing these communities further, these communities are similarly burdened by pollution and pesticides. According to the screening tool, the communities of Fowler, Kingsburg, Selma, Parlier, Kingsburg and the unincorporated communities in-between all have a pollution burden percentile in the 80 to 100 range and a pesticide range in the 90 to 100 percentile. *See* Images below.

These communities have and will continue to advocate for environmental protections, as illustrated by the screening tool. As such, they will benefit from remaining together in one district as proposed in the Equitable Map Coalition's map.

Residents who live in the communities in proposed District 4 also work in and harvest similar crops, including crops that are different from those grown in West Fresno County. For example, citrus and fresh fruit are more commonly grown in the communities of proposed District 4 while West Fresno County is known for row crops like processing tomatoes, garlic, alfalfa, and cotton. Specifically, in the Orange Cove Irrigation District, 75% of farmland is citrus and only 16% nuts and grapes. These differences are important because it impacts skills required to cultivate and harvest the different crops. In other words, the farmworkers in West Fresno County are more familiar working with row-crops while those in Sanger, Selma, and Parlier are more familiar with citrus.

Conclusion





The Central Valley Partnership (CVP) is a progressive network of labor unions, environmental organizations and community leadership with a mission to achieve social, racial, environmental and economic justice in the San Joaquin Valley of California.

Noting the history of exclusion, segregation and racism prevalent in the San Joaquin Valley, often resulting in the disenfranchisement of democratic voting for the region's residents, we strongly believe that fair maps must be drawn and approved this redistricting cycle, so that voters from underrepresented groups, communities of color and immigrant backgrounds have an opportunity to participate fully in our electoral system of government and to have their voices heard at the ballot box.

We preface our comment letter with reference to new Census data, which confirms that significant demographic changes continue to transform Fresno County.

While the Latino population has increased dramatically over the past 30 years, the opportunity for disadvantaged populations to elect candidates of their choice at the county supervisor level, has not kept pace. We see the Fair Maps Act of 2019 and the federal Voting Rights Act as opportunities and

requirements to do more than simply move a few census tracts between urban districts to equalize population.

After a thorough review of the district boundaries proposed by the Equity Map Coalition for the Fresno County Board of Supervisors, the Central Valley Partnership is in full, strong support of the map. The proposed districts are contiguous, respect neighborhoods and cities as well as communities of interest, have easily identifiable boundaries, and are compact.

We particularly support the use of Highway 41 as an easily identifiable artificial boundary between rural communities of interest in Westside and Eastside Fresno County. The two distinct regions have significant differences in the areas of agricultural economic drivers, education access, and transportation. Each region deserves to have its own representative that will meet its challenges and uplift its needs.

Under the proposed maps, the entirety of the Westside is kept whole. We support this because it would strengthen the Westside community of interest by including together all the area served by West Hills Community College District and Westlands Water District, and all the areas connected by Fresno County Rural Transit's Westside routes. The Westside has been divided for too long.

In order to meet population requirements and in keeping with the use of easily identifiable boundaries, the proposed map uses Highway 99 as a boundary and includes City of Fresno communities west of the highway with the rural Westside communities. There is precedent for this in the current Supervisorial District map and neighborhoods west of Highway 99 are tied to some of the rural Westside communities via the many farmworkers and ag-related employees living in this area.

City of Fresno neighborhoods in Southeast Fresno and Calwa are put in a proposed district with the rural Eastside cities in current Supervisorial District Four. We support this because these neighborhoods and cities together form a community of interest and are bound together by work, family, shared culture and religion, and socioeconomics. Additionally, together, they all face similar challenges around educational attainment, housing, and healthcare access. District Four includes all the rural towns connected by Fresno County Rural Transit's Eastside routes.

We support keeping the City of Clovis whole and together, anchoring its own supervisorial district and including areas with new growth along with the foothill and mountain areas. Willow Avenue serves as the border between the City of Fresno and the City of Clovis and should also serve as an easily identifiable artificial boundary between Supervisorial District Two and District Five, respectively.

The proposed districts for Central and North City of Fresno maintain the geographic integrity of neighborhoods and respects the ethnic communities of interest in the city's urban core. The Central Supervisorial District Three is largely preserved, along with well-established and historic neighborhoods of working class and low-income families. The North Fresno Supervisorial District Two is also largely preserved and uses well understood natural and artificial boundaries like the San Joaquin River, Highway 99, Shaw and Ashlan Avenues.

The latest Census data shows the great diversity and significant growth of Fresno County. That diversity is represented in the map proposed by the Equity Map Coalition, which creates three effective Latino majority districts, while also ensuring our Supervisors represent distinct regions and communities of

interest within our county. These proposed districts will result in policy, programmatic, and funding decisions that will have a positive and equitable impact for all residents of Fresno County.

We strongly support these proposed districts and urge your serious consideration and ultimate support for this Equity Coalition map.

Dear Members of the Advisory Redistricting Commission,

At last week's community workshop, Fresno County provided individuals the ability to participate remotely for the first time. It is however, equally important that Fresno County have processes set up to ensure the public not only can speak, but that all can understand each speaker's comments, and that the speakers' remarks are captured correctly. We have commented about this concern before and are writing to reiterate that the September 29 meeting again fell short of this expectation.

Examples of issues at the September 29, 2021, meeting include:

- Automatic translator did not work correctly for both English and Spanish speakers, leaving members of the public not able to comprehend what the speaker was saying if they spoke a different language than themselves.
- The moderator and recorder were not familiar with the names of Fresno County cities and unincorporated communities, nor where they are located. This caused several items to either be misspelled or misidentified (including communities of interest). In addition, the recorder failed to identify most communities the speaker did or did not feel connected to
 - League members as well as other individuals provided a few corrections in the questions and answers section of the zoom meeting, but lots of valuable COI information was not captured.
- There was no recorded acknowledgement of support for specific maps or similar comments previously recorded, leaving the impression that one person's comments could mean as much as a comment made by many individuals.
- One zoom user had ten speakers at their location. The moderator allowed all ten speakers to speak consecutively and stopped the public comment section right afterwards. This was unfair to other speakers patiently waiting their turn.
- Public comment period ended at 7:30PM for the consultant to talk about mapping presentation slides that the public has seen multiple times. When the mapping presentation was over, the moderator opened for public comments for individuals still online. At 8:00PM, the moderator noted that all public members had been able to speak, when in fact many had left the meeting, since he had stated earlier that the public comment period had concluded and others still had a raised hand when the meeting ended.

For future meetings we recommend:

- 1. Live translators be used for languages other than English.
 - a. Translators and moderator work in tandem to be respectful of the speaker and audience by asking the speaker to provide time for translators to inform the public of their message every couple of sentences.
- 2. The moderator gives clear rules at the beginning of the public comment section by informing the group:
 - The planned length of the comment period, however, should not be cut short if people want to speak. The Public Workshop / Public Hearing should focus on obtaining comments from the public and should not be cut short, without good cause.
 - How long each speaker can talk (giving additional time for speakers' messages that need to be translated)

Ask each speaker to inform the group if they are speaking as an individual or with a specific group and/or if they are speaking in favor of a specific map.

- Allow two speakers at a time from one location, other speakers need to get in line after other speakers wanting to talk have been heard.
- The consultant-employed recorder of notes must work with a County employee familiar with the region to ensure comments are properly recorded. Since Commissioners and Supervisors rely only on these notes, their accuracy is crucial.

We urge you, even at this late date, to correct these errors since public participation is not only critical but also a mandatory element of a fair and effective redistricting process. Since few opportunities remain for public participation, particularly from language minorities, we must insist that all means be taken to correct these flaws in the County's public participation.

My name is Socorro Santillan, Regional Director of Public Affairs for Planned Parenthood Mar Monte (PPMM)

PPMM operates two health care centers in the City of Fresno, one Regional Administrative office and a Call Response Center in Clovis. Our Fulton Street Health Center originally opened on Van Ness Ave in District 3 in 1971 before moving to Fulton Street. The original site serves as the organizations Regional Administrative & Education site. Both remain in District 3, employs 37 fulltime employees (FTEs), and served over 12,000 unduplicated patients in fiscal year 2021 (FY21).

Our Family First health center is located in District 2 and served over <u>9,000</u> unduplicated patients in FY21, and employs <u>27</u> FTE. Nearby in Clovis, District 5, is the PPMM Call Response Center which employs **73** FTE whose Response Agents assisted with over 1 million calls for appointments or questions in 2020.

Of our 21,000+ patients in Fresno County, 75% live below 100% of the Federal Poverty Level, 71% are between the ages of 20-34 and 76% identify as non-white. Patients served in Fresno are representative of all BOS Districts, and depending on where they live, Fresno County patients are also served at our Madera, Visalia, and even our Merced & Gilroy health centers. Services provided to residents outside of the county is often due to geographical proximity to their homes, work or college. It is also important to note that because of electronic health records, and telemedicine we are able to provide seamless, quality care for patients living in rural communities. It is important to note that rural residents often face limited access to health care due to a lack of public transportation and/or broadband internet connection due to cost or limited coverage.

PPMM has reviewed maps proposed by the two maps proposed by the Equity Map Coalition and the Fresno Inclusive Families for Supervisor district boundaries. We found both to be in compliance with the California Fair Map Act and thoughtfully drawn, however we feel strongly the Equity Coalition's Map makes more sense based on our experience with the Coalition. It makes sense with districts that are compact, easily understandable and best represents communities of interest and the Voting Rights Act.

We particularly endorse the Equity Coalition's grouping of communities of interest and the division of the rural areas on the Eastside and the Westside of the County, at Highway 41. There are significant differences between these two areas, and each deserves to have its own, dedicated representative. We feel it is notable that the entire Westside is kept whole for the first time, including the area served by West Hills College, Westlands Water District, and Fresno County Rural Transit's Westside routes.

PPMM strongly believes that including Southeast Fresno with the rural towns in District 4 makes perfect sense, since they are bound together by work, family, ethnicity and income levels, and collectively face the similar economic challenges and living conditions.

We enthusiastically support Clovis having its own Supervisor, based on the new growth in the foothill and mountain areas. We support the logical decision to establish Willow Avenue as the border between the cities of Fresno and Clovis, and also between Districts 2 and 5, respectively.

Finally, the proposed districts for Central Fresno and North Fresno group together communities of interest. Central District 3 is largely preserved, along with established neighborhoods of working class and low-income residents. And the North Fresno District 2 uses well understood boundaries like the San Joaquin River and Highway 99.

We know Fresno County, the sixth largest County by geography in California, is diverse in its residents, industry/business and geographical characteristics. This map will ensure our Board of Supervisors represents distinct regions of our County, and will result in policy, programmatic and funding decisions that will benefit all residents of Fresno County.

We believe the proposed Equity Coalition Map is compliant with the mandates of the California Fair Map Act, and best represents the demographic shifts that have happened over the last two decades. It is imperative that the Supervisor map in 2021 reflects these shifts and recognizes communities of interest.

For all of the aforementioned reasons, and many more, we strongly urge you to seriously consider the proposed Equity Coalition Map.

The Sierra Club is our nation's premier, volunteer-driven environmental organization, with more than 760,000 dues-paying members. Our Club's Tehipite Chapter covers four counties in the Sierra Nevada foothills and central San Joaquin Valley, including 1,330 members in Fresno County. Our Club's mission is, "To explore, enjoy and protect the planet. To practice and promote the responsible use of the earth's ecosystems and resources; to educate and enlist humanity to protect and restore the quality of the natural and human environment; and to use all lawful means to carry out those objectives."

The Sierra Club is best known for advocating for protection of the magnificent wildlands of the United States, and has played a significant role in preserving public lands, including Yosemite National Park, back to our founding by John Muir in 1892. In the past decade, however, the Club has recognized that we need to influence local government, as well, if we are to limit climate change, which is breaking our planet's life support system. For this reason, the Sierra Club is involved with electing and supporting elected officials with the courage to speak up on environmental issues, and has allied with communities on the front lines of the environment, including San Joaquin Valley residents confronting air pollution, toxic waste, or a lack of safe and affordable drinking water.

Our Sierra Club believes that elected government functions best when it makes decisions in the open, with transparency and accountability to the public. The California FAIR Map Act, passed in 2019, provides the guidance for local government to use in redistricting. The Act lays out clear guidelines for how political district lines, including County Supervisorial districts, need to be drawn in time for the 2022 elections. Districts must comply with seven criteria, in the following order: (1) equal population to comply with the U.S. Constitution; (2) compliance with the federal Voting Rights Acts to ensure minorities have an equal opportunity to elect representatives of their choice; (3) districts must be contiguous; (4) they must respect the boundaries of cities, counties, neighborhoods and communities of interest; (5) they should be geographically compact; (6) they should have two Assembly districts nested within each State Senate district; and (7) they shall not be drawn to favor or discriminate against an incumbent, candidate or political party. California Constitution article XXI; CA Government Code, §§ 8251 - 8253.6.

