





The Assessor's Office breakroom on the 2nd floor of the Hall of Records was remodeled as it was in major disrepair for years without enough seating or refrigerator space to accommodate a staff of 100+. The remodeled breakroom added new refrigerators, counters, additional seating, and most importantly, elevated the pride and appreciation from staff members.



The Assessor-Recorder hosted the California Secretary of State's Apostille Pop-Up Shop for the second year in a row. Holding the Pop-Up saved County residents the time and resources needed to travel to either Sacramento or Los Angeles to personally obtain an Apostille.

Speedier processing!



The Tax Collection Division has made paying property taxes easier by adopting the shorter payee name "FC TTC."

This change helps reduce mistakes, speeds up processing, and simplifies check writing for taxpayers.

The Treasury Division optimized its remittance processing software, RT Lawrence (RTL), which processes tax checks and payment stubs. This resulted in faster processing with fewer errors, leading to quicker payment posting for taxpayers and reduced congestion on phone and lobby service lines.

The improvements were achieved without additional software investment, demonstrating efficient use of taxpayer money.

The Payroll Unit keeps payroll adjustments current by incorporating changes directly into employees' next paychecks. This method improves efficiency and removes the need for separate vouchers.



parcel and tract maps prior to their recording.



LEGISLATIVE EFFORTS

The Fresno County DA's Office, joined by many other offices in the state, campaigned for the passage of Proposition 36 in 2024. This proposition, passed with voter approval in November, gives prosecutors the discretion to file felony charges in certain drug possession or petty theft offenses if the defendant has two or more specified drug or theft convictions. The new law emphasizes the importance of treatment and addressing underlying issues while still holding criminals responsible for their actions and protecting retailers.

FENTANYL EDUCATION & AWARENESS

The DA's Office kicked off the next phase of its Fentanyl Education & Awareness Campaign with a bold new message displayed on over 50 billboards in both English and Spanish across the County, in addition to a new video PSA. Since 2021, the campaign has aimed to hold dealers accountable while raising awareness in the community. We recently celebrated a landmark second-degree murder conviction in Fresno County for a fentanyl-related death.

CROWDSTRIKE INCIDENT AND RESPONSE

On Thursday, July 18, 2024, a global CrowdStrike update caused widespread system failures across the world, including County of Fresno's network. resulting in "Blue Screen of Death" errors on approximately 400 servers and 3.500 workstations.

ITSD recovery efforts began at 11 PM that evening and required extensive manual intervention. Through coordinated overnight efforts, most affected systems were restored and functional by the end of the day on Friday, July 19, 2024.



In partnership with UCSF-Fresno, Saint Agnes Medical Center, and Tzu Chi Medical Foundation, the RMH program delivers no-cost medical and vision care directly to rural residents and farmworkers via mobile units. Additionally, the Fresno County Community Health Worker (CHW) Network supports RMH events by providing culturally appropriate health education and wraparound care coordination services.



AMERICAN AVENUE DISPOSAL SITE

The County successfully completed construction on Phase III, Modules 9 and 10 at the American Avenue Disposal Site. This major upgrade added approximately 3.95 million cubic yards of new, lined space for waste, ensuring safe and responsible waste management for our growing community.

The Regional Water Quality Control Board issued formal approval in April 2025, confirming the new liner system meets all regulatory standards under the landfill's Waste Discharge Requirements.

This newly authorized expansion reflects our ongoing commitment to sustainability, environmental compliance, and long-term planning for Fresno County's waste infrastructure.

ELKHORN RECHARGE FACILITY

Nearing completion (expected this fall), the Elkhorn Recharge Facility (NE quadrant Hwy 41 and E. Elkhorn Ave.) is an ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act)-funded project. The 55-acre basin will accept diverted Kings River surface water from the Liberty Canal during times of high flows and/or flood releases. The diverted surface water will recharge the aguifer, offsetting regional overdraft conditions, and provide off river flood control capacity to reduce damaging high flows within the Kings River.




Through Adult Protective Services (APS) and Child Welfare Services (CWS), DSS received over 21,000 referrals of abuse and neglect for older dependent adults and youth, resulting in over 10,000 investigations by social workers who conduct safety assessments and connect individuals and families to resources and services to support their safety and well-being.

PROVIDING EMPLOYMENT AND VOCATIONAL TRAINING

DSS supported over 11,000 clients in obtaining employment and/or vocational training/education through CalWORKs Employment Services that connects cash aid recipients to job specialists, removing barriers to self-sufficiency.

SUPPORTING YOUTH AND FAMILIES

DSS Child Welfare Services supports youth and their families in achieving safety, stability, and well-being. When a child is removed from their home, the goal is to safely return them to the care of their family whenever possible. In FY 24-25, over 320 youth reunified with their families.