Despite these explicit instructions required by state law, three Fresno County Supervisors have stated on the record that existing Supervisorial districts, with very minor modifications, will be left unchanged in the current redistricting. This intransigence in the face of significant shifts in the County's demographics would, in our opinion, violate the California FAIR Map Act.

The Fresno County Equitable Map Coalition has done an impressive amount of work to carefully identify the Communities of Interest in our county, and to work to ensure these are not diluted by splitting them across County Supervisor districts in our proposed map.

For example, in our proposed map, Supervisorial District 4 is reduced to a manageable geographic size, combining the population centers along Highway 99 south of Fresno, from Calwa to Kingsburg, and adding in the farming communities of Reedley and Sanger. Also, Westside Fresno County is no longer arbitrarily split in two, and the western half of existing District 4 is merged with District 1. Also, District 5 includes East Clovis and the developing region of former farmland, now transforming into bedroom communities, and keeps the City of Clovis intact. Communities of Interest of District 5 are preserved, including the surviving groves of Sequoia trees and Sierra foothill tourism-oriented communities such as Squaw Valley.

In conclusion, the Sierra Club urges that you support the proposed map of the Fresno County Equitable Map Coalition. We believe it is healthy when government responds to the needs of the entire electorate rather than catering to the needs of a limited segment of our population, one which has historically had the ear of our Fresno County Supervisors.

I live in and own a home in Supervisorial District 2 of Fresno County.

My grandfather was a cattle rancher in Mariposa County. He told me there's two types of farmers and ranchers in Fresno County, those on the East Side and those on the West Side. He said they do things on their ranches, farms, and orchards differently because the land is different.

As I grew up, I watched Fresno's urban growth with interest. Manchester Center was built north of town. That was a time when south of downtown led to other businesses, parks, and homes. Clovis was a long drive and a different place separated from Fresno by orchards. It's downtown was built differently. Still is.

I think the five general areas look good on the Equity maps. Fresno County West Side, East Side with Clovis, and three Urban areas that I think of as North Fresno, Southwest Fresno, and Southeast Fresno County.

I particularly like that the proposed North Fresno district follows Willow Avenue as the boundary that has long served to define areas of influence between the two cities. The San Joaquin River is the northernmost boundary possible. Another line follows Highway 99 on the west and keeps North Fresno separate from the urban growth west of the highway. There's wiggle room along that line for District 1 and District 2 to equalize population counts, if required, keeping each area's own Board representation.

For the southern boundary of the proposed District 2, the Equity map generally follows Shaw Avenue. Most Fresno residents see Shaw Avenue as a boundary. As a long time resident, I see the people of Fresno County as having more in common than most will admit. We are thankfully a richly diverse people.

I know by living at 4 addresses over the last 45 years, that North Fresno has different community interests than Clovis, even though the Clovis School District runs across the north of the urban region. Our services and planning come from the City of Fresno. Clovis is the "gateway to the Sierras" and North Fresno is the north end of a large city.

The people I know, owners or renters, working, retired, school pupils from pre-K through post-graduate college-- All of them--do their activities mostly around their immediate neighborhoods, and then outward towards Clovis, towards CSUF, towards River Park and Fashion Fair and Fig Garden shopping centers and the many businesses within the mapped area. Restaurants, bars, small parks, biking and jogging, walking, churches, school activities, public meetings and the regional Woodward Park are within the District 2 Equity map, as proposed.

My name is Socorro Santillan, Regional Director of Public Affairs for Planned Parenthood Mar Monte (PPMM)

I'm here today to support the proposed Equity Coalition Map.

Planned Parenthood Mar Monte operates four service sites in Fresno County, 2 health centers, one Call Response Center and one Regional Administrative site. Combined they serve over 21,000 unique patients and employee 137 fulltime employees. These service sites are in Districts 2, 3 and 5.

Seventy-five percent of our patients live below 100% of the federal poverty level and 76% identify as people of color. These individuals are representative of ALL Board of Supervisor Districts and depending on where they live are also served at our Madera, Visalia, Merced & Gilroy Health Centers. Services provided to residents outside of the County is often due to geographical proximity to their homes, work or college. It is important to note that rural residents often face limited access to health care due to a lack of public transportation and/or broadband internet connection for Telehealth due to limited coverage.

We have reviewed maps proposed by the Equity Map Coalition and the Fresno Inclusive Families. We found both to be in compliance with the California Fair Map Act and thoughtfully drawn, however we feel strongly the Equity Coalition's Map makes more sense based on our experience with our patient population. The map makes sense with districts that are compact, easily understandable and best represents communities of interest and the Voting Rights Act.

We particularly endorse the grouping of communities of interest and the division of the rural areas on the Eastside and the Westside of the County, at Highway 41. There are significant differences between these two areas, and each deserves to have its own, dedicated representative. We feel it is notable that the entire Westside is kept whole for the first time, including the area served by Fresno County Rural Transit's Westside routes, West Hills College, and the Westlands Water District.

We strongly believes that including Southeast Fresno with the rural towns in District 4 makes perfect sense, since they are bound together by work, family, ethnicity and income levels, and collectively face similar economic challenges and living conditions.

We enthusiastically support Clovis having its own Supervisor, based on new growth in the foothill and mountain areas. We support the logical decision to establish Willow Avenue as the border between the cities of Fresno and Clovis, and also between Districts 2 and 5, respectively.

Finally, the proposed districts for Central Fresno and North Fresno group together communities of interest. Central District 3 is largely preserved, along with established neighborhoods of working class and low-income residents. And the North Fresno District 2 uses well understood boundaries like the San Joaquin River and Highway 99.

We know Fresno County, the sixth largest County by geography in California, is diverse in its residents, industry/business and geographical characteristics. This map will ensure our Board of Supervisors represents distinct regions of our County, and will result in policy, programmatic and funding decisions that will benefit all residents of Fresno County.

We believe the proposed Equity Coalition Map is compliant with the mandates of the California Fair Map Act, and best represents the demographic shifts that have happened over the last two decades. It is imperative that the Supervisor map in 2021 reflects these shifts and recognizes communities of interest.

For all of the aforementioned reasons, and many more, we strongly urge you to seriously consider the proposed Equity Coalition Map.

Fresno County's redistricting process has become controversial among some in our advocacy communities. They are claiming the process is unfair. They say the County's maps, as currently drawn, do not offer opportunities for those they represent.

They say Board of Supervisors' comments from April, hoping to keep their districts similar to the way they are now – six weeks before a Redistricting Commission was named and a month before a Redistricting Commission nomination period opened – was somehow an overt threat to the then nonexistent Redistricting Commission members.

Members of the Board of Supervisors also made those comments five months before census numbers for those districts were known because the numbers arrived late due to no fault of the County.

The advocacy groups are heard in redistricting meetings demanding three districts that are of a majority-minority population. They point to the Kern County case where the Mexican-American Legal Defense Foundation (MALDEF) successfully gained an additional majority-minority district going from one to two seats in Kern County.

They also point out that Kern County spent \$12 million fighting that lawsuit only to lose, a subtle warning that Fresno County will undergo a similar taxpayer expense only to suffer a similar fate.

But what they fail to mention is that among the County of Fresno's five supervisorial districts, three are majority-minority districts - between 59.4% and 72.7% Hispanic as of 2011 - and each of those districts are at a minimum 77% minority residents.

So, what's happened electorally since 2011, the date of the last redrawing of maps?

There have been five elections, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, and 2020, with those three majority-minority districts from 2011 and two majority white districts. In those elections, members of the Board of Supervisors, ran unopposed seven times, and were elected or re-elected by overwhelming numbers.

The highest percentage of votes against a current Board member was 42% in his initial election. No other opposing candidate eclipsed 38%, also in a first electoral run. Other second-place opponents got between 21% and 34%.

In the minds of these advocacy groups, those results apparently reflect an urgent need for large-scale changes even with three overwhelmingly minority-majority seats.

It helps to know who the advocates represent. Most Redistricting Committee meeting speakers are incorporated city residents who blame individual supervisors about issues such as policing, street work, sewers, drainage, and drinking water. Do they know they are represented by City Councils? Do they know that City Councils are responsible to them for these quality- of-life issues, not the Board of Supervisors?

Maybe, maybe not. But their apparent lack of knowledge is muddling the process and emphasizes even more forcefully that the advocates' fight for Redistricting is a straw horse posing as a Trojan horse.

The Redistricting Commission should be able to see through this sleight of hand strategy and propose maps accurately reflecting changes in the County of Fresno where changes are most merited and forward those to the Board of Supervisors for consideration.

At the Commission's 10.5.21 hearing, Dr. Tilton informed the Commission that he did not know whether NDC would be submitting its own maps. He stated that would be a decision the firm principals would make, and he did not know on what basis they would make it. The minutes of that meeting record his response: "Based on data, input and public comments from hearings, workshops, and County staff (not the Board of Supervisors), NDC will determine if an additional map is needed."

The maps submitted *by the public* included 14 maps that met the population-variation and contiguity requirements of the pertinent statutes. Two of those maps achieved population variations of 0.02%. Nevertheless, NDC itself submitted *three* maps, with significantly less compliant population variations (between 2.06% and 3.33%). No information has yet been provided the Commission about the decision to submit additional maps, or the criteria NDC used to draw the maps they submitted.

The purpose of this public comment is to ask those questions. (As my fellow Commissioners are aware, my own Board of Directors is meeting the same night as this next Commission meeting and therefore I cannot be personally present to ask these questions of Dr. Tilton myself.)

A) Why NDC maps at all, and why three?

- --What were *all* the factors motivating NDC to create not just one, but three, alternative maps?
- --Did NDC identify deficiencies in the publicly-submitted maps which required three NDC alternative

versions?

- --What were those deficiencies, specifically applying the statutory criteria?
- --Did NDC work with submitters in an attempt to correct any deficiencies in publicly-submitted maps before creating its own?
- --Why did NDC submit *three* alternative maps?
- --What are the operative differences among/between NDC's Maps 120, 121, and 122?
- --In making the decision to create its own alternative maps, with which County-affiliated individuals did NDC communicate—and specifically, which people?
- --If there were such communications, who initiated each of them?
- --If there were such communications, what were the concerns raised?
- --Who at NDC made the decision to create additional maps?
- --When was that decision made?
- --Did NDC need authorization from any County actor to create additional maps prior to doing so?
- --How many hours did NDC spend in creating the additional maps?

Of particular concern--two of NDC's maps (120 and 121) seem to reflect the predictions by four of the five sitting Supervisors that the Fresno County district map would only "shift relatively slightly" because of some "border changes based on population growth." NDC should provide Commissioners and the public with a full understanding of NDC's process in drawing 2 of 3 maps that so closely follow the existing supervisorial district boundaries. We'd like to understand, criterion by criterion and map by map, how each of the NDC maps is more compliant with both federal and FAIR MAPS Act requirements than the other maps submitted--if they are.

- B) How did NDC in its own maps apply the Communities of Interest (CoI) information submitted in public hearings and workshops, and public comment?
- --John Thompson has advised me that NDC did not map the Cols.
- --Since the Cols were not mapped, how did NDC incorporate the public's input about the Cols into its map-drawing process?
- --Especially since NDC did not map the Cols, how exactly *did* they use them?
- --Did NDC weight the Cols in any way? Various important boundaries and identifiers were mentioned numerous times—were these given more weight than Col identifiers that were mentioned only once or twice?
- --To which boundaries/CoI identifiers did NDC itself give greatest weight in drawing the maps it has submitted?
- C) Apart from the map-viewing tool, Commissioners should be able to see comparisons among/between the maps:
- --As a Commissioner, I would appreciate seeing comparisons among/between all the maps that have a population deviation of 3% or less—specifically in terms of:
- --the CoIs the commission collected during meetings, workshops, public comment on the website, etc; and
- --both the ethnicity and the voter-registration-by-ethnicity comparisons among/between maps.

As I cannot be present at the October 21 hearing, and some of these questions are somewhat complex and so do not lend themselves to oral answers in a public hearing setting, I would appreciate having answers in writing. Thank you so much!

The Inclusive Families Coalition and the Equitable Map Coalition both strongly support an open, inclusive, transparent and fair redistricting process that not only complies with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the California FAIR MAPs Act (2019), but produces a map that will effectively represent all Fresno County residents. For the reasons explained below, we respectfully request an additional Fresno Redistricting Commission hearing be scheduled.

The Fresno Inclusive Families Coalition includes the Central Labor Council, Communities for a New California Education Fund (CNC EF), the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the Fresno Metro Black Chamber of Commerce (FMBCC), Hmong Innovating Politics (HIP), and the Jakara Movement (JM) representing Muslim, Latino/Latinx, Black, Hmong, Punjabi, Sikh, working and low-income families in Fresno.

The Equitable Map Coalition (EMC) includes the Dolores Huerta Foundation (DHF), SEIU 521, Center for Race Poverty and the Environment (CRPE), Central Valley Leadership Roundtable, Sierra Club, Planned Parenthood Mar Monte, CA EnviroVoters (formerly League of Conservation Voters), Central Valley Progressive PAC, Leadership Council for Justice and Accountability (LCJA), Central Valley Partnership (CVP), Latino Educational Issues Roundtable, and hundreds of Fresno County residents who have completed Community of Interest Surveys especially in underserved areas and attended dozens of mapping workshops, coalition meetings, and educational webinars.

We write jointly to express our concerns about the remainder of Fresno County's redistricting process and provide recommendations to address those concerns.

Our primary concerns are:

- 1. No clear source of authority for how the commission will analyze redistricting criteria or uniformly and equitably evaluate proposed maps,
- 2. No consistent ability to provide public comment in preferred languages unhindered by arbitrary interference,
- 3. No opportunity for decision-makers to ask questions of the people and groups who have submitted maps, and
- 4. No opportunity to present community maps at the remaining hearings.

With regard to our first concern, Commissioners have asked for guidance on redistricting law but have been denied additional training. Per the California FAIR MAPs Act (2019) (See CA Elections Code section 21500), Commissioners and Supervisors must follow the ranked criteria, in the order and priority as follows:

- 1. The final map must have districts that are substantially equal in population.
- 2. The final map must comply with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. This requires Fresno County to include majority-minority districts where Constitutionally protected classes of people have an opportunity to elect candidates of their choice.
- 3. Each district is contiguous.
- 4. Keep local Communities of Interest (COI) and neighborhoods together.
- 5. Respect the geographic integrity of cities and census designated places.
- 6. Use easily identifiable boundaries like rivers, highways and major streets.
- 7. Each district is geographically compact, to the extent practicable.
- 8. Fresno County shall not adopt a map that favors or discriminates against a political party and cannot consider relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates when assessing communities of interest.

The FAIR MAPs Act established map-drawing obligations that were not in place when districts were drawn in 2011, such that the Board cannot simply balance the population of existing districts, keeping boundaries essentially the same and stay in compliance with the law. Fresno County has for many years had a majority of people of color, yet 80% of the Board of Supervisors are white men. As 2020 Census data show, 73.1% of Fresno County residents are people of color, triggering voting rights protections to ensure that the

fundamental right to vote of Constitutionally protected classes not be infringed. (See Also, The President's Office of Management and Budget's "Review of Racial and Ethnic Standards").

This Commission and this Board cannot simply maintain status quo district boundaries as they are substantially out of step with Fresno County's demographic changes and clearly prevent Constitutionally protected classes of people from electing candidates of choice. Indeed, we have heard countless residents give public comments that they do not have effective representation and that their representatives are not responsive to their needs.

Public Participation and Input

The California FAIR MAPs Act also requires Fresno County to engage public participation in good faith. Community voice is vital in this process as voters should choose who represents them, not the other way around.

Language access is a key part of engaging public participation in good faith. 45% of Fresno County residents speak a language other than English and 19% speak English less than very well. Existing law requires adequate translation services for both English and non-English speakers, but despite being on notice since the very first redistricting workshop in Riverdale that translation services were inadequate, Fresno County has never successfully accommodated non-english speakers.

For example, at the October 5, 2021 hearing, the disorganization of the county process and translation efforts caused the meeting to go off the rails and was genuinely disrespectful to non-English speakers. Residents should not be left crying and humiliated after trying to give a public comment. To not have thorough outreach and comprehensive translation services is to essentially exclude nearly half the population of Fresno County.

Finally, the public must be allowed the opportunity to present maps and answer decision-makers' questions about them. Then, public comment must be allowed to give input on all maps, even (and in some cases, especially) if it is "redundant". Speakers have been denied the ability to give public comment or to choose the content of their comment at all Fresno County redistricting hearings, and especially on October 5, 2021. People trying to work with a translator were especially undermined.

The California State Redistricting Commission has articulated a practical interpretation of the FAIR MAPs act in its "Mapping Playbook" document that states, among other things, that redundant public comment, even if it sounds "scripted," should be considered as it may reflect that the input is the will of a larger segment of the population. Fresno County should not limit comment based on redundancy or try to micromanage the content of the input being given.

For all of these reasons, we make the following recommendations:

- Provide Commissioners and Supervisors in-depth training and guidance on federal and state law prior to public hearings to narrow down proposed maps.
- Discontinue the use of NDC's presentation slides regarding Redistricting Rules and Goals which misleads
 Commissioners and the public. Federal and State law overrides any "Other Traditional Redistricting
 Principles."
- NDC must uniformly and transparently analyze how each map complies with the California FAIR MAPs Act (2019) criteria, in ranked order. For each map forwarded to the Board of Supervisors, NDC should articulate and post on the Fresno County redistricting website the specific FAIR MAPs criteria met and any deficiencies.

- Use the California Citizens Redistricting Commission's "Mapping Playbook" to properly evaluate all public input and especially Community of Interest testimony.
- Eliminate from consideration any map that only seeks to equalize population, without taking into account the requirements of the Voting Rights Act and California FAIR MAPs Act.
- Eliminate from consideration any map with a deviation above 10% (rounded up).
- Eliminate from consideration or deprioritize consideration of any map submitted anonymously, or that otherwise lacks supporting statements and transparency.
- Prioritize the presentation of community maps for which the authors are present to provide explanatory information and provide them with at least 10 minutes each to explain their map and demonstrate community support.

Redistricting following the census is intended to be one of the most inclusive exercises of our democracy where the voices of all residents and communities are heard, respected, and included in the drawing of district boundaries.

Given the extensive and long-standing deficiencies in Fresno County's Redistricting process and the voluminous list of proposed maps scheduled for consideration on October 21, 2021, we ask that the Commission schedule a second hearing to ensure the County meets its obligations to engage with the public in good faith and to properly and equitably evaluate the required state and federal criteria for all proposed maps.

The Inclusive Families Coalition and the Equitable Map Coalition both strongly support an open, inclusive, transparent and fair redistricting process that not only complies with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and the California FAIR MAPs Act (2019), but produces a map that will effectively represent all Fresno County residents. For the reasons explained below, we respectfully request an additional Fresno Redistricting Commission hearing be scheduled.

The Fresno Inclusive Families Coalition includes the Central Labor Council, Communities for a New California Education Fund (CNC EF), the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the Fresno Metro Black Chamber of Commerce (FMBCC), and Hmong Innovating Politics (HIP) representing Muslim, Latino/Latinx, Black, Hmong, Punjabi, Sikh, working and low-income families in Fresno.

The Equitable Map Coalition (EMC) includes the Dolores Huerta Foundation (DHF), SEIU 521, Center for Race Poverty and the Environment (CRPE), Central Valley Leadership Roundtable, Sierra Club, Planned Parenthood Mar Monte, CA EnviroVoters (formerly League of Conservation Voters), Central Valley Progressive PAC, Leadership Council for Justice and Accountability (LCJA), Central Valley Partnership (CVP), Latino Educational Issues Roundtable, and hundreds of Fresno County residents who have completed Community of Interest Surveys especially in underserved areas and attended dozens of mapping workshops, coalition meetings, and educational webinars.

We write jointly to express our concerns about the remainder of Fresno County's redistricting process and provide recommendations to address those concerns.

Our primary concerns are:

- 1. No clear source of authority for how the commission will analyze redistricting criteria or uniformly and equitably evaluate proposed maps,
- 2. No consistent ability to provide public comment in preferred languages unhindered by arbitrary interference,
- 3. No opportunity for decision-makers to ask questions of the people and groups who have submitted maps, and
- 4. No opportunity to present community maps at the remaining hearings.

With regard to our first concern, Commissioners have asked for guidance on redistricting law but have been denied additional training. Per the California FAIR MAPs Act (2019) (See CA Elections Code section 21500), Commissioners and Supervisors must follow the ranked criteria, in the order and priority as follows:

- 1. The final map must have districts that are substantially equal in population.¹
- 2. The final map must comply with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965. This requires Fresno County to include **majority-minority districts** where Constitutionally protected classes of people have an opportunity to elect candidates of their choice.²
- 3. Each district is **contiguous**.
- 4. Keep local Communities of Interest (COI) and neighborhoods together.
- 5. Respect the **geographic integrity of cities** and census designated places.
- 6. Use easily **identifiable boundaries** like rivers, highways and major streets.
- 7. Each district is **geographically compact**, to the extent practicable.
- 8. Fresno County shall not adopt a map that favors or discriminates against a political party³ and cannot consider relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates when assessing communities of interest.⁴

The FAIR MAPs Act established map-drawing obligations that were not in place when districts were drawn in 2011, such that the Board cannot simply balance the population of existing districts, keeping boundaries essentially the same and stay in compliance with the law. Fresno County has for many years had a majority of people of color, yet 80% of the Board of Supervisors are white men. As 2020 Census data show, 73.1% of Fresno County residents are people of color, triggering voting rights protections to ensure that the fundamental right to vote of Constitutionally protected classes not be

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infringed. (See Also, The President's Office of Management and Budget's "Review of Racial and Ethnic Standards"⁵).

This Commission and this Board cannot simply maintain status quo district boundaries as they are substantially out of step with Fresno County's demographic changes and clearly prevent Constitutionally protected classes of people from electing candidates of choice. Indeed, we have heard countless residents give public comments that they do not have effective representation and that their representatives are not responsive to their needs.

Public Participation and Input

The California FAIR MAPs Act also requires Fresno County to engage public participation in good faith. Community voice is vital in this process as voters should choose who represents them, not the other way around.

Language access is a key part of engaging public participation in good faith. 45% of Fresno County residents speak a language other than English and 19% speak English less than very well. Existing law requires adequate translation services for both English and non-English speakers, but despite being on notice since the very first redistricting workshop in Riverdale that translation services were inadequate, Fresno County has never successfully accommodated non-english speakers.

For example, at the October 5, 2021 hearing, the disorganization of the county process and translation efforts caused the meeting to go off the rails and was genuinely disrespectful to non-English speakers. Residents should not be left crying and humiliated after trying to give a public comment. To not have thorough outreach and comprehensive translation services is to essentially exclude nearly half the population of Fresno County.

Finally, the public must be allowed the opportunity to present maps and answer decision-makers' questions about them. Then, public comment must be allowed to give input on all maps, even (and in some cases, especially) if it is "redundant". Speakers have been denied the ability to give public comment or to choose the content of their comment at all Fresno County redistricting hearings, and especially on October 5, 2021. People trying to work with a translator were especially undermined.

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The California State Redistricting Commission has articulated a practical interpretation of the FAIR MAPs act in its "Mapping Playbook" document⁶ that states, among other things, that redundant public comment, even if it sounds "scripted," should be considered as it may reflect that the input is the will of a larger segment of the population. Fresno County should not limit comment based on redundancy or try to micromanage the content of the input being given.

For all of these reasons, we make the following recommendations:

Provide Commissioners and Supervisors in-depth training and guidance on
federal and state law prior to public hearings to narrow down proposed maps.
Discontinue the use of NDC's presentation slides regarding Redistricting Rules
and Goals which misleads Commissioners and the public. Federal and State law
override any "Other Traditional Redistricting Principles."
NDC must uniformly and transparently analyze how each map complies with the
California FAIR MAPs Act (2019) criteria, in ranked order. For each map
forwarded to the Board of Supervisors, NDC should articulate and post on the
Fresno County redistricting website the specific FAIR MAPs criteria met and any
deficiencies.
Use the California Citizens Redistricting Commission's "Mapping Playbook" to
properly evaluate all public input and especially Community of Interest testimony.
Eliminate from consideration any map that only seeks to equalize population,
without taking into account the requirements of the Voting Rights Act and
California FAIR MAPs Act.
Eliminate from consideration any map with a deviation above 10% (rounded up).
Eliminate from consideration or deprioritize consideration of any map submitted
anonymously, or that otherwise lacks supporting statements and transparency.
Prioritize the presentation of community maps for which the authors are present
to provide explanatory information and provide them with at least 10 minutes
each to explain their map and demonstrate community support.

Fresno Inclusive Families Map 1 Justification

The Central Labor Council, Communities for a New California Education Fund, the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the Fresno Metro Black Chamber of Commerce, Hmong Innovating Politics (HIP), and Jakara Movement (JM) brought residents together to inform a revised map that would keep communities of interest whole, provide a more accurate balance of representation, and would ensure a smaller percentage of population deviation.

The Fresno Inclusive Families map changes the current North - South divide that currently gives greater advantage to District 2 and District 5. The North Fresno and North Clovis metro area is where the voting propensity is very high and voters do not vote in favor of uplifting working families. These two parts of Clovis and Fresno have more in common with each other than they do really with the rest of the county. District 2 and District 4 on the revised map balances the representation and gives more voice to the working families across the entire county.

Note: The map submitted was redrawn using Maptitude that accounts for 2020 Census data (PL 94-171 Redistricting Data).

District 1

District 1 includes such a large amount of land, because it encompasses so many low density rural areas of the county. This Western region of the county is currently divided by Districts 1 and 4. This map would bring the West part of the county together and would give more voice to residents living in the West and developing part of Fresno. District 1 is consistently an agricultural district. It also uplifts Fresno's most historical black part of town (Southwest) by keeping it together with the rest of Southwest Fresno and West of the 99 together instead of being divided into Districts 1 and 3 as it is currently.

District 2

The Fresno Inclusive Families Map tells a more complete story of who is moving to Northwest Fresno and how there are complete 180-degree realities between neighborhoods in Northwest Fresno. In a quick Zillow search of sold homes in Figarden, Fresno, you will notice that some homes recently sold in the neighborhood Southeast of the Bullard & Marks intersection for an average of \$350k but in a bordering neighborhood closer to Van Ness Ave for an average of \$750k. Some even go above \$1 million. For example, families living in the neighborhood Southeast of the Bullard & Marks intersection work hard labor jobs, are more diverse, and overall live a completely different reality from the families more North of them and closer to or on Van Ness Ave.

Van Ness Ave is weirdly just East of Palm Ave, South of Shaw Ave and just East of Marks Ave, North of Shaw Ave. However, the same dichotomy previously mentioned exists South and North of Shaw Ave. This is why District 2 goes narrowly South until it meets the Herndon No. 39 Canal. The difference is most apparent when you drive through the part of Van Ness Ave that is commonly known as 'Christmas Tree Lane,' where it feels completely separated from the rest of the city.

District 3

It is important to understand that this area has become a vibrant and growing area for Hmong and Punjabi families and businesses as well.

Fresno Inclusive Families Map Version 2 Justification

The Central Labor Council, Communities for a New California Education Fund, the Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the Fresno Metro Black Chamber of Commerce (FMBCC), Hmong Innovating Politics (HIP), and Jakara Movement (JM) brought residents together to inform a revised map that would keep communities of interest whole, provide a more accurate balance of representation, and would ensure a smaller percentage of population deviation.

The Fresno Inclusive Families map changes the North-South divide that gives a more significant advantage to District 2 and District 5. The North Fresno and North Clovis metro area disproportionately votes at higher rates, the propensity is very high, and voters do not vote in favor of uplifting working families. These parts of Clovis and Fresno have more in common than with the rest of the county and should be treated as one community. On the revised map, district 2 and District 4 balance the representation and give more voice to the working families across the entire county.

Additionally, this map more accurately reflects the diversity and dispersion of our communities. There are approximately 5-8.5% Black/African Americans in each district, 9-12% Asian/AAPI, 40-60% Hispanic/Latino, and 30% White, except for District 2, which encompasses Clovis and the Foothill communities at 65% White. This distribution allows more community voices to be heard in the election of representatives from and for our diverse communities.

The current board of supervisors is 80 percent White and does not accurately represent our multicultural, multigenerational, and multi-industry county residents and interests. This map seeks to address that issue.

Note: The map submitted was redrawn using Maptitude which accounts for 2020 Census data (PL 94-171 Redistricting Data).

There are five priority concerns that unite our communities of interest and need for more accurate representation which drove the decision-making behind this map:

- 1. Access to affordable housing and economic opportunities
- 2. Community resources: such as parks and grocery stores
- 3. Infrastructure: including sidewalks, complete streets, water, and broadband access
- **4.** Environmental pollution: not limited to water and air quality
- **5.** Public safety: over-policing in certain neighborhoods and under-enforcement of specific activities like street racing, school zone speeding, etc.

These concerns are experienced differently in each district and the changing of boundaries will affect representation to move our shared concerns forward. For instance, public safety concerns are quite different west of Peach in the southern part of the county in comparison to the North East. However, more dollars have been spent in the last 10 years in the East on safety than anywhere else in the County.

These district boundaries restore wholeness to the historic Sunnyside community of interest which is currently split into three districts. This area has become a vibrant and growing area for Hmong and Punjabi families and encompasses their farming and transportation businesses, in close proximity to their cultural centers.

Re: Redistricting in the County of Fresno

As the city and county center has moved progressively North East over the last 40 years, Black families and communities have moved North into the 99 corridors and Central Unified School District areas near Bullard High. The county's current district boundaries disadvantage Black communities that live along the 99 corridor and in Southwest Fresno. We are split into multiple districts despite having unified interests and a limited presence in the Far Western part of the county, diluting our voice and voting power.

These communities along the 99 and in the Western part of the City of Fresno have seen significant growth in the last 10 years due to the unavailability of affordable housing in other parts of the city and county for multigenerational middle-income families. Our neighbors are primarily low-middle income, diverse Hmong, Sikh, MENA, and Latino multigenerational households. We live in the most diverse part of the county and that diversity should be represented on the board of supervisors.

Our shared interests include access to living wage jobs, health care, quality K-12 education, and opportunities for homeownership in our neighborhoods. Black community residents shouldn't have to move to the Northeast to live in new and quality homes simply because the County has directed significant investment for building new homes in those areas only.

West Fresno and Central Fresno along the 99 are different from Kerman, Mendota, Firebaugh, Coalinga, Huron, and Caruthers and we should not be a district that is over 90 percent rural and does not share the same diversity as they are primarily Latino/Latinx.

The district lines from over 20 years ago no longer reflect our communities. We have changed significantly and will continue to do so in the future. Respect all of our communities and do not simply equalize the current districts solely for population, with no respect to communities of interest, neighborhoods, and changing demographics. Doing so is immoral and illegal under the FAIR MAPs Act of 2019 and the Federal Voting Rights Act of 1965.

We hope that the voices of our communities will be heard in the redistricting process as it is our right following the census and your responsibility as our current

representatives.

My name is Pedro Navarro Cruz and I am a Community Organizer with CNC Education Fund and a district 3 resident. Looking at the current County Supervisorial Map, it is clear to see that affluent parts of the county gain a massive advantage in the way districts 2 and 5 are currently drawn. The North Fresno and North Clovis metro area is where the voting propensity is very high and voters do not vote in favor of uplifting working families. These two parts of Clovis and Fresno have more in common with each other than they do really with the rest of the county and therefore need to be mapped together in its own district. I do believe that both Inclusive Families Map captures a counter-narrative that will uplift families that have been marginalized the last 20 years. It is a sad truth that the Board of Supervisors in 2011 made very few changes from the maps drawn in 2001. This means that our maps have not changed meaningfully in 20 years, despite the County changing and growing. Changing the maps to reflect Fresno County's growth and evolution is not just required by law -- it is the right thing to do.

Chairman Abrahamian and Commissioners –

The Fair Representation Coalition of Fresno County is proud to present its draft map for consideration, enclosed with this letter.

FRC Fresno County submitted a draft map on Oct. 7, which is denoted as Public Map 101 on the Commission's website. Technical issues with Maptitude eliminated key design elements from the map ultimately sent to NDC and this Commission.

Enclosed in this letter is FRC Fresno County's finalized draft map and demographic data from Maptitude.

The FRC Finalized Map is compliant with the Voting Rights Act and preserves historic representation in accordance with Fresno County's population

The FRC Finalized Map contains contiguous boundaries that preserve historic representation of similarly-situated communities of interest. It does not favor or discriminate against members of any given political party, nor

The map is compliant with the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 through the preservation of three minority-majority supervisorial districts within the jurisdiction each with strong and effective voting power of their minority communities.

The FRC Finalized Map adjusts boundaries to accommodate the trajectory of Fresno County's population growth and shift

The 2020 Census exposed a continued east-ward shift in Fresno County's population, pointing to sizable growth within the City of Clovis and the southeastern portion of the City of Fresno.

Redrawing boundaries following a decennial census is not about reflecting a snapshot in time, but rather acknowledging changes between decades and accounting for future changes ahead.

Based upon the body of evidence, from building permits to proposed development within Fresno County, the last decade's trend of growth is only expected to increase with further development within the Southeast Growth Area (known as SEGA or SEDA) and the City of Clovis.

This map addresses the growth by bringing established communities on the border of districts into a single district while ensuring that the current District 5 (Magsig) continues to have sufficient space to accommodate future growth.

The FRC Finalized Map unites divided communities of interest from the 2011 Final Map

By seeking to reorient Fresno County's Supervisorial map to account for changes in population, FRC Fresno County successfully unites three divided communities of interest in Fresno County.

First, the map brings the El Paseo-San Joaquin River neighborhood of the City of Fresno (north of Herndon, west of Highway 99) into District 2 (Brandau), uniting neighborhoods of northwest Fresno.

Second, the map brings neighborhoods south of California State University, Fresno into District 3 (Quintero), which feature closer demographic and socio-economic similarities with neighbors to the south than to its previous easterly neighbors in District 5 (Magsig). This increases voting strength for the population of these neighborhoods.

Third, the map brings neighborhoods of Sunnyside in the City of Fresno south of the San Joaquin Rail-line into District 4 (Mendes) from District 5 (Magsig). These neighborhoods are transitional between Fresno County's rural and suburban communities and, based on demographics and socio-economics, are similarly situated to nearby neighbors in District 4.

And lastly, the map brings Buchanan High School and neighboring communities in the City of Clovis, along with future planned residential developments north of Shepherd Ave. along Willow Ave into District 5 (Magsig) from District 2 unifying neighborhoods of Clovis and allowing for imminent population growth.

Concerns about extrajudicial comments and consideration of updated draft maps

It has been brought to our attention that Commissioners have made extrajudicial comments that the Commission would not consider draft maps submitted after the Oct. 11 submission deadline.

We hope that the Commission will consider this finalized map from FRC Fresno County along with any and all updated or finalized maps from those who made submissions prior to the Oct. 11 deadline.

FRC Fresno County was made aware this week that finalized 2020 Census data was not properly incorporated into Caliper Maptitude's map-making software until after the Oct. 11 submission deadline, thereby rendering draft maps submitted at the deadline incomplete, subject to heightened population deviation, and therefore prejudicial for consideration.

We respectfully ask that this draft map, rather than Public Map 101, be considered as FRC Fresno County's submission due to the technical issues with Maptitude and the missing 2020 Census Data.

Refusal to consider this finalized map may warrant the exploration of legal options, including litigation, by FRC Fresno County.

Thank you for your consideration and commitment to fair representation in our community.



I personally feel like it makes sense to separate certain working class neighborhoods from districts where wealthier interests dominate. An example of this is grouping old figarden, Woodward Park, Clovis West and Buchanan High neighborhoods, and other parts of North Fresno and North Clovis together. But then moving other districts north of Shaw to other districts where the populations have more in common. I feel like it makes sense for example to group out certain neighborhoods of figarden where the homes cost a fraction of what most homes on Van Ness Ave cost and overall people live two different realities. Other neighborhoods north of Shaw that I would protect are Highway City, Herndon, Pinedale, El Dorado and apartment complexes near Fresno State and Tarpey Village in Clovis. COI Testimony from 10/5/2021 Meeting

Good afternoon commissioners, my name is Kaya Herron. I am a resident of the Board of Supervisors District 5 represented by supervisor Nathan Magsig. I've lived in Fresno for almost 5 years and the last two in Sunnyside. I previously lived in Highway City and in Old Fig off the loop and have had vastly different experiences living in the Northwestern and Southeastern parts of the city and county of Fresno.

In my professional capacity, I serve as the Deputy Director of the Fresno Metropolitan Black Chamber of Commerce, representing over 300 small businesses owned by Black, Latino, Asian other people of color in the Central Valley. In 2020 we were a countywide hub for African American census participation and a regional lead for the statewide My Black Counts Campaign to increase Black/African American participation in the census. Our work continued in 2021, hosting two community of interest sessions throughout the county engaging 22 Black residents ranging from local government leadership, small business owners, parents, and teachers.

Today I will share my lived experience in District 5 and desired boundaries to keep my community whole. There are five core concerns that unite our community:

- Access to affordable housing and economic opportunities
- Community resources: such as parks and grocery stores
- Infrastructure: including sidewalks, complete streets, water, and broadband access
- Environmental pollution: not limited to air quality, water quality and smoke
- Lastly public safety, over-policing, and under-enforcement of specific activities like street racing, school zone speeding, etc.

These concerns are experienced differently in each district and community. For instance, public safety concerns are quite different west of Peach in the southern part of the county in comparison to the North East.

Sunnyside is distinctly different from the North Eastern mountain communities that make up the bulk of the geographic territory in District 5 and should be respected as a COI with the following boundaries: Western Boundary-Peach Avenue; Eastern Boundary-De Wolf Avenue; Northern Boundary-East Clinton; and Southern Boundary-East Jensen. My community has more in common with Central and West Fresno than Eastern Fresno County and the mountain communities. The current supervisor districts dilute the voices of Black and Asian communities that live in Sunnyside and does not accurately represent our shared concerns and future.

I'd like to express my concerns on the process and ask questions of the commission, staff, and counsel, and would appreciate my questions be answered in writing.

Questions for Commission under agenda item 3:

- 1. When is the last day to submit public comment?
- 2. Will comments received prior to 10/21 be included in the notes shared with the commissioners?
- 3. Watching the live transcription of the notes from the public workshops, they have contained spelling errors, incorrect attributions, and lack significant detail. They are also not available on the website. How have or will the notes be prepared and reviewed prior to submission to the commissioners?
- 4. Meeting times have not been convenient or accessible for community members, including today's midday hearing.
- 5. Have the notes captured during the 5 sessions been transferred to the website? I've only been able to find them in the PowerPoint.
- 6. I strongly encourage the commission to request staff responsible for capturing the COI testimony provided verbally to post the notes to the county website to ensure that what was captured is accurate. In its current form testimony captured on the PowerPoint provided to the commission
- 7. I'd like clarity on the process of map being presented to the commission for evaluation prior to their recommendation to the supervisors. There was a specific mention from NDC staff earlier today that quote "8 maps have been submitted and only 5 have an equal population." Is NDC pre-screening the maps based on specific criteria prior to presenting maps to the commissioners? If so, why?

Again, thank you for the opportunity to provide my testimony regarding my community of interest, Sunnyside, and request that we be kept whole in the redistricting process, in a district separate from the mountain communities to the Northeast so our specific concerns can be addressed.

Hi John,

The League of Women Voters has attended most county redistricting meetings either in person and/or by Zoom. We continue to have some concerns with the redistricting process as listed below.

1. The note taking at the COI meetings has not adequately captured the essence of the verbal COI input. As such it will be difficult for commissioners to analyze the input unless they listen to all the recordings. What will be the process for analyzing COI input?

Response: The Advisory Redistricting Commissioners have been asked to carefully review the COI input and make comments on each map as to any COIs that they feel may be affected by a proposed map.

2. While we have been impressed with the number of maps submitted,

many of them demonstrate little variance from current districts. Some of the maps have been submitted anonymously without any supporting information. How will commissioners evaluate the maps without supporting documentation and a determination of the rationale behind the boundaries?

Response: The Advisory Redistricting Commission will evaluate each map based on the Fair Maps Act AB849 and Local Redistricting (AB1276).

4. Beyond federal and state criteria, what other criteria will be utilized to analyze the submitted maps? The state CRC has a mapping playbook, attached below, which could be beneficial for NDC and the commissioners to look at.

Response: Thank you for the copy of the CRC mapping playbook, I will forward this material to our Demographer at NDC.

5. The high volume of maps presented to commissioners would make it difficult for them to analyze all of them in depth in only one day. Will commissioners be given the option to request an additional day(s)?

Response: The Advisory Redistricting Commissioners were provided the NDC evaluated maps on Friday, October 15, so that they would have six days to review the draft maps individually, prior to the October 21, 2021 Commission Hearing. Unfortunately due to the delay in Census data, the availability of the consultant, and the regularly scheduled November 2, 2021 Board of Supervisors public hearing, there is no opportunity beyond October 21, 2021 to hold an additional meeting.

- I. **Data:** All mapping will be based on Statewide Database's Official 2021 California Redistricting Database, consisting of:
 - A. Adjusted P.L. 94-171 Redistricting Data with state incarcerated persons reallocated and federal incarcerated persons removed
 - B. Electoral datasets (Voter Reg. and Statement of Vote) on 2020 census blocks
 - C. Citizen Voting Age Population tabulations on 2020 census block geography
- II. Ranked Statutory Criteria (California Constitution, Article XXI, § 2):

 The following six criteria (A-F) are listed in order of priority. Some include related but non-statutory considerations. Lower-priority criteria only apply to the extent that they do not conflict with higher-priority criteria.

A. Equal Population:

- 1. Assembly, Senate, and BOE: as close to +/- 0% as possible but with deviation permitted by law ("reasonably equal population")
- 2. Congressional: as close to +/- 0% as possible ("population equality as nearly as is practicable")
- B. **VRA compliance**: Fulfill all Section 2 requirements
- C. **Contiguity:** Observe absolutely, with appropriate consideration for islands and permanent water crossings; never use point contiguity
- D. Cities, Counties, a City and County, Local Neighborhoods and Local Communities of Interest (note that the below sub-criteria of 1. Governmental Units and 2. Communities of Interest are not ranked within this criterion):
 - Governmental Units: The statutory requirement is to respect the integrity of "any city, county, city and county, local neighborhood, [and] local community of interest" (note that "local neighborhood" is not limited to an officially designated neighborhood)
 - 2. Communities of Interest
 - a) The statutory requirement is to keep together, to the extent possible, each community of interest, which is a contiguous population that shares common social and economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation

- By statute, defining communities of interest excludes any consideration of relationships with political parties, incumbents or political candidates
- c) Where COI submissions conflict, generally give greater weight to those that:
 - (1) Aid in satisfying other statutory criteria, especially higherranked ones
 - (2) Are more relevant to the district type being considered (e.g., a COI focused on a national park might bear more weight for a congressional district than an Assembly one)
 - (3) Seem to represent a larger segment of a community
 - (4) More closely fit the statutory definition of a COI
 - (5) Are given by someone located in that COI
- d) When an individual COI input submission is unclear or inconsistent with itself, generally give greater weight to the part of that individual submission that is more clear, specific, and central
- e) Give due but carefully considered weight to COI input given via official resolutions by elected bodies
- f) Give due but carefully considered weight to input by organizations; be aware of which interests a given organization does and does not represent, and be aware of how locally representative it actually is (or not)
- g) It is appropriate to consider COIs known to Commissioners through data or other documented evidence even if those communities have not submitted COI input
- h) Sheer quantity of input on a given COI is difficult to weigh; COI submissions are aids to identify and define COIs; therefore, quantities (whether many or few) should be duly considered but are not decisive
- In cases of multiple substantially identical COI input submissions that appear "scripted," generally evaluate the COI on its own merits, noting the above considerations about quantity of input; do not discount such input merely for seeming "scripted"
- j) Be open to ways a heterogeneous region may nevertheless "share common social and economic interests"
- Consider racially framed COI input in the context of all other traditional redistricting criteria, so that race is never a sole or predominating factor (except as needed for VRA compliance)
- Give appropriate care and consideration to the possibilities of covert motivations and sources of COI input; factually questionable input can be checked or ignored; use a critical lens to discern attempts to reverse engineer districts; always look for actual evidence
- m) If testimony alone is insufficient to fully define a given COI, it may be helpful to seek current and valid demographic, economic, historic, land-use, and other data (e.g., via reports written by local

communities about their own issues); and perhaps make inperson visits

- 3. Areas that are not specified by statute but overlap with the statutory Government units and Communities of Interest include:
 - a) Unincorporated communities and Census Designated Places (which are typically larger than a neighborhood and sometimes as large as a small city)
 - b) Current state election districts, which will be considered per Attachment #1, "Consideration of Current District Boundaries"
- E. Compactness: Not bypassing nearby areas of population for distant ones
- F. **Nesting**: Two whole, complete, adjacent Assembly districts per Senate district; ten whole, complete, adjacent Senate districts per Board of Equalization district

G. Exclusions:

- We will not consider the place of residence of any office holder or candidate
- 2. We will not or draw any district with the intention of favoring or disfavoring any officeholder, candidate, or party

III. General Mapping Sequence:

- A. Areas with potential/probable VRA districts (Assembly, Senate, Congressional)
- B. Assembly plan
- C. Senate plan
- D. Board of Equalization plan
- E. Congressional plan

As to each plan, the Commission will start with more densely populated areas, such as those in Los Angeles County, and will move towards comparatively less populated areas.

IV. Mapping Process: As set out in Attachment #2, "Line Drawing Phases Plan"

V. Some General Principles:

- A. Document all decisions and their reasons, including incremental (and not just final) ones
- B. Consult the most current data available, remembering that the 2011 maps are a decade old
- C. "Share the Gain & Pain"--spread the costs and benefits of mapping decisions; e.g., if a city must be split in one plan, consider keeping it whole in another plan
- D. Be open to resolving similar issues in different places in different ways
- E. Remember: "The cleanest option is not always the best" Justin Levitt
- F. Remember: we are neither in the incumbent protection business nor in the wrecking ball business

That the Equity Coalition Map was generated by the community,
That the Equity Coalition Map complies with all laws and requirements, and
That the Equity Coalition Map is an equitable distribution of voting power in Fresno County

1. Fresno County Redistricting Data

a. Total Population

The Equitable Map Coalition's October 5, 2021 submission package used an unadjusted total population of 1,008,511 that was later adjusted by the State of California to 1,008,526. The attached Equity Coalition Map Submission Package has been updated to reflect the adjusted

Statewide Database total population of **1,008,526** and the attached data tables have been updated.

The total Fresno County population being used by National Demographics Corporation (NDC) is incorrect. According to the Fresno County Redistricting Website accessed on 10/20/21, NDC lists the total population of Fresno County as **1,008,530**³. According to the California Statewide Database, the final adjusted total population of Fresno County is **1,008,526**⁴. The Fresno County Redistricting website continues to show NDC is using a total population that does not match the final adjusted Statewide Database.

a. Total Fresno County Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP)

With regard to the total number of Citizen Voting Age Population (CVAP) in Fresno County, the Equitable Coalition Map Submission Package has been updated to reflect total Fresno County CVAP as **590,160**, which matches the California Statewide Database exactly. By contrast, NDC's most recent data table⁵ states that CVAP for Fresno County is **585,047** which is incorrect as it differs from the Statewide Database by **5,113** people.

Finally, we note that NDC used Maptitude software to analyze proposed maps. A public comment was submitted on October 20, 2021 outlining concerns that Maptitude has not been updated to reflect the current data and may be analyzing maps incorrectly.

As the Equitable Map Coalition does not use Maptitude, this concern would not apply to any Equity Coalition Map submission. All Equitable Map Coalition submissions were created using ArcGIS by ESRI and Statistical Analysis System (SAS).

We respectfully request that all data and software used by Fresno County or its consultant NDC in its redistricting process be checked and verified with official State of California Redistricting data, and that Public Notice be given at the completion of this verification process, before this Commission decides which maps will be advanced to the Board of Supervisors.

3. Supporting Information for the Updated Equity Coalition Map

We ask that this Fresno County Advisory Redistricting Commission recommend that the Fresno County Board of Supervisors adopt the Equitable Map Coalition's updated map.

The Equity Coalition Map is data-driven including key <u>equity indicators</u> and refined every week for 9 months in an inclusive process that began with the collection of hundreds of Community of Interest Surveys at food banks, vaccination clinics and flea markets, then inviting those residents and anyone else interested in fair maps to work with a demographer to make the map even more responsive to Fresno County's needs. The EMC Map draws lines that give all Fresno residents the best opportunity to elect candidates of their choice, no matter their race, ethnicity or zip code.

The 2020 Census data confirm that significant demographic changes continue to transform Fresno County.

While the Latino population has increased dramatically over the past 30 years, the opportunity for disadvantaged populations to elect candidates of their choice at the County Supervisor level, has not kept pace. The FAIR MAPs Act of 2019 and the federal Voting Rights Act (VRA) require Fresno County to do more than simply move a few census tracts between districts to equalize population.

A different legal standard was in effect the last time the Board went through redistricting and adopted the 2011 District Map, and County Supervisors were permitted to consider traditional redistricting principles and minimize change to existing districts. But a new supervisorial map in 2021 that is largely the same as the 2011 map, which is largely the same as the 2001 map would likely violate state law.

To ensure fair representation, the Advisory Commission and the Board of Supervisors must start with a blank slate, hear and consider public testimony, and approve a map that respects

communities of interest with similar values, backgrounds, and characteristics, as required by the California FAIR MAPs Act.

The constitutionally protected class of people most likely to trigger VRA obligations in Fresno County is the Latino population because Latinos are 53.6% of the total population. The EMC map draws three districts with Latino Citizen Voting Age Population (Latino CVAP) over 50%:

- District 1, in the rural Westside with a Latino CVAP of 54.1%,
- District 3, in the southern urban core of the City of Fresno; Latino CVAP of 51%, and
- District 4, in the rural Eastside with a Latino CVAP of 63.3%.

EMC closely followed the ranked criteria, in the order and priority laid out in the FAIR MAPs Act:

- 1. Each proposed Supervisor district is **contiguous**.
- 2. Local Communities of Interest and neighborhoods have been kept together.
- 3. The geographic integrity of cities and census designated places has been respected.
- 4. Easily identifiable boundaries like rivers, highways and major streets are used.
- 5. To the extent practicable, each proposed district is **geographically compact**.

Importantly, the FAIR MAPs Act **prohibits** the consideration of political advantage, disadvantage or incumbency. The EMC Proposed Map did not consider any political data, political candidate or incumbent information when drawing proposed district boundaries.

The EMC proposed map complies with the laws that guide how local governments draw their district lines and we strongly believe it deserves your serious study and consideration. We thank you in advance for your willingness to consider the EMC proposed map, which we believe best meets the spirit and the letter of the laws regarding redistricting in California.

Equitable Map Coalition's Revised District Map for the Fresno County Board of Supervisors

Proposed District 1 covers the entire rural Westside of the County, west of Highway 41.

- Cities: Firebaugh, Kerman, Mendota, San Joaquin & City of Fresno west of Highway 99.
 ADDS Huron, & Coalinga.
- Unincorporated communities (CDPs): Biola, Cantua Creek, Five Points, Tranquility, & West Park. ADDS Caruthers, Easton, Lanare, Raisin City, & Riverdale.

Proposed District 1 continues to include areas in the City of Fresno west of Highway 99 BUT LOSES most of the area from Highway 99 east to the Santa Fe railroad tracks EXCEPT the area between Shaw and Ashlan Avenues.

Proposed District 1 preserves the geographic integrity of:

- West Hills Community College District
- Westlands Water District
- West Fresno and the Southwest Fresno Specific Plan area covering the area south of Highway 180 to North Ave, Valentine/Marks east to Highway 41.
 - Washington Union High School District: the portion that lays west of 41 is kept with historic West Fresno to the north
- West Area Neighborhoods Specific Plan, covering the area west of Highway 99, east of Garfield Avenue, and generally north of Clinton Avenue
 - Central Unified School District areas: Most of Central Unified is West of Highway
 99, and has significant communities of Punjabi/Sikh, African Americans, Hmong, and AAPI residents, whose children attend Central Unified.
- Highway City, a community near the junction of Highway 99 and Shaw Avenue
- Jane Addams neighborhood, cut off from the rest of Fresno by Highway 99

Proposed District 2 becomes a true North Fresno District, from Golden State Boulevard / Highway 99 east to Willow Avenue, the dividing line between the cities of Fresno and Clovis, and from the San Joaquin River south to Shaw or Gettysburg Avenue. Proposed District 2 continues to include the Old Fig Garden community, while adding the area north of Shaw, from Highway 99 east to the Santa Fe railroad tracks, as well as the area from Shaw to Gettysburg, east of First Street.

Proposed District 2 preserves the geographic integrity of:

- Bullard, Hoover and Woodward Park Plan areas
- Woodward Lake, Fort Washington, Van Ness Extension, Sierra Sky Park and San Joaquin River Bluffs
- Pinedale
- County islands around Bullard High School

- Fig Garden Loop
- Old Fig Garden
- California State University Fresno campus and off campus student housing near campus
- El Dorado Park, a Southeast Asian community west of Fresno State
- Significant Muslim communities in neighborhoods surrounding Mosques at Shaw & Cedar and Herndon & Milburn

Proposed District 3, the Central Fresno District, maintains its focus on Fresno's central core and the many working class and low-income residents there, but shifts slightly north. It maintains its character as a central Fresno district and government center, with Downtown, Community Regional Medical Center, Cultural Arts District, and the Tower and Mayfair Districts. Proposed District 3 is bounded by Highway 99 to the west, Clovis Avenue to the east, Ashlan or Gettysburg Avenues to the north and Kings Canyon Avenue to the south.

Proposed District 3 preserves the geographic integrity of:

- Downtown Fresno
- Chinatown
- Cultural Arts District
- Lowell-Jefferson Neighborhoods
- Tower District, Tower District Specific Plan
- Mayfair District
- Blackstone Corridor
- Huntington Boulevard
- Hmong & Asian American communities of interest:
 - Fresno Interdenominational Refugee Ministries (FIRM) and surrounding neighborhoods including Somerset Apartments
 - Romain Park and surrounding neighborhoods
 - First & McKinley Shopping Center, an Asian American business COI
 - Asian Village and Southeast Asian businesses along the Kings Canyon corridor east of Chestnut

Proposed District 4 covers all the rural towns and communities east of Highway 41.

- Cities: Fowler, Kingsburg, Orange Cove, Parlier, Reedley, Sanger, & Selma and ADDS the older urban neighborhoods in Southeast Fresno.
- Unincorporated Communities (CDPs): Del Rey, Laton, & Malaga. ADDS Calwa.

We propose to **ADD** older urban neighborhoods in Southeast Fresno (south of Kings Canyon Avenue), and Calwa, as we strongly believe they share socioeconomic similarities with residents in the rural communities on the Eastside, that warrant being in the same district. In this heavily Latino district, many families share immigrant backgrounds and are limited English proficient. They live in high poverty areas in crowded housing, with work both

low wage and seasonal, and difficulty accessing health and social services. Many travel to work in the surrounding fields and packing houses or other ag-related jobs.

Proposed District 4 preserves the geographic integrity of:

- Calwa and Calwa Parks & Recreation District
- Malaga
- Vang Pao Elementary School with strong AAPI & African American COIs
- Central Southeast Area Specific Plan area covers most of the 2,200 acres just east and southeast of downtown, even though NOT a cohesive neighborhood (see below)
- South Central Specific Plan (SCSP) Area aka the Industrial Triangle.
- Selma Kingsburg Fowler County Sanitation District
- Southeast Regional Disposal Site (SERDS)

Proposed District 5 respects the geographic integrity of the City of Clovis, unlike the current District, and continues to capture the new growth and rural residential areas east of Clovis Avenue, as well as all the foothill and mountain communities of eastern Fresno County.

- Cities: Clovis and new growth areas in the City of Fresno, east of Clovis Avenue
- Unincorporated Communities (CDPs): Auberry, Centerville, Friant, Huntington, Millerton, Minkler, Prather Shaver Lake, Squaw Valley, Sunnyside, and Tarpey Village.

Willow Avenue, which divides Clovis and Fresno, is the western border, which shifts east to Clovis Avenue in the City of Fresno. This Proposed District 5 no longer juts into the City of Fresno, between Shaw and Ashlan Avenues, east of First Avenue.

Proposed District 5 preserves the geographic integrity of:

- City of Clovis
 - Loma Vista Specific Plan, Clovis' Southeast Urban Center, from Bullard Ave south to Gould Canal, and east from the existing Clovis city limit on Locan to McCall. Substantially built out.
 - Heritage Growth Specific Plan, Clovis' Northwest Urban Center, from Shepherd to Copper Ave, and from Willow to Sunnyside Ave.
- Tarpey Village
- Melody Park and surrounding neighborhoods at Shields & Fowler Ave, a significant Hmong COI
- Clovis East High School attendance area, with significant Punjabi/Sikh and Asian American COI
- Sunnyside
- Valley floor communities, including Minkler, Centerville, and Friant
- All foothill and mountain communities

Easily Identifiable Boundaries.

To make sure each district has the opportunity to select a representative responsive to their region's concerns, our map proposes several easily identifiable boundaries, including Highway 41 / South East Avenue, Highway 99 / Golden State Boulevard, Shaw Avenue, Gettysburg Avenue, Willow Avenue, Clovis Avenue, Kings Canyon Road, Butler Avenue, California Avenue, and American Avenue.

Rationale for Dividing Rural Westside District & Rural Eastside District at or near Highway 41

The current map for the Fresno County Board of Supervisors' districts should be changed to reflect two distinct communities of interest separated by Highway 41: the rural Westside (Proposed District 1) and the rural Eastside (Proposed District 4). Our map recognizes the differences between these two regions, whether we look at cropping patterns, soil type, or sources of water.

On the Eastside, the farms are smaller with more communities that are more densely populated. On the Westside, the communities are fewer and farther apart, with much bigger farms and more mechanized agriculture, requiring less labor. The soils are different, as well as the crops grown. The Eastside grows citrus and fresh fruit, whereas the Westside grows almonds, pistachios, tomatoes, garlic and melons. Even their water comes from different sources. Most of the Westside gets its water from Northern California and, as the Westlands Water District knows well, the supply is unreliable and at times provides minimal to no water allocation. The Eastside has more reliable sources of water from Sierra runoff and the San Joaquin and Kings Rivers but has drinking water contamination problems unique to their area. Other significant differences include higher education. The proposed map correctly places Reedley College with the Eastside Proposed District 4 and West Hills College District in the Westside Proposed District 1.

In sum, this map makes sense, preserves communities of interest, and will result in five districts that have representatives responsive to their region's concerns. This proposed map fully meets the requirements of California's FAIR MAPs Act and we urge its consideration.

The Fresno County Rural Transit Agency (FCRTA) transit routes shed light on transportation patterns and support the use of Highway 41 as the dividing line, separating rural Fresno County into a Westside District and an Eastside District. https://www.ruraltransit.org/wp-content/uploads/2018/10/FCRTA_20180701.jpg

- Rural transit services serving the rural Westside are all in Proposed District 1. These
 routes connect Firebaugh, Mendota, Kerman, San Joaquin, Huron and Coalinga, and
 unincorporated communities like Cantua Creek, Tranquility, Five Points, Raisin City,
 Riverdale, and Easton, with each other and downtown Fresno.
- Rural transit services serving the rural Eastside are all in Proposed District 4. These
 routes are designed to transport rural residents to the other Eastside communities, and
 connect Kingsburg, Reedley, Selma, Fowler, Parlier, Orange Cove, Sanger, and Del Rey
 to downtown Fresno

Community College Districts:

- State Center Community College District (SCCCD). Several State Center campuses serve Fresno County students at:
 - Fresno City College Campus (Proposed District 3)
 - Reedley College (Proposed District 4) several FCRTA transit routes travel through the Eastside rural towns to Reedley College
 - Clovis Community College (Proposed District 5)
 - West Fresno Campus under construction (Proposed District 1)
- West Hills Community College District. Proposed District 1 includes all the West Hills
 Community College District in Fresno County. The main campus of West Hills College is
 in Coalinga, with classes offered at the Firebaugh campus, all within the Proposed
 District 1. Currently, Firebaugh and Coalinga are in different supervisorial districts.

Relevant Communities of Interest (COI):

Proposed District 1:

- Keeps West Hills Community College District intact.
- Keeps Westlands Water District ("Westlands") intact. The current map splits Westlands into two supervisorial districts. Westlands, the largest agricultural water district in the nation, is made up of more than 1,000 square miles of prime farmland in western Fresno County. Westlands has federal contracts to provide water to 700 family-owned farms that average 875 acres in size. Westlands is 15 miles wide, beginning just west of Highway 5, and 74 miles long, from Firebaugh and Mendota on the north, south through Huron and Coalinga to the Fresno County border. Annual crop production is over \$1 billion. The water the CVP delivers to Westlands is pumped from Northern California, through the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, and then through the Delta-Mendota Canal to the San Luis Reservoir. It is unreliable. https://wwd.ca.gov/wp-content/uploads/2021/01/Westlands-Blue-Map.compressed.pdf
- Land subsidence. Groundwater pumping has led to severe overdrafts and widespread land subsidence, which is most prominent on the Westside, due to clay soils that, once tapped, tend to collapse. Once aquifers collapse, the damage is permanent as they can never be refilled, even during wet years. - West Fresno and Southwest Fresno Specific Plan. West Fresno residents have been ignored for decades. On any measurement, from income to health to the environment residents are poorer and sicker than elsewhere in Fresno. The most recent <u>CalEnviro</u>

- Screen pollution map shows the West Fresno census tracts score at the 98th percentile or higher, meaning they are more polluted than 98% of all census tracts in California. Life expectancy is more than 20 years shorter than residents in North Fresno, the poverty rate is nearly double the rest of Fresno, and home ownership significantly lower. The business sector is small and struggling, and unemployment and crime are high. The Southwest Fresno Specific Plan, which covers the area south of Highway 180 to North Ave, Valentine/Marks east to Highway 41, was approved in October 2017 and provides a strong vision for transforming West Fresno. See two Fresno Bee Editorials dated 7-25-21, See *Fresno's great shame: City must apologize for its terrible legacy of racist policies* and *West Fresno residents have strong vision for their area.* https://www.fresnobee.com/opinion/editorials/article252963163.html.
- West Area Neighborhoods Specific Plan. This area is home to over 38,000 people 42% Latino, 14% Asian, 9% black and 20% white. Due to piecemeal development and county islands, residents complain of developer driven planning, traffic congestion, few public transit options, lack of safe routes to schools, lack of access to health care, and minimal infrastructure to support growth plans.
 - Significant populations of Punjabi/Sikh, African Americans, Hmong, and AAPI residents reside in West Area neighborhoods and their children attend Central Unified which provides a sense of community for many residents living West of Highway 99. The Sikh Temple creates a sense of belonging for the many Punjabi residents.
 - The West Area Neighborhoods Specific Plan covers the area west of Highway 99, generally north of Clinton Avenue and east of Garfield Avenue. https://www.fresno.gov/darm/wp-content/uploads/sites/10/2018/03/West-Area-Map.pdf
- Highway City is an unincorporated community near the junction of Highway 99 and Shaw Avenue, although a portion has been incorporated into the City. The community, named Highway City by fig grower J. C. Forkner, was a railroad shipping center. Bisected by the realignment of Highway 99, which opened in 1960, and Shaw Avenue, lots of asphalt, cars, and noise pound Highway City every day. Residents often feel treated like orphans. Their Community Center in a small public park is just north of Shaw Avenue. The boundaries are from Barstow to Gettysburg, and Hayes Ave east to the Union Pacific tracks.
- Jane Addams neighborhood ("Addams"). Cut off from the rest of Fresno by Highway 99 and the railroad tracks, Addams has suffered decades of under-investment. 6,700 residents live in Addams, half live in poverty and 77% live below 200% of the poverty line. Over half of renters pay more than 30% of their income on rent. Of the 1,200 rooms on Motel Drive, many serve as families' primary residence. Recently, many motels were rehabbed to house the homeless, creating new challenges. Home to the most vacant land and more mobile home parks, the immediate need is for quality, safe affordable housing for low-income and moderate-income families. The boundaries are Census

#
Tract 20, from Highway 99 on the east, to Marks Avenue on the west, and from Clinton
Ave on the north to Belmont Avenue on the south.

- Easton is a census-designated place located 7.5 miles south of Downtown Fresno. This rural community has just over 2,000 residents, 63% of whom are Latino. Mr. Easton bought 7680 acres of land in 1878 and formed the Washington Irrigated Colony. Those buying 20-acre farms got a lot in the town nearby. Washington Union High School provides a sense of community for many Easton residents. Easton celebrates its Portuguese heritage each year at the Portuguese Festa Parade; the C.P.D.E.S Hall provides a spirit of camaraderie for Portuguese in the surrounding area and dairies.
- Unincorporated rural communities in our Proposed District 1 are among the poorest and most isolated, and far too many lack some of the most basic features of a safe, healthy, sustainable neighborhood—potable drinking water, sewer systems, safe housing, public transportation, parks, sidewalks, and streetlights. People of color make up a disproportionate number of those living in these underinvested neighborhoods. These unincorporated rural communities are systematically underserved in the overall allocation of public resources and are frequently overlooked in local decisions. Proposed District 2:

- Encompasses Bullard, Hoover and Woodward Park Plan areas, with few exceptions. https://www.fresno.gov/darm/wp-content/uploads/sites/10/2016/10/planbnds1.pdf
 - o **Bullard Community Plan area** (1988): Union Pacific railroad tracks to Blackstone Avenue, San Joaquin River south to Ashlan Avenue.
 - Hoover Community Plan area (1980): Blackstone to Fresno/Clovis border at Willow Avenue, Herndon Avenue south to Ashlan Avenue.
 - Woodpark Community Plan area (1989, 2003): is bounded on the south by Herndon Avenue and on the north by the San Joaquin River and Copper Ave, and from Blackstone Avenue east to the Fresno/Clovis border at Willow Avenue.
- Woodward Lake and Fort Washington are among the wealthiest areas in Fresno on the northeastern edge of the City. Moderate to above-average priced single-family homes in Woodward Lake were constructed during the late 1980s to mid-1990s in lowdensity neighborhoods. The area is named after Woodward Park, a 300-acre regional park donated to the City in 1968. The Fort Washington subdivision was constructed in the 2000s and includes large custom homes, a manmade lake and two country clubs.
- Van Ness Extension is a North Fresno neighborhood with wealthy residents, large homes and large lots. Many homes surround a manmade lake. Van Ness Extension covers the area from Shaw Avenue north to the San Joaquin River, and Fruit west to Marks. Sierra Sky Park, an aviation community to the west, allows residents to taxi their

- private planes along roads shared by cars and airplanes. Each house has its own hangar. The **San Joaquin River Bluffs**, north of Herndon Avenue, is home to many large homes with easy access to the San Joaquin River. Until recently, two country clubs bordered the south bank of the San Joaquin River
- Old Fig Garden is a County island which the city of Fresno, through annexations, has entirely circled. This desirable residential neighborhood, set within a mature urban forest, has a rural quality, an eclectic mix of homes, and lacks traditional city amenities such as streetlights and sidewalks. The area has its own police protection district. The Fig Garden Homeowners Association was founded in 1947 and Beautification Ordinances safeguard its traditional large lots with tree-lined streets and required setbacks. Van Ness Boulevard, the main axis, transforms into Christmas Tree Lane each year.
- California State University Fresno. Fresno State, with 25,000 students helps a diverse cross-section of the region's residents succeed, including nontraditional students and historically underrepresented groups. Athletics programs draw tens of thousands each year and the Fresno State Bulldogs are the pride of the County.
 - Bulldog Village west of the campus and Sun Garden Acres to the south are major neighborhoods for off-campus housing. High density student off campus housing influences the neighborhoods around the campus and is a reason for several hard to count census tracts surrounding the University. There are significant communities of Muslim, Southeast Asians and African Americans around the University.
- Pinedale is a working-class community with the City's only industrial park in North Fresno. Pinedale was once a rural community located on the Southern Pacific Railroad. Camp Pinedale began during World War II as a temporary detention center for up to 5,000 Japanese Americans on route to internment camps and was later converted to army quarters. Most homes are modest and built in the '70s and '80s. Pinedale has been annexed by the City of Fresno and is now adjacent to the River Park shopping center. Pinedale covers the area from Herndon to Nees Avenues, and Blackstone to Ingram.
- El Dorado Park neighborhood has approximately 5,000 residents, with a significant population of Hmong and Southeast Asians, living in old student apartment complexes west of Fresno State. Food insecurity and crime are major concerns. Several anchor partners are Wesley United Methodist Church, Stone Soup, and the El Dorado Community Development Corporation (CDC). The CDC is committed to revitalize the neighborhood and improve public safety, public green spaces and the quality of affordable housing. In Census Tract 54.03, it covers the area from Barstow to Shaw Ave, and First to Cedar Avenues.

Proposed District 3:

- Downtown Fresno, The Fresno County Hall of Records, which houses the County Administrative and Supervisors' Offices, Fresno City Hall, the U.S. District Court, the California Fifth District Court of Appeals, several Fresno County Superior Court facilities, the Fresno County Jail, the administrative offices for Fresno Unified School District and State Center Community College District, Chuckchansi Park, and the Fresno Convention Center are all in Downtown Fresno.
 - For decades, Fresno's downtown served as the gathering place for the entire central San Joaquin Valley. Starting in the 1950s, retail anchors in downtown Fresno started moving out to suburban shopping centers near new homes constructed farther and farther from the urban core. Multiple planning efforts have focused on Downtown Fresno, to reverse its decline as the city grows ever outwards and revitalize surrounding older neighborhoods, including the recent Fulton Corridor Specific Plan and the Downtown Neighborhoods Community Plan. Downtown Fresno, which covers the triangle from Highway 99 to Highway 41 to Divisadero Ave on the north, is on the original railroad grid axis that runs in a northeast-southwest direction, a constant reminder that the city was designed around the Southern Pacific Railroad.
- Chinatown, established around 1872, was a vibrant live-work-play environment where most ethnic communities in Fresno got their start. With urban renewal in the 1960s, Chinatown lost both businesses and residents. Historic buildings were demolished, buildings became vacant, and vagrants congregated. Chinatown has suffered decades of neglect and attempts at improvement have been haphazard and poorly funded. Now, with high speed rail being built, there's \$30 million in state investment. While some consider high speed rail yet another nail in Chinatown's coffin, many see an opportunity to plan for an influx of people, who will generate an improved business environment and expanded housing opportunities. The Chinatown district is bordered by the railroad tracks, Freeway 99, Fresno Street and Ventura Street.
- Cultural Arts District has art galleries. music venues, and locally owned businesses. The anchor locations are the Warnors Theater, Arte Americas, and All Things Fresno. More than 10 apartment communities were developed and renovated in the past decade, including Iron Bird Lofts, Fulton Village, and Van Ness Cottages, transforming downtown Fresno at night and showing a growing demand for urban life and the arts in Fresno. While the official borders are Toulumne to Calaveras and H Street to L Street, unofficially it covers the triangle from Divisadero south to Tuolumne and west to H St.
- Lowell-Jefferson Neighborhood, developed about 1900, served as Fresno's first suburb with porched single-family homes and cottages. The Lowell neighborhood has survived, despite the building of the Highway 180 through it, a proliferation of vacant lots, many properties in disrepair, and infill apartment buildings too large for their lot, with no frontage along the street. The Jefferson neighborhood also contains many late 19th and early 20th century homes but has suffered more damage from demolition and incompatible infill development. Jefferson also has more multi-family properties and

more vacant parcels. The Lowell-Jefferson neighborhoods are bounded by Highway 180 on the north and west, Divisadero on the south, and Highway 41 on the east.

- Tower District was a "streetcar suburb" with fancy homes built in the 1930s along streetcar lines, now mixed in with apartment buildings, bungalow courts, and small commercial districts lined with restaurants, bars, and shops. Named for the neon-lit Tower Theatre, this is one of the city's last intact walkable urban districts that hasn't been destroyed by urban renewal or freeway construction. A nightlife destination, the Tower is the alternative culture and LGBTQ+ capital of the San Joaquin Valley. The Tower District Specific Plan was adopted in 1991 to protect its charm and unique character. The Tower District runs from Shields Ave south to Hwy 180, Fruit Ave east to Blackstone.
- Mayfair District, aka Cincotta, is an unincorporated County island encircled by the City of Fresno. Mayfair was the first major subdivision completed in Fresno after World War II at a time when Fresno County didn't even have a building code to establish minimum housing standards. Mayfair also included the first suburban shopping center at McKinley and First, now a significant Southeast Asian business COI. The boundaries of this CDP are Shields south to McKinley, and First Ave east to North Barton Ave /Highway 168.
- Blackstone Corridor. The Better Blackstone Association, who's lead anchor partner is Fresno Metro Ministry, wants to see new investment and revitalization along this aging, deteriorating commercial corridor. The Association is working to expand and start businesses and mixed-use developments. A Bus Rapid Transit system and a Building a Better Blackstone CDC are expected soon. The Blackstone Corridor runs from Shaw south to Olive Ave. See Blackstone Corridor Transportation and Housing Study, 2017
- Huntington Boulevard, one of Fresno's most architecturally distinct neighborhoods, features grandiose homes from the 1910s to the 1930s on large lots, alongside more modest bungalows, facing onto a wide boulevard with a grassy median. An area of older wealth where many prominent residents lived, Huntington Boulevard is a popular urban park that many community members use for walking and jogging. Surrounding streets are lined by older homes. Huntington Boulevard, the first subdivision to be annexed into the City of Fresno, was recently designated as a historic district. The boundaries are Tulare to Ventura/Kings Canyon Ave, and Highway 41 east to Cedar Ave.

Proposed District 4:

• Calwa, an impoverished census-designated place, developed as a railroad town when the Santa Fe Railway built a switching yard and houses for railway employees. Calwa grew up around the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific Railroad corridors. Calwa residents are over 90% Latino and the median household income is under \$30,000. Home to Calwa Elementary School in Fresno Unified, Calwa covers the area from California Ave south to Jensen Ave, and East Ave to Cedar Ave.

Calwa Parks & Recreation District provides and maintains recreation facilities and community enrichment activities. Calwa Park serves as the main recreational outlet for community members from surrounding neighborhoods in Southeast Fresno. District boundaries are from California Ave south to North Ave, and from East Ave to Peach Ave. https://mydashgis.com/CSDA/map

- Malaga, a census-designated place located six miles south-southeast of Downtown Fresno, has approximately 1,000 residents, 93% of whom are Latino. The post office opened in 1886. The boundaries are Chestnut east to Willow, and Muscat south to Central Avenue. Residents are proud of their Malaga Community Center and Malaga Elementary School in Fowler Unified. The Malaga County Water District serves the area.
- Central Southeast Area Specific Plan intends to provide a vision for the next 20 years. The Plan Area covers a mix of suburban housing developments, industrial uses, and vacant land. Community feedback reports the need to improve infrastructure, increase access to parks and open space, develop vacant lots, and revitalize key commercial corridors such as Ventura/Kings Canyon Rd. The Plan will address affordable housing, economic development, transportation, parks and open space, and a healthy environment. This Specific Plan area covers over 2,200 acres (3.4 square miles) just east and southeast of downtown, bounded by Belmont Ave to the north (largest portion south of Kings Canyon), S Orange Ave to the west, E Church Ave to the south, and S Peach Ave to the east. https://www.fresno.gov/darm/wp-content/uploads/sites/10/2018/01/CSEASP project area.jpg

This Plan area is NOT a cohesive neighborhood as it covers only as many CDBG acres east of the Downtown Neighborhoods Plan as the City had CDBG funding for.

• South Central Specific Plan (SCSP) Area, aka the Industrial Triangle. This Project would result in the development of light and heavy industrial land uses and warehouses, causing higher heavy-duty diesel truck traffic and operation of forklifts and refrigeration units. The Project area sits adjacent to several communities already suffering from the highest pollution burdens in Fresno and the State. Residents and advocates argue the proposed industrial land uses and daily vehicle trips warehouses generate will negatively impact local air quality and create traffic congestion. This plan covers from California south to Central/American Avenue, Highway 41 to Highway 99; the portion from Jensen to North stretches east to Peach, as well as the Regional Business Park west of

Highway 41, between North and Central Avenues. https://www.fresno.gov/darm/wp-content/uploads/sites/10/2021/04/Proposed-Plan-Map.pdf

- Agricultural workers as a community of interest. This proposed map groups farmworkers, packing house workers, and those working in ag-related jobs from the rural towns in eastern Fresno County and older urban neighborhoods in Southeast Fresno together as a community of interest in EMC's Proposed District 4. Shared characteristics include similar challenges re housing, linguistics, seasonal income, employment patterns and worksite disadvantages, as well as high levels of poverty, crowded housing, difficulties accessing health and social services, limited internet access, and low educational levels. These areas are also heavily Latino, with many immigrants, many limited English, and many mixed status households.
- Selma Kingsburg Fowler County Sanitation District serves the three cities by agreements, under which the District owns the large sewer lines and the treatmentdisposal facilities. Each city owns its sewer system while the District operates, maintains, and regulates them.
- Southeast Regional Disposal Site (SERDS). The County of Fresno along with all seven rural cities in Proposed District 4 own the closed Disposal Site at Academy and Dinuba Avenues. The seven cities and the County executed a JPA in 1980 to manage the solid waste generated, ensure sufficient operating funding, and closure of the site. SERDS ceased to accept waste in 1990, but a surcharge on landfilled waste generated within the SERDS area covers post-closure maintenance costs. See p. 15, https://www.co.fresno.ca.us/home/showpublisheddocument/9024/636379641022930000
- The communities in proposed District 4 experience shared environmental burdens While much of Fresno County experiences environmental burdens such as poor air quality and water insecurity issues, the communities in proposed District 4 share similarities in how they are disproportionally burdened with pollution and pesticide contamination. California's CalEnviroScreen's mapping tool illustrates this point. This screening tool uses environmental, health, and socioeconomic information to produce scores for every census tract in the state. Almost all the communities in proposed District 4 have a CalEnvironScreen 3.0 Score of 91-100% or above, meaning they are some of the most environmentally burdened and vulnerable communities in California. CalEPA uses these scores to aid in administering environmental justice grants, promote compliance with environmental laws, prioritize site-cleanup activities and identify opportunities for sustainable economic development. It is important that these communities remain "whole" to ensure that they benefit from available state grants and funding that use this screening tool.

These communities are also similarly burdened by pollution and pesticides. According to CalEnviroScreen 4.0, the communities of Fowler, Kingsburg, Selma, Parlier, Kingsburg

and the unincorporated communities nearby all have a pollution burden percentile in the 80 to 100 range and a pesticide range in the 90 to 100 percentile.

Proposed District 5:

- Keeps foothill and mountain communities intact. Foothill and mountain community residents provided testimony before the California Citizens Redistricting Commission (CCRC) that foothill and mountain communities should be kept whole, since they have a unique culture, different than communities on the Valley floor. These communities are gateway communities to the Sierras and the national forests; local businesses rely on tourism and recreational activities, such as hiking, boating, camping, and fishing. Significant issues include fire protection, forest management, and access to insurance.
- Keeps the City of Clovis intact. The City of Clovis, located in the northeast quadrant of the Fresno-Clovis Metropolitan Area, has more than doubled in population since 1985, reaching 120,000 residents, and encompassing over 23 square miles. Clovis is dedicated to retaining its unique western atmosphere and "Gateway to the Sierra" role. Clovis proudly maintains its "Clovis way of life," annual Rodeo Days, Big Hat Days, and Clovisfest celebrations. Residents like living in Clovis because it's a tight knit community with a quaint small-town spirit, great schools, great parks, and a reputation for being really safe, Residents believe Clovis is very different from the Fresno metro area. Councilmember Diane Pearce reports that the violent crime rate in Clovis is nearly half the state's rate, in stark contrast to Fresno. "If you happen to overhear two Clovis residents complaining, they are probably talking about their latest experience [in Fresno] west of Willow." See 8-6-21 Fresno Bee article, Clovis conservative explains why her hometown is special.
- Tarpey Village, a census-designated place with about 4,300 residents between Fresno and Clovis. The first homes were built in 1950, when the area was rural. Today, Tarpey is bounded on three sides by Clovis, roughly between Minnewawa, Sunnyside, Dakota and Gettysburg Avenues. The area was named for a prominent local rancher and politician. Both Fresno and Clovis have unsuccessfully tried to annex the area over the years, but residents didn't want water meters, curbs and sidewalks. Today, there are still no curbs and sidewalks in residential areas. Most homes are owner-occupied. Tarpey relies on Clovis for water service and Fresno for sewer service, and is in Clovis Unified School District.
- Keeps Sunnyside intact. Sunnyside, a census-designated place, is an eastern suburb of the City of Fresno. Sunnyside was the original settling place for many of Fresno's Founding Fathers: Butler, Church, Easterby, Roeding, Romain, Locan, Teague, and Kearney. Sunnyside's soil and climate were well suited for agriculture, and in 1872, water was diverted from the Kings River and the Easterby ranch at Kings Canyon and Peach became a "miracle in the desert." Fresno's wine industry began on Fancher Creek. Sunnyside was very different from the rest of rural Fresno as great wealth flowed in, mostly from San Francisco. Sunnyside has many ranch style homes built in the

- 1960's 1980's on lot sizes over a quarter acre with more homes built in the early 2000's. Sunnyside has its own Country Club. Over 80% of homes are owner-occupied.
- Minkler and Centerville are sparsely populated census-designated places along Highway 180 in eastern Fresno County that are over 80% white. Minkler is 2.25 miles southeast of Centerville, separated by the Kings River. Minkler was a rail siding, created in 1920, with both railroad lines abandoned by the 1970s. Centerville, one of the oldest communities in Fresno County, was founded in 1854 on the Sante Fe Railroad line 16 miles east of Fresno, by a ferry crossing the Kings River. Both communities serve as Gateway communities to the National Parks.
- Friant, a census-designated place, is located along the San Joaquin River, at the base of Friant Dam and Millerton Lake. The town had its start as a ferry crossing in 1856. The name was changed to honor the co-owner of a local lumber company. Friant is located 11.5 miles north of Clovis and shares the rural feel, similar to the rural residential region east of Clovis.

We have outlined in this memo:

- 1. Discrepancies in Fresno County Redistricting Data,
- 2. Updated Equity Coalition Map Data Tables, and
- 3. supportive information for EMC's proposed map.

We request that this Commission officially recommend that the Fresno Board of Supervisors adopt the Equity Coalition Map⁸ (also known as "Public Map 116"⁹), and they they adopt the following findings in support of this recommendation:

That the Equity Coalition Map was generated by the community,
That the Equity Coalition Map complies with all laws and requirements, and
That the Equity Coalition Map is an equitable distribution of voting power in Fresno County

Leadership Counsel for Justice and Accountability is in strong support of the Equitable Map Coalition (EMC)'s map proposal, as we believe that it accurately reflects the demographic change of Fresno County between 2011 and 2021. After holding multiple community meetings focused on redistricting in the communities of Cantua Creek/El Porvenir and Lanare in the western part of the county and Tombstone in the eastern region, we also support the EMC's map proposal because it preserves the communities of interest articulated by many residents in these communities. Included with this letter are 25 COIs that reflect this.

Chairman Abrahamian and Commissioners -

The Fair Representation Coalition of Fresno County is proud to present its draft map for consideration, enclosed with this letter.

FRC Fresno County submitted a draft map on Oct. 7, which is denoted as Public Map 101 on the Commission's website. Technical issues with Maptitude eliminated key design elements from the map ultimately sent to NDC and this Commission.

Enclosed in this letter is FRC Fresno County's finalized draft map and demographic data from Maptitude.

The FRC Finalized Map is compliant with the Voting Rights Act and preserves historic representation in accordance with Fresno County's population

The FRC Finalized Map contains contiguous boundaries that preserve historic representation of similarly-situated communities of interest. It does not favor or discriminate against members of any given political party, nor

The map is compliant with the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965 through the preservation of three minority-majority supervisorial districts within the jurisdiction each with strong and effective voting power of their minority communities.

The FRC Finalized Map adjusts boundaries to accommodate the trajectory of Fresno County's population growth and shift

The 2020 Census exposed a continued east-ward shift in Fresno County's population, pointing to sizable growth within the City of Clovis and the southeastern portion of the City of Fresno.

Redrawing boundaries following a decennial census is not about reflecting a snapshot in time, but rather acknowledging changes between decades and accounting for future changes ahead.

Based upon the body of evidence, from building permits to proposed development within Fresno County, the last decade's trend of growth is only expected to increase with further development within the Southeast Growth Area (known as SEGA or SEDA) and the City of Clovis.

This map addresses the growth by bringing established communities on the border of districts into a single district while ensuring that the current District 5 (Magsig) continues to have sufficient space to accommodate future growth.

The FRC Finalized Map unites divided communities of interest from the 2011 Final Map

By seeking to reorient Fresno County's Supervisorial map to account for changes in population, FRC Fresno County successfully unites three divided communities of interest in Fresno County.

First, the map brings the El Paseo-San Joaquin River neighborhood of the City of Fresno (north of Herndon, west of Highway 99) into District 2 (Brandau), uniting neighborhoods of northwest Fresno.

Second, the map brings neighborhoods south of California State University, Fresno into District 3 (Quintero), which feature closer demographic and socio-economic similarities with neighbors to the south than to its previous easterly neighbors in District 5 (Magsig). This increases voting strength for the population of these neighborhoods.

Third, the map brings neighborhoods of Sunnyside in the City of Fresno south of the San Joaquin Rail-line into District 4 (Mendes) from District 5 (Magsig). These neighborhoods are transitional between Fresno County's rural and suburban communities and, based on demographics and socio-economics, are similarly situated to nearby neighbors in District 4.

And lastly, the map brings Buchanan High School and neighboring communities in the City of Clovis, along with future planned residential developments north of Shepherd Ave. along Willow Ave into District 5 (Magsig) from District 2 unifying neighborhoods of Clovis and allowing for imminent population growth.

Concerns about extrajudicial comments and consideration of updated draft maps

It has been brought to our attention that Commissioners have made extrajudicial comments that the Commission would not consider draft maps submitted after the Oct. 11 submission deadline.

We hope that the Commission will consider this finalized map from FRC Fresno County along with any and all updated or finalized maps from those who made submissions prior to the Oct. 11 deadline.

FRC Fresno County was made aware this week that finalized 2020 Census data was not properly incorporated into Caliper Maptitude's map-making software until after the Oct. 11 submission deadline, thereby rendering draft maps submitted at the deadline incomplete, subject to heightened population deviation, and therefore prejudicial for consideration.

We respectfully ask that this draft map, rather than Public Map 101, be considered as FRC Fresno County's submission due to the technical issues with Maptitude and the missing 2020 Census Data.

Refusal to consider this finalized map may warrant the exploration of legal options, including litigation, by FRC Fresno County.

Thank you for your consideration and commitment to fair representation in our community.






